DAILY MARKET REPORT

OHOREON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—There is a very active market for butter here; both cubes and prints being quoted strong at full prices, quality considered. There is too much offgrade stuff being churned at this time, creating an adverse situation in anything except the highest score offerings.

Demand for 92 score butter continues much in excess of offerings; in fact reports indicate that slight premiums are available for top quality butter. One of the leading local creameries reports that little butter is now scoring as extra and it is impossible to secure sufficient of this grade to fill orders. All markets along the entire slope are filled with offgrade butter; therefore such supplies are finding only sharply shaded quotations where a movement is possible.

EGG SITUATION IS FIRMER
All through the egg trade a firmer tone is shown locally as a result of further advance in the California price. Demand from the South is again quite liberal.

CHICKEN DEMAND IS VERY GOOD
All chickens are showing an excellent demand along the wholesale way with light hens at 15c and heavy stock at 23c generally. Broilers of all classes are in demand at a similar price. Spring ducks continue to show neglect.

VEAL PRICES ARE ADVANCED
Due to lack of offerings of volume, the market for country-killed calves is showing a further advance here for tops, with sales at 15 to 15 1/2c generally. Offgrade stuff is finding less call. Hogs in demand.

APRICOT SEASON IS ENDING
Estimates indicate that fully 75 per cent of the apricots of The Dalles section have already been shipped. No additional carloads are likely. Market is showing a somewhat steeper tone.

TOMATOES CONTINUE SCARCE
Tomato offerings from Columbia river points continue scarce, although the volume is somewhat increased over recent days. Sales along the wholesale way are from \$1.75 to \$2.00 per box generally. Few ripe lots available. Additional reports indicate that over half of the crop has been ruined by blight in the entire district.

PEACH PRICES UNDER PRESSURE
While there is an excellent demand for peaches, offerings from California on consignment, or at very low prices, are so heavy that accumulations are shown. Sales of California peaches generally at \$1.00 to \$1.10, with fancy large sizes at \$1.15 to \$1.25, while Oregon stock sells at 75c to 90c for the bulk of the good stuff, while only selections bring as high as \$1.00.

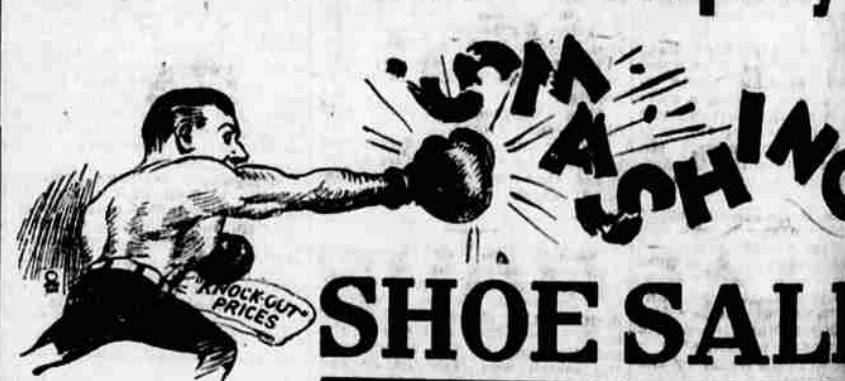
