ONE BLAZE IN SLEWAW
REPORTED THIS YEAR

Shelley, Federal Forest Su-
pervisor, states That Record
is Unusually Good In District

A small forest fire, cov-
ered a few rods, has been reported
in the Slewaw national
forest, which is an unusually good
year, according to R. S. Shelley,
supervisor of the district. Seven
fire stations are maintained in
Slewaw territory and a new
one is now being completed at
the superior reports, but
this season the forest fire
has been free from the fire
season. The late spring rains
resulted in preventing any
fire in that district, the forest
states.

A few campers are going into
Slewaw territory this summer,
according to Mr. Shelley, who at-
tends to the fact that many
campers are in poor con-
dition as a result of the late spring
rains. Shelley has returned after
a trip of inspection through the
forest district and reports
that the forest is in good con-
dition for motor traffic as a
result of the wet weather of the
spring. Work that is now in pro-
gress on the Eugene-Florence
road is also an obstacle to
work at the present time. This
road is about 24 miles in length
and the improvement work
supervisor states.

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ALLEGED AUTO THIEVES LODGED IN LOCAL JAIL

Men Who Take Car May Be
Wanted at Tacoma

DESCRIPTION IS SENT OUT

Authorities of Washington City
Report That Party Is Charged
With Crimes There

Following their arrest at Roseburg and the bringing of four alleged auto thieves here late yesterday afternoon, word was received last night from the chief of police at Tacoma that may lead to the taking of the party to that city to face two serious charges. The Tacoma police official sends word that a party of five men traveling south in a Hudson super-six are wanted there on charges of larceny and two of the men on charges of rape. The description of the car and other details tallies with the party that is charged with having stolen the car here from J. H. Meisner and after throwing his property from the machine drove on to Roseburg, where they were apprehended on instructions from the sheriff's office here.

Party Wanted in North

The names of the four men as given by the quartet are Kenneth Russell, Troy Bailey, Jack Doyle and J. F. Johnson, all of Tacoma. Details concerning the Tacoma case were not available last night with the exception that the five men were involved in the stealing of 1800 worth of auto accessories and two of the party charged with rape. The four men arrested at Roseburg are held here at the county jail, and J. H. Meisner, who made the complaint of the stealing of his car, will be queried concerning the case.

Meisner in his statement to the county authorities declared that he had invited the four men to ride with him from the north and while he was absent from the car here his companions had stolen the machine. Meisner had parked the car opposite the chamber of commerce while he entered the building, he stated.

Men Are Not Armed

When arrested at Roseburg the men were found in possession of papers showing that Meisner was the owner of the car and that the license was made out in his name. The men were not armed when arrested, but one of them was in possession of several cartridges, according to the Lane county deputies. One of the men stated that he was a member of the Washing-

ton National Guard at Tacoma.

The men were brought here yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Van Horne and Earl Humphreys. The county deputy accompanied by Constable John Marsh, returned with the other car. The return trip in the Hudson was made from Roseburg in two hours and ten minutes.

The prisoners were heavily manacled, according to Van Horne, and no chances were taken, he said, on account of the four men riding in the rear of the car while he was driving and Humphreys rode by his side on the front seat.

DR. HAAS FOULY SLAIN

LITERALLY BUTCHERED DURING RUD OUTBREAK

(By The Associated Press)

FRANKFORT, July 24.—Dr. Haas, the public prosecutor, who was killed during communal disturbances here yesterday was literally butchered by the mob whose leaders dragged him from his home. He was first hauled through the streets until he was unconscious. The rioters then stood him against a lamp post where he was beaten across the head and face with iron rods and clubs and pelted with stones until death came.

The mob also attempted to invade the hotel Frankforterhof, but was repulsed by reinforcements of police.

The authorities believe Dr. Haas' death was instigated by criminals whom he had prosecuted, as the ringleader, who dragged him from the house, was heard to shout: "Old man, I know you!"

