

DEAN DYMENT TO OPEN SYNOD WITH ADDRESS

Oregon Presbyterians Will
Convene Here Thursday
TO MEET AT UNIVERSITY

Rev. Bruce J. Giffen, Student Pastor,
and Mrs. Giffen, Will Be
Host and Hostess

The 13rd session of the synod of the Presbyterian church of Oregon will be held at the University of Oregon this year, convening Thursday of this week and ending Saturday of the following week. The synod, which is to be the guest of the university and will live in the dormitories, where Rev. Bruce Giffen, student pastor, and Mrs. Giffen, will act as host and hostess. Between 70 and 100 ministers, elders and their wives are expected to attend.

Dean Colin V. Dymont, dean of the college of literature, science and arts, will deliver the opening address of President Campbell. The evening session on Thursday, the opening day, will be given by Rev. M. H. Heicher, of Corvallis. Other prominent divines attending the synod will speak during the week. They are Rev. Cleland B. McClellan, professor of theology from the McCormick Theological seminary, who is to give a series of lectures each day of the week; Rev. W. S. Holt, of Philadelphia, who will speak at the Sunday evening service and Rev. Edgar P. Hill, of New York, who is to speak Friday evening on the subject "The Bible Key."

Program Arranged

An interesting program has been arranged for the 11 o'clock sessions during the week, which are to be held for both summer session students and members of the synod. On Thursday, opening day, Dr. Charles W. Giffen, of Eugene, will speak on "The Mediaeval Student." On Friday and Saturday Dr. E. S. Giffen, of the university, will give a series of lectures on "The Mediaeval Student." On Sunday, Dr. Joseph Schaefer, superintendent of the Wisconsin Historical society, will speak on "Recent Social Movements in America." Dr. E. S. Giffen, professor of English at the university, will speak Tuesday and Wednesday on "The Modern Conception of Philosophy" and "Some Important Conclusions of Modern Philosophy."

A woman's conference is to be held Tuesday morning for the women of the synod at which Mrs. Giffen will be the speaker.

To Promote Good Will

In speaking of the university's efforts in inviting the synod to its sessions on the campus, Dr. Giffen said, "It is a significant movement in that it is intended to promote good will and understanding between the church and the state and the school. It is a movement which is the idea of using the synod held in conjunction with summer session at the university, hoped that in the course of the week, other churches and synods will follow its example and the bond between educational institutions and the church would be strengthened. So far, however, no other denominational body has accepted the invitation of a state institution to come as its guest."

WOMAN MANAGES FARM

PROWLER IS SHOT IN LEG

LESLIE SCHWERING USES
SHOT GUN ON O'CALLAHAN

Eugene Man Tells of Episode That
Occurred in Portland Early
Friday Morning

Leslie Schwering, of this city, who is mentioned in Portland papers and press dispatches as having shot William O'Callahan, of Portland, in the leg with a shotgun in that city early Friday morning, is now at his home here and tells the story substantially as follows: Mr. Schwering had just returned to his rooming house from downtown and had gone to bed on a sleeping porch when he saw a man on a bicycle stop in front of a private garage across the street. It appeared to Mr. Schwering that the man was trying to enter the garage to steal the car inside or something else and he called out to him to leave. The man then left on his bicycle but returned later and entered the house at the residence where Mr. Schwering stayed. He then went over to the garage and began to fumble with the door. In the meantime Schwering had obtained a shotgun. In the house and approached the man, who proved to be O'Callahan, and told him to throw up his hands. O'Callahan then ran and Schwering fired the shot entering the rear portion of his leg.

Mr. Schwering said that the injured man is getting along all right and is expected to recover. No charge has been filed against Mr. Schwering it was stated.

EARLY DAY RESIDENT DIES

J. W. OWEN PASSES AWAY IN
PORTLAND HOSPITAL

Had Lived Here Greater Part of
His Life—Was Son of Henry
C. Owen, Pioneer

J. W. Owen, who died at Good Samaritan hospital in Portland yesterday afternoon, was a resident of Eugene a greater part of his life. He was the son of Henry C. Owen, early pioneer of this part of the valley, who was prominent in its affairs here for many years. J. W. (Willie) Owen, as he was familiarly known here, had been in ill health for a number of years. He had been living with his daughter, Mrs. Ermine Schaefer, in Portland, for some time prior to his death. He was aged 74 years, and he survived by three children, Henry E. Owen, realty dealer of Eugene; Mrs. Nellie Edwards of Eugene; and Mrs. Ermine Schaefer, of Portland, besides two brothers, Clay and Ben Owen, of this county.

