Guatavo Chavez, who arrived here today, and who was a witness of the assassination of Villa and his companions, says the owner of the house in which the assassins concealed themselves was also killed by them. Also, he says, they killed one of their companions suspected of treachery and carried off his body. No arrests of the men who carried out the ambush have been made.

General Martinez, zone commander, has left Parral for Cuernavaca to take possession of the Villa ranch. A strict censorship on telegrams prevails here.

SUSPECTS TAKEN FROM JAIL
Three Men Sent on Way to Mexico City Is Report

 EL PASO, TEXAS, July 21.—Three men held in connection with the assassination of General Francisco Villa, his secretary, Colonel Miguel Trillo, and three others, were taken from the Chihuahua City penitentiary today and sent to Mexico City, according to information received in Juarez this evening.

President Obregon issued orders to General Eugenio Martinez, commander of the Northern military zone of Mexico, who is personally conducting an investigation into the killing of Villa, to exert every effort to uncover the men behind Villa's murder. In the same order he also directed that all persons arrested in connection with the plot should be sent to Mexico City for further investigation.

Villa was discussed at a revolutionary junta held at Gomez Palacio, Durango several weeks ago,

OLD GUARD WEEPS OVER NEW GERMAN ARMY LIST
SHADES OF OLD WAR LORDS MUST SOB OVER SLASHING
Treaty of Versailles at One Swoop Clipped the German Army to 100,000

 BERLIN, June 18.—Germany's first army list since 1914 has just been issued, and its diminutive proportions bear striking contrast to the fat volumes of pre-war days. It is the first time that one book has included the military forces of all Germany.

The shades of Blucher, of the older von Moltke, and of other illustrious leaders, who made the name of German militarism a thing of awe, must shudder at the despatch that have occurred since their day.

Up to 1914, the peace-time regular army of the Fatherland embraced some 600,000 men and officers, besides a host of reserves. During the late hostilities, this strength swelled at one time to more than 8,000,000. Then came the treaty of Versailles, and at one swoop clipped the German army to 100,000. Ten thousand of this dwarfed array were permitted to be officers and members of the administrative personnel.

Old Institutions Vanish
 Gone are the general staff and all the high training institutions so long the pride of Prussia. Four small service schools are permitted, and these for officer candidates only. Gone, too, are the whole branches of the service. The foot artillery, aviation and the aircraft construction, the railway troops, and the great technical organization which attended to the soldiers' welfare and looked after the men on leave.

Princes and others of the higher nobility have completely disappeared from the officers' corps, and there are not as many barons, counts, and so on as in the days of yore. A muster roll call would sound strangely different from those of a decade ago.

Many of the "old guard" are reading the new list with tears in their eyes. Many a socialist and republican is reading it with a smile, as he recalls the hardships of the "mailed fist" militarism in the old days when an emperor tented the great palace looking down under den Linden.

CHINESE YOUTHS PLAY YANKEE OUTDOOR GAMES
Oriental Go in for Football and Sandlot Baseball

NEW YORK, July 20.—Chinese schoolboys playing baseball on the lot, or lining up for football practice in the school yard, would probably make an unexpected picture with which to represent an American fancy of oriental children in always staid and decorative poses.

But these are the games which Chinese boys do play, more than any others, according to Dr. Hou-Hu of Nankin, China, who is studying in this country on a fellowship of the International Health Board of the Rockefeller Foundation. As a part of his field work toward obtaining the degree of Doctor of Public Health from Johns Hopkins University, Dr. Hu is now engaged in making a study of the work of the American Child Health Association, a national organization working for the improvement of methods and standards of child health care, with a staff of health and educational experts engaged in research and practical demonstration throughout the country.

"Before American games came with the Americans into China," Dr. Hu says, "Chinese children did not play—at least not in your sense of play. My grandfather and my father did not play games, and the games I learned when I was a boy in school were American sports.

"Little girls in China used to sew and learn household tasks, but they had no active games. Now Chinese children play like children in this country. They have learned how in the American schools, and through American workers who have brought your kind of play to the children of China.

