JUDGE BARNARD HAS NO WORD OF STATE SUIT

Knows Nothing of Report of County Being Sued

OVERTIME IS DISCUSSED

One Road Worker Said to Have Complained but Reported to Have Withdrawn Complaint

Discussing the published report that State Labor Commissioner Gram may sue Lane county for the recovery of money alleged due county road laborers during 1921 and 1922, County Judge Barnard yesterday denied that he had received such word from the commissioner. The judge said that Gram was here about the last of May and stated then that he had received a letter from a man who had worked for the county several years and had worked some overtime at the regular wage, referring especially to one month in which members of the court found that this man had worked 16 hours overtime and had received \$20 extra for the use of his car to haul himself and others to and from work during that period.

No Word from Gram

"I have not seen or heard from Mr. Gram since," said Judge Barnard, "but have understood that the man referred to who made the complaint wrote him expressing a desire to withdraw it."

"I do not remember that we ever allowed anyone to work over 10 hours a day, but in order to complete the road work before the rains set in it was necessary at times to stretch the day to 10 hours. I think any of the men will admit that they asked for overtime and were always satisfied with what they received. We would not have worked overtime unless they demanded it, and the men wished to do it, but never felt that the extra time allowed to get the machinery in shape called for double time."

Judge Refuses to Sign

"With regard to Mr. Roney's statement that the county has not and would not work the men overtime and only pay for straight time, I would refer any one interested to payroll Nos. 650 to 654," continued the judge. "I think they will find that it calls for from nine to 14 hours per day at straight time, and that the June payrolls were changed to allow overtime at double rate, some of them amounting to two days for 12 hours' work. I did not sign these payrolls because I considered them unreasonable. For instance, I found in taking the figures as turned in that it cost \$1313.20 to deliver 1994 yards of rock an average distance of less than 2 miles or 65.9-10 cents per yard."

"With regard to Mr. Roney's statement that the county should not pay for this overtime, I would like to ask who is paying for the mistakes of the past six months?"

"Few people realize the burden thrown on two members of the court during 1921 and 1922 but thanks to a united organization we were able to get satisfactory results and decrease the county debt over \$90,000 during 1922."

CIDER-MAKING IS LAWFUL

NEW RULING SAYS PERMIT IS NOT REQUIRED

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Manufacture of cider and other non-intoxicating fruit juices is authorized without the formality of applying for a permit, under regulations issued today by Commissioner Blair of the internal revenue bureau, but persons who make them must add preservatives to prevent "further alcoholic fermentation." Fruit juices may not be lawfully used, the regulations stipulated, for beverage purposes after becoming intoxicating.

Under a ruling superceded by the new regulations, manufacturers of fruit juices have not been held responsible for any natural reaction of the liquid. The new regulation has been promulgated by the addition immediately upon
