Many states send tourists
New Nash performs well
Traveler tells heat tales
Oregon held ideal homeland

The tourist season is now at its height, states Superintendent I. H. Parker, and last night cars from every section of the country were registered. Travelers from Florida, from New York, Canada and Mexico, and even Hawaii, are common now, and it is highly probable that many Oregon cars are also registered at auto camps in those states.

Like residents of Eugene, the tourists turned out yesterday morning to greet the President, and were likewise disappointed. "But we'll catch up with him in California," said one party, "and then we'll make him apologize."

Driving a brand new Nash, so new that his license plates have not arrived yet, H. C. Hawkins reports a perfect journey out from Kansas City, Missouri. Mr. Hawkins and family were joined at Portland by his brother, L. W. Hawkins, and the two cars are now headed for the alleged wonders of California. L. W. will also accompany his brother back to Kansas City, and then the two will drive out again next summer to stay.

The heat of Laramie, Wyoming, is a favorite topic with M. P. Cowell, who says that it is so hot there that when a car starts a jack rabbit, they both walk. 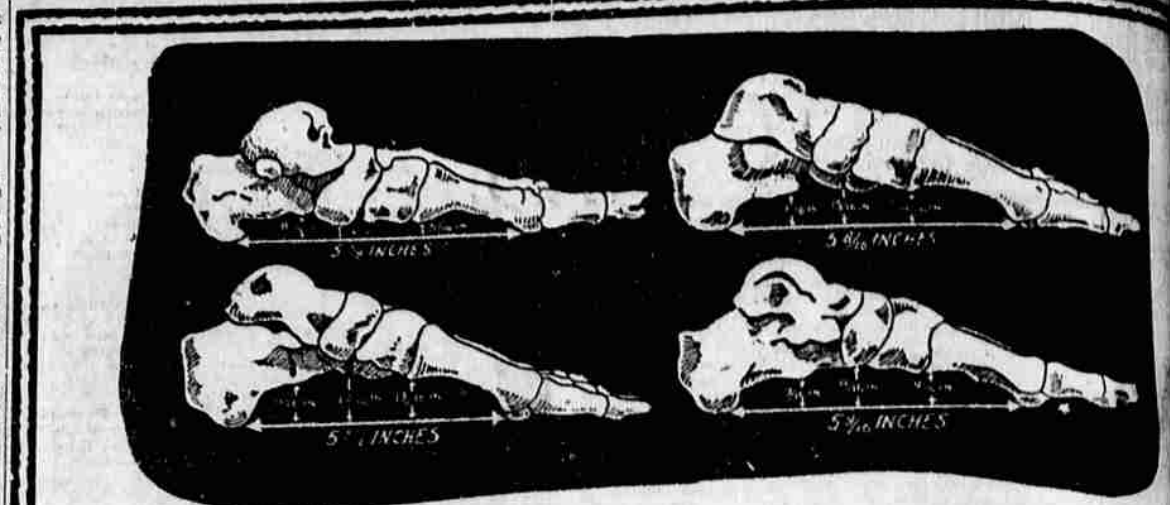

SCAPA FLOW HULKS TO BE SALVAGED AND SOLD

SCUTTLED GERMAN FLEET TO BE RAISED, JUNKED

Private Company Said Already to Have Found Market for Hulks of War Craft

(Correspondence of Associated Press)
LONDON, July 28.—The German fleet scuttled at Scapa Flow in June, 1919, is to be raised, cut up, and sold for junk. The admiralty has signed a contract with a private company which has purchased part of the sunken ships, and will start operations at once to raise them.

The company is said already to have found a market for the hulks. If the operations are successful, a contract will be signed for the remaining section, which includes the largest of the ships.

The vessels sunk comprise 10 battleships, 5 battle cruisers and 23 destroyers, their total tonnage being about 416,000. The contract already agreed to covers 20 destroyers and one of the battle cruisers.

The vessels were sunk by their crews opening all the sea cocks and flooding the ships. This will, however, make the work of the salvagers much easier, as it is planned to shut the sea cocks and pump the water out of the holds.
