Dr. Holten B. Allen has been arrested in Los Angeles, Cal., on an indictment found in Sabot, Va., charging violation of the Mann law after he had taken Mrs. Faidith Allen, 17, from the South to his "Mountain School," in Virginia. The authorities are seeking information as to the whereabouts of the 57 other "daughters" Allen is said to have taken to Pittsburgh, Pa., from his "Mountain School." Allen is said to have received \$200,000 subscriptions from wealthy people for the support of his alleged school. He described himself as leader of a movement to uplift the poorer white children of the mountains of North Carolina.