The remains were taken to S. S. Dunning's undertaking parlors at Sixth and Alder streets, in Portland, and will be brought to Eugene for interment Monday. W. W. Branstetter will have charge of the remains here and the funeral will be held at the Episcopal church at two P. M., with interment in the Masonic cemetery.

BILLY SUNDAY TO SPEAK

EVANGELIST ADDRESSES STATE
MEETING OF REALTORS

"Home Ownership" Is Topic of
Speech to Be Delivered Wed-
nesday, July 18

Billy Sunday, famous evangelist and ex-baseball player, will be one of the principal speakers at the Northwest Real Estate association's convention in Portland next week, according to telegraphic advices received today by President B. A. McCully, of the Eugene Realty Board. He will speak Wednesday, July 18.

Sunday will speak on home ownership and it is expected that he will even eclipse the famous speech he made on the topic once before when he said that "a man who sings 'Home, Sweet Home' in a rented house is merely kidding himself and is serenading the landlord."

The noted wit and speaker is now in the East, but on invitation of the Portland Realty board, he decided to come west for the purpose of giving the realtors of the West Coast one of his own old-fashioned fiery addresses.

The convention this year promises to be one of the most notable and important in the history of the association, and hundreds of realtors from all parts of the Pacific Northwest, and from California, British Columbia and Alberta, have already signified their intention of attending, said Mr. McCully, yesterday. W. E. P. Eppich, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, and other national officers, will be present and a special delegation from California likewise will attend. President Eppich will address the convention Thursday, July 19.

Two of the most important things which the association will take up for decision will involve about the proposed multiple listing system and the realty agents' license law. The multiple listing system has met with great success in the East, it is said, and if it is adopted in the Northwest it will mean that any property listed with the multiple listing bureau of a realty board will be offered for sale by all members of the bureau.

Robert W. Prescott, who is an ex-instructor in oratory at the University of Oregon, will represent the local board in the five-minute talk on the merits of Eugene. "We believe that this will be well taken care of by Mr. Prescott, and we feel that every realtor in Eugene should attend this convention," stated President McCully. "We would like very much to see every one in the real estate business attend, and we are sure that they would be ready to join the local board on their return and be eligible to use the word 'realtor' as you realize that you are not eligible to use the term 'realtor' unless you are a member of the local board, which is a member of the Northwest Realty association and of the National Real Estate association."

NOTED CRIPPLE IS HERE

ARTHUR FULLER HAS BEEN
ON HIS BACK 24 YEARS

Los Angeles Man Who Arrived
Here Yesterday Writes Poetry,
Novels and Songs

Arthur F. Fuller, a cripple who has neither stood nor sat up for 24 years and who makes his living while lying on the flat of his back, arrived in Eugene yesterday and was selling his wares on the streets. Fuller is a musician, poet, singer and author. He is the author of 27 novels of wide repute and has to his credit 107 musical compositions.

Since the age of fourteen Fuller has earned every cent of his own support while on the flat of his back. He has traveled 50,000 miles by rail in 12,000 miles in a truck, and over 3000 miles by other modes of conveyance in the last four years.

Fuller's headquarters are in Los Angeles, where he gives musical concerts and writes his books and music. He has never solicited alms and prides himself on not being a beggar.

The invalid is a graduate of several musical schools and holds the gold medal for musical excellence, as a trophy for his pipe organ ability. Fuller says there is nothing easy about his lot, and to sell enough to have the expenses covered is a heart-breaking problem.

The cripple rides in a little four-wheeled cart which he controls himself and which is pushed by an aged attendant. His tour includes all of the Pacific Coast.

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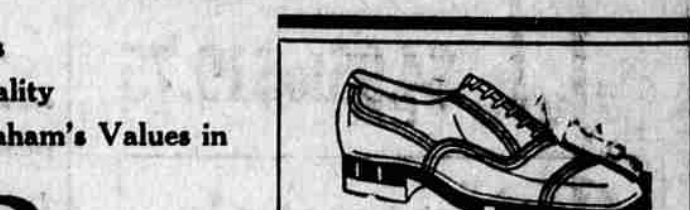