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION MAY ENTER UNIVERSITY

Synod Committee to Start
\$250,000 Fund

GENERAL BOARD TO HELP

Presbyterians to Meet in Eugene
Again Next Year; Thanks
of Synod Expressed

Steps toward the establishment of chairs of religious instruction in the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college were taken here yesterday by the Presbyterian synod of Oregon. A committee headed by Rev. Dr. Harold L. Bowman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland, was appointed to organize the raising of a fund of \$250,000 to cover the expense attending the establishment of such chairs.

Co-operation of the general board of education of the Presbyterian church in this matter is indicated by the inclusion on the committee of two members of the board, Dr. E. P. Hill, one of them its secretary, formerly pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland.

Chairman Committee Named

The synod, in its closing session yesterday morning, also directed the appointment of a committee to canvass for the necessary funds to put Albany college, which is under the jurisdiction of the synod of Oregon, on the basis of a self-help institution, with industries under its control and the employment of students, who shall thus pay all or part of their way through the institution.

Hereafter, the synod decided, every member of each Presbyterian church in the state will be asked to contribute 12 cents toward a fund for the payment of synod expenses, including members' mileage.

Thompson Stated Clerk

Dr. D. A. Thompson of Portland, who has been acting as stated clerk during the session just closed, taking the place of Dr. John A. Townsend, who died shortly after the close of last year's sessions, was elected permanent stated clerk.

Next year's session, it was decided, will be held on the University of Oregon campus, at a date to be fixed later. Resolutions of thanks to the university authorities and to the officials of the Central Presbyterian church were unanimously passed.

HOME OF MARK TWAIN IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

AUTHOR SPENT LAST DAYS IN
PICTURESQUE VILLA

It Was Here That Author Spent
Most Happy Days and Ex-
perienced Deepest Sorrows

REDDING, Conn., July 25.—Stonefield, the home of Samuel Clemens (Mark Twain), in the closing years of his life, a picturesque villa on a ridge in this town, was burned early today. It was unoccupied for many years after Mr. Clemens' death and was bought last December by Mrs. Margaret E. Givens of New York.

The home was built to carry out the ideas and wishes of Mr. Clemens and with the other buildings comprised a country estate.

In this home Mark Twain spent his last years and as he expressed it experienced some of the deepest sorrows of his life, as well as some of his happiest days. Here his younger daughter, Janet, met a tragic death.

In Stonefield Mr. Clemens lay ill for a long time and from it his body was borne to its last resting place. After a visit to Stonefield, William Dean Howells wrote of Mark Twain in his home: "He showed his absolute content with his home. Truly he loved the place."

The place was originally valued at \$175,000.

HUNGARY AID ESPOUSED

SPECIAL APPEAL TO FRANCE
IS ADVISED BY BRITAIN

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, July 25.—Lord Curzon, the foreign secretary, when questioned in the house of lords today about the serious financial condition of Hungary, announced that the British government had advised a special appeal in this connection to France. He was more than hopeful, he said, that the approaching meeting of the little entente would find Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Roumania ready to consent that Hungary should raise a loan, subject to the necessary conditions and guarantees.

The British government, he continued, was anxious to prevent the financial collapse of Hungary with its incalculable consequences and was convinced that no financial aid on a sufficient scale could be obtained except under a scheme supported by the league of nations.

LAW EVASION DEPLORED

SHERIFFS AND POLICE RAP
"REFORMERS" PLAINTS

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 25.—"Maudlin sentiment of 'would be' reformers" was condemned at last night's session of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police convention here, when law enforcement officers were a unit in declaring that laxity shown in the punishment of criminals in Canada and the United States was undoing the work of the police and making it difficult for them to protect society.

Case after case was instanced by police chiefs and sheriffs in which men who had been arrested for crimes of violence had been released on parole after serving only a small fraction of the time to which they had been sentenced and numerous instances were cited in which the paroled criminals had returned to crime.

Captain Duncan Matheson of San Francisco declared that in the United States homicides and robberies had increased to such an extent that the country had gone back to the condition Europe was in 85 years ago.
