The plant provides two refrigerated rooms, one suitable for preserving meats and one at a higher temperature for vegetables. All ice used in the hospital will be made in the building. A system of circulating ice water has been installed throughout the building. This provides ice cold water on each floor and does away with the unsanitary method of cooling water by dropping ice into it.