POSTMISTRESS IN ROW
WESTERVILLE DISSENTS WITH HARDING APPOINTEE

WESTERVILLE, Ohio, July 20.—When Warren G. Harding, of Marion, Ohio, was elected president, he appointed Mrs. Mary E. Lee, an old friend of this place, as postmistress of Westerville. The Westerville postmasteress pays well, as Westerville is the home of the national anti-saloon league and there is considerable mail to be handled.

Mrs. Lee did not get along with some of the men employees and four or five of them were removed. The business men's association and many prominent citizens protested, but Mrs. Lee stood her ground and was backed up by the federal civil service commission. "Lack of harmony" was the charge.

Things quieted down for a time, but trouble broke out with renewed activity yesterday when another employee was dismissed. Now the Westerville business men say they will protest to President Harding when he returns from his trip to Alaska. Some say the President will be asked to remove Mrs. Lee.

Dr. Lytle Is Re-elected
 SALTSM, Ore., July 21.—Dr. W. H. Lytle, who for ten years has been state veterinarian of Oregon, was re-elected at a meeting of the state livestock sanitary board today. Walter K. Taylor was re-elected president of the board and William Pollman of Baker, vice-president. Resolutions were adopted requiring cholera vaccination for all hogs exhibited at fairs where swine are brought in by boat or train. For local fairs vaccination is left optional with the board.

Alleged Floggers Acquitted

C., July 21.—A verdict of "not guilty" on three counts of an indictment on which they were tried was returned this afternoon after fifty minutes by the jury in the trial of Jule Brock, Mike Lawson and Johnson Hedgcock. The men were indicted and tried for kidnapping, secret assault and assault on women as a result of the kidnapping and flogging near Proctorville, N. C., on April 14, last, of Mrs. Mary Watson and Mrs. Hattie Purvis.

Marine Corps Commander Has New Aide

Brigadier General Logan Feland, United States marine corps, here of Belleau wood and a dozen other bloody fields of France, has been appointed aide to Major General John A. Lejeune, commanding the first division of the division of operations and training of the corps, and succeeds Major General W. C. Neville as assistant to the commanding general. He has served with the marines since 1899 and was among the first to sail for France, where he won the D. S. C. and the D. S. M. and the rank of officer in the French Legion of Honor.

JEFFRIES STUDIES BIBLE
EX-CHAMPION WILL SPREAD RELIGIOUS KNOWLEDGE

LOS ANGELES, July 20.—James J. Jeffries, former heavyweight boxing champion of the world, failed to fulfill announcements that he would speak at the Women's Christian Temperance union temple here tonight on the restoration of Palestine to the Jews, but he sat on the platform at the temple while Professor A. F. Futterer, founder and president of the Israel Restoration association, was preparing himself to spread certain knowledge he had gained from Bible study and to advocate the unification of the peoples of the white race.

"Mr. Jeffries and I have set up all night studying the Bible," said Professor Futterer, "and we know as a student of the Bible that he will do as a fighter for the right. He will not speak tonight, but is getting prepared, and the day is coming soon."

Jeffries' picture, thrown on a screen with two American flags, was greeted with applause.

Riders from all over the state will attend the affair, which is held annually under the auspices of the Rose City motorcyclists and the Motor Dealers' association in conjunction with the Oregon Journal.

Smith and Davis plan to enter the 61-inch cubic piston displacement, which is open to experts, and the 40-inch classification, which is open to all comers. In addition there is a climb for 37-inch piston measurement motorcycles and a 41-inch climb for novices. Cups and other prizes will be awarded the winners.

FIVE TO HANG IN EGYPT
SENTENCES METED IN CAIRO CONSPIRACY TRIAL

 CAIRO, Egypt, July 20.—Of thirteen men found guilty July 7 of a general conspiracy to murder British officials, the court today sentenced five to be hanged and the remaining eight to from three years to life imprisonment.

The case was commonly known as the Cairo conspiracy trial and was the outgrowth of hundreds of arrests following three years of widespread and political outbursts connection with which was denied by the Egyptian nationalists. The convictions were obtained on the testimony of an accomplice who turned king's evidence.
