The case will be appealed to the supreme court, but will not be passed upon until the court returns from its vacation which will be during the month of August. REPORT ON LANE COUNTY SCHOOLS FOR YEAR MADE

Annual Enrollment Figures
Are Announced

REGISTRATION IS 11,921

Figures Compiled Show Total
Number of Pupils in Institutions
and Other Data on System

Statistics on the Lane county school system for the past year are contained in the annual report prepared under the direction of E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. The report shows that a total of 10,166 pupils in the high schools and grade schools were enrolled during the past year. The figures record that 5049 boys and 5117 girls were registered in Lane county schools. The reports on the county high schools show 567 boys enrolled and 590 girls, total of 1157. The grade school report shows 3475 boys and 3587 girls registered in the school district where they reside and 507 boys and 540 girls enrolled in districts not their home. The total grade school enrollment is 8309.

The following is the registration by grades, the first enrollment figure being boys: First grade, 560, 514, total 1074; second, 467, 419, total 886; third, 441, 425, total 866; fourth, 463, 434, total 897; fifth, 451, 462, total 913; sixth, 425, 409, total 834; seventh, 443, 465, total 908; eighth, 422, 460, total 882. The following are the figures on the four high school years: First year, 319, 312, total 631; second year, 214, 277, total 491; third year, 171, 237, total 408; fourth year, 163, 164, total 327.

Report on Staff Made

The report on the number of teachers employed during the year shows a total of 414. The high school teachers number 92—thirty-two men and 60 women. The grade school staff numbered 262—forty-three men and 219 women. The figures on private and parochial schools show three schools, two elementary and one secondary. Thirteen teachers are employed, one man in the secondary school and seven women in the elementary schools and five women in the secondary school. Twenty-six pupils were enrolled during the year. The report for the elementary schools shows 63 boys and 62 girls. The registration for the secondary schools show 13 boys and 27 girls. The average number of months taught are nine plus, for the elementary schools and nine and one-half for the secondary schools.

Other figures contained in the annual report are: Number of school districts, 193; number of rooms in operation, 290; union high school in operation, 8; district high schools, 22; standard rural and village schools, 17; graduates of high school, boys 163, girls 166; pupils completing the eighth grade, 641; two-room schools, 30; local meetings held, 150; new school houses during the year, 4; average number of days taught during year, 134.5; districts having nine months of school, 46; number of school houses, 209; teachers in one-room buildings, 136; number of principals, 52; number of assistant teachers, 183; average monthly salary in one-room buildings, \$97.50; average monthly salary of principals, \$142.86; total number library books on hand, 50,975; books added during year, 971.

Receipts Are Listed

The following report on receipts is made: From county fund, \$214,999.17; from county school fund, \$123,299.42; from state school fund, \$21,176.95; state and federal funds for vocational education, \$1360.68; grade school tuition, \$3014.89; for high school tuition, \$25,622.50; from state bonds, \$24,250; for library other than county library tax, \$35; received from all other sources, \$22,296.67.

BUILDING PLANS ACTIVE

PERMITS FOR PAST MONTH
HERE TOTAL \$161,150Improvements in City For July
Almost Double Cost of Those
For the Previous Period

Building permits granted during the month of July in Eugene show an estimated cost of \$161,150, according to the report of W. H. Alexander, inspector of buildings. This building activity is almost double the amount contained in the building permit report for the month of June. Three large permits are included in the report for July. A permit for \$40,000 was issued to F. L. Chambers for the remodeling of the upper floors of the Hampton building. Marion McClain was granted a permit for a building to cost \$25,000 at Thirteenth avenue and Kincaid street, and the University of Oregon received a permit for the construction of the new heating plant at an estimated cost of \$25,000. The total receipts at the office of the building inspector for the past month are \$385.90. Building permits total \$158,750; plumbing permits, \$180; and electrical permits, \$87.15. Thirty-six building permits total \$158,750; plumbing permits, \$180; and electrical permits, \$87.15. The receipts of the building inspector's office for June were \$273.30. The building permits for June were for an estimated cost of \$90,000. The July permits for 1922 totaled \$80,330.

Rev. E. L. Winterberger, who was in Alaska in charge of work for the Presbyterian church, will preach at Deadwood church Sunday. Rev. and Mrs. Winterberger are living on a small place on the River road and will attend university here this fall.

SPARKS LEAVES EUGENE

ESPEE DISTRICT AGENT TO
MERCED, CALIFORNIAL. L. Graham of Corvallis to Assume
Management of District Office Here

L. T. Sparks, for three years district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific here, left Eugene last night to assume a similar position at Merced, Cal. Mr. Sparks will remain in Eugene for about 10 days, when he will leave to join his husband, L. L. Graham, formerly station agent at Corvallis, is expected here tomorrow to take over the duties of district agent of the Eugene division. While a resident of Eugene, Mr. Sparks has efficiently handled the business of his company, which covers a district extending over practically all of southern Oregon. As a community man he has shown active interest in local affairs, being elected three successive times to the board of directors of the Eugene chamber of commerce. Mr. Sparks began his work with the railroad company in 1900 and has held a number of important positions. He came to Eugene from the Imperial valley in California, where he was district freight and passenger agent. He had much to do with the development of that section. Mr. Sparks specializes in development and extension work in the railroad organization.

Mr. Graham, who comes to take charge of the district office here, has for the past ten years been in charge of the Southern Pacific office at Corvallis. He will assume control on his arrival and will have headquarters in the downtown office on Willamette street near Sixth avenue.

TEMPERATURE FOR JULY NORMAL, OBSERVER SAYS

Average About Equals That
For Six-Year Period

WEATHER IS CLOUDY

Only Eight Clear Days Recorded
Which Is Far Below Records of
Past Decade, Is Report

Normal temperature prevailed in Eugene during the month of July, is the report of Lee Goetsch, local weather observer, who states that the mean temperature for this vicinity was just a fraction above the mean for the past six years. The maximum temperature registered for the month was July 14 when the mercury reached 91 degrees. The minimum was 48 degrees recorded on July 26 and 31.

Total precipitation for the month was 1.06 inches. Mean temperature for July was 65.3 degrees. The stage of the river is one foot above the average for the past five years. The mean for this period is 1 foot 7 inches, the average for the past month is 2 feet 7 inches. The precipitation was .93 inches above normal for a six-year period.

Unusually cloudy weather prevailed during the past month according to a compilation of the reports of the past 10 years, the local observer reports. Only eight clear days were recorded, 14 days were partly cloudy and nine were cloudy, according to the report.

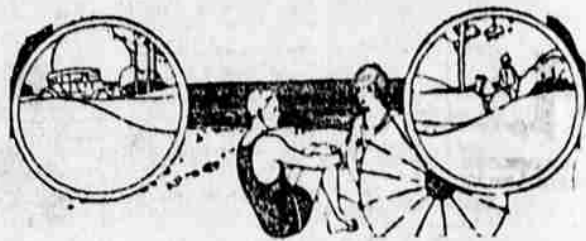
