DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—General reductions of 1c to 2c a dozen are showing for eggs by private firms, following the protracted weakness in the market and the action of the poultry producers in cutting their prices 2c generally. While some of the sellers are still asking as high as 25c per dozen for select very high stock is being sold above 25c and in instances only 15c is being quoted for the best quality.

BUTTER MOVEMENT IS BETTER
Improved movement of butter was reported to the South by local centralizers, with cubes generally held at 10c pound. Southern California is the principal operator here. Receipts of off-grade stock are heavy.

VEAL MARKET IS RATHER SLOW
Rather slow trade is shown for country-killed calves. Only very limited offerings keep the price intact at the moment. Efforts to advance it failed. Hogs in limited supply and are about steady.

PEACH MARKET AGAIN EASY
Further slight easing of the peach price is shown here. Oregon stock is selling at \$1.00-\$1.25 generally, although a few early crops are quoted for extra large sizes at a fractional rise. California Crawford and Elbertas were easier at \$1.50 generally, with limited sales as high as \$1.65.

APRICOT MARKET IS STEADY
With decreased offerings, the market for apricots is somewhat improved in character, although prices show little change. Early crops are quoted around \$1.50-\$1.75. Sulcasses selling mostly at \$1.

ONION PRICES AGAIN SHADED
Onion prices are again being shaded. Sales of California reds are shown at \$2.00-\$2.75, with Walla Walla stock at \$2.00-\$2.25, with the bulk of the trade at the lower price. Holdings of California stock limited.
