COLORADO VISITOR HERE

W. ZABRISKIE SUGGESTS IMPROVEMENTS AT AUTO CAMP
More Shower Baths and Visit Each Night of Delegation of Citizens Needed

W. Zabriskie, of Pagosa Junction, Colo., who arrived in Eugene Wednesday in company with his two sons by motor to visit at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. W. Zimmerman, camped the first night after his arrival here in the municipal auto camp. He said yesterday that the local camp has one of the most beautiful settings in any of the country but that a number of improvements would have to be made to bring it up to the standard set by some of the leading camps he was visited on his travels.

One thing needed, said Mr. Zabriskie, is more shower baths. All travelers get pretty dusty and dirty and nearly everyone of them wants a good shower bath about every time he camps but owing to the fact that the facilities here are limited not very many can be accommodated in one night. The camp needs more stoves, said the visitor, and the greatest need is a visit every night to the camp of a delegation from the chamber of commerce or some other organization to interview the campers to ascertain their wants, to give them any information desired about Eugene and Lane county, to tell them of the places of interest in the state and in short to tell them anything they want to know. This, Mr. Zabriskie said, is a big feature of many of the leading camps in the country. The chamber of commerce employed one man for this purpose last summer, but Mr. Zabriskie said that volunteer work along this line with as large a squad as possible working is the best method. The tourist appreciates this personal touch with the citizens of the city and the interest which they take in the visitors.

Mr. Zabriskie and sons stopped at Yellowstone and Rainier national parks and will visit Crater Lake national park and the parks in California on their return. They will also visit Newport and other places of interest in Oregon.

The Colorado visitor is a brother of Zeno Zabriskie, Santa Clara farmer, whom he had not seen in 22 years.

BRIDGES ARE TO BE BUILT

SEVERAL SPANS WILL GO IN NORTH OF CHESHIRE

County Commissioner L. N. Koney went over the old territorial road north of Cheshire yesterday to look after bridge work. He said that one piling span of 285 feet and a number of shorter ones will be built along the route and will be finished before the highway now being constructed is ready for traffic.

During his trip to the western end of the county with County Engineer P. M. Morse during the week he found a number of bridges on Fiddle creek that needed repair and made arrangements for the necessary work. He also went up the North Fork on the same day and he and the engineer inspected the road work between Ada and Glenada. The forest service will soon gravel the new grade of about half a mile near Ada that was built last year, said the commissioner.

OLSEN WELLS COME IN

HOLDINGS AT HALF MOON, CAL., SPOOT GOOD OIL

Report of oil which has come in at wells at Half Moon bay, not far from San Francisco, are a complete justification of the faith placed in Francisco wells containing instruments, according to representatives of the Rev. David Eugene Olson oil syndicate that owns the California wells. Word was received here yesterday of the two wells spouting.

Another source of gratification to the company, according to Eugene officials, lies in the fact that .56 gravity is shown by oil from one of the wells. This is considered very high class and will bring in the neighborhood of \$4 a barrel.

Olson representatives here, in charge of operation near Eugene, while Rev. Mr. Olson is on a trip to Minneapolis, Minn., say that geologists declared that there was no oil in the Half Moon district and that it would be folly to dig there.
