FLOODS DRIVE HUNDREDS FROM MARYLAND HOMES

CLOUDBURSTS AND THUNDERSTORMS CAUSE HAVOC

Toll of Rising Water to Run Into Millions; Bridges, Farm Property Are Washed Away

BALTIMORE, Md., July 30.—Cloudbursts and a series of terrific thunderstorms, sweeping the counties of western Maryland, caused the Potomac river to overflow its banks late today, sweeping buildings and bridges before it, driving hundreds of families from their homes and causing damage that will run into millions of dollars.

As far as is known no lives were lost.

The flood, the most disastrous since the Potomac overflowed its banks in 1888 and took a toll of 38 lives in the vicinity of Ellicott City, ran highest at Sykesville, Ellicott City and other places between these places and the river's mouth.

In addition to the families that were forced to abandon their homes, other who sought refuge on upper floors had to be rescued by neighbors. Town after town was plunged into darkness and cut off from all communication. Bridges were carried away or inundated by the rapidly rising torrent.

Barns and livestock were swept away in the swiftly flowing current. Mills and power plants were flooded and their machinery was wrecked. Sections of railroad tracks were washed away.

MILL AND SHIP WAY BURN

FIRE LOSS AT ST. HELENS IS ESTIMATED AT \$125,000

ST. HELENS, Ore., July 30.—Fire which late last night destroyed the mill of the St. Helens Tie and Timber company, on Sauvie island, near here, also burned one of the ways and one of the sheds of the St. Helens Shipbuilding company, before being brought under control. The loss to the mill, including 300,000 feet of cut lumber which burned, was estimated between \$120,000 and \$125,000, and the shipbuilding company's loss was placed between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

The fire was discovered about 11 o'clock last night in the mill, which had been closed down temporarily Friday night. The Charles H. McCormick interest, which controlled the destroyed property, suffered loss of a mill at St. Helens by fire April 23.

REDWOOD ROAD BOOSTED

IMPROVEMENT OF OREGON'S SHARE IS URGED

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—Request that the state highway commission begin active work on the Redwood highway, between Grants Pass, Oregon, and Crescent City, California, was made by a delegation of Josephine county men at a meeting of the commission here today. It was pointed out that California is spending \$475,000 improving the road towards the Oregon line. The matter was taken under advisement.

A delegation from Umatilla county asked that the commission declare in favor of the Dale-Ukiah loop of the Pendleton-John Day highway. Chairman William Duby said he could not promise off-hand what the commission would be able to do next year. Bids on several road projects were opened this afternoon.

FIRE IN COLUMBIA DISTRICT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—The first forest fire of the season in the mid-Columbia region was sighted last night on a promontory at the confluence of the Little White Salmon and Columbia rivers, in Skamania county, Washington. The fire had apparently burned out this morning.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAIL AND WATER RATE IS CUT

Drop 14 Per Cent From New York to Pacific Coast

DECISION IS PROTESTED

Reduction Is Sought to Meet the Growing Competition From Panama Canal

WASHINGTON, July 30.—A qualified permission to reduce freight rates from New York city to the Pacific coast section by about 14 per cent on shipments routed via boat to Texas ports and thence by rail over the Sunset-Gulf route, was given the Southern Pacific railroad system by the Interstate commerce commission.

Though the commission held that the new schedule filed by the Southern Pacific in 1922 providing reductions on commodities were in part unlawful, the carrier was authorized to revise the schedule and put the reductions into effect on September 1. The rates have been suspended since November upon the protest of continental railroads and of producers and shippers in the middle west.

Under today's decision the Southern Pacific is authorized to make its rail and water rates from New York to the southwest territory and the Pacific coast equivalent to the rates which now are in effect from Chicago to the same destinations.

The Southern Pacific sought the reductions in order to meet the growing competition of the Panama canal water route in inter-coastal traffic. Shippers and producers from the middle west complained that the reductions would give their competitors on the east coast an advantage in trade and the other transcontinental railroads protested that the Southern Pacific reductions might force them to make similar cuts which would reduce earnings on trans-continental business unjustifiably.

showed no hesitancy in declaring that the most threatening complications was the oedematous condition of the lungs, which made its appearance during the afternoon. He announced that X-ray photographs had been taken with the aid of which he hoped to be able to ascertain by morning or some time tomorrow whether there might be an inflammation of a grave nature.

Running Handicapped Machine

"The ability is the condition with which we now have to contend and the possible implication of other organs none of which is safe from attack under such circumstances."

At the present time, General Sawyer said, there is in progress a battle between the resistive forces of the patient, which, he said, had been weakened as a result of the physical exertion which attended his travels, and the attacking forces which grew out of the original ptomaine poisoning.

General Sawyer said that the situation might be summarized by saying that the "President" had the predisposition to resist the attacking forces, then the exciting cause (ptomaine poisoning) and is now handicapped in an effort to throw off complications which may have and may continue to arise.

The problem at this time, said General Sawyer, is to get the machine strengthened so that it will have power to resist the attacks being made upon it. He added that it was impossible to say when that stage in the case would be reached.

Inflammation May Arise

Asked about the possibility of pneumonia resulting from the oedematous condition of the lungs, the physician said that was not a liability in the case, explaining that pneumonia is a result of the activity within the body of a micro-organism. There might arise an inflammation which would be just as serious as pneumonia, he added.

Explaining the increased pulse noted in the bulletin tonight, General Sawyer asserted that all the complications at present discovered united in increasing the strain upon the patient's heart.

"When his heart is beating 50 above normal," he said, "it can be readily seen that the situation is serious."

Dr. Sawyer declared there was no intention or consideration being given to removal of the President to any hospital in San Francisco or to any other city.

"We are as well equipped to take care of Mr. Harding right here in this hotel and in this city as we would be anywhere in the world," he asserted.

Harding Has Nothing to Conceal

The President continues to remain cheerful, General Sawyer said, and then illustrated by saying:

"This afternoon the five of us went into his room and I said: 'Mr. President, we would like to make an X-ray of your chest.' He replied: 'Come on, I have nothing to conceal.'"

Mrs. Harding was described by Dr. Sawyer as the sort of woman "who is best under fire."

"She knows everything," he continued. "I have given her every detail in the case of the President, just as I did when she herself was ill. She stood this very well and is not afraid."

As a measure of precaution, oxygen tanks were brought into the hotel late tonight, but physicians said the need for that administration had not appeared at
