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STATE FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR LANE SCHOOL WORK

Annual Allotment Is Made
For County System

TOTAL AMOUNT \$20,623

Finances Are to Be Distributed on Basis of Number of Children Between 4 and 21 Years

Lane county will receive \$20,623.33 as its share of the distribution of the interest on the irrevocable school fund, according to the report received from the Oregon state land board. A total of \$1,921 children between the ages of four and 21 years reside in Lane county and it is on this basis that the state fund is annually allotted to the various counties. This year's allotment to Lane is the largest in the history of the fund.

The total fund to be distributed by the state amounts to \$400,299.21, and is allotted on a per capita basis of \$1.71 for each child of school age. A total of 231,387 children of school age are registered in the state, according to the report from Salem.

Multnomah county leads in the number of children and the amount of the state fund received. Multnomah is second, Clackamas county is third and Lane county fourth.

No water power development in the near future is looked for as word from Salem is that the filing is apparently for speculative purposes.

Seven water power applications were filed with the state officials, four of them being for waters in Marion and Linn counties and one on the Coquille river.

NEWS OF HARDING DEATH

SWEEPS OVER COUNTRY

PRESIDENTIAL FLAG AT ONCE

TO HALF MAST

Hotel Attaches Stop Dinner Dance and Gaily Clad Revelers Gather Wraps and Depart

PRESIDENTIAL HEADQUARTERS, PALACE HOTEL, SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—The news of President Harding's death swept through his hotel and out of San Francisco with almost electrical suddenness. Hotel officials, among the first to whom word of the tragic event was given, immediately had the great blue presidential flag with its gold seal of the United States, hauled down and then raised again to half mast.

A minute or two later, an assistant manager rushed into the Rose-bowl room, where a dinner dance was in progress, raised a hand and stopped the orchestra's playing. Announcement of the death of the executive followed and the dancers, their gay dress and contrast to their expressions of gravity, faded into little groups, obtained their wraps and departed.

The news passed from lip to lip. Some guests, more curious than their fellows, gathered in groups at the ends of the corridors leading to the presidential rooms and stared down the hallways at the screens which shut off view of the suite where the twenty-ninth president of the United States lay silent in death.

Cabinet officers, Voice Condolences. Cabinet officers, headed by Secretary Hoover of the commerce department, hastened up and down the hall, hastening to express their condolences to Mrs. Harding or hurrying back for hasty conferences among themselves or with other government officials.

Lieutenant Commander Joel T. Boone, assistant physician to the president, hurried up from downtown, where a newspaper man had found him in response to Mrs. Harding's frantic appeals.

Rumors began to fly about, each wilder than its predecessor and all denied soon after by official bulletins which were issued as rapidly as the executive officials could ascertain the facts and type them on paper to a steadily increasing crowd of newspaper men which thronged the corridors congested with the press.

The shock of the president's death struck the city with dumbness. Newspapers whose entire front pages were devoted to half a dozen words telling of the news, which had been rushed from the press too fast for type to a picture and the phrase, "Harding dead," circulated like wildfire through the downtown districts and even far out into the residential streets a few minutes after the official bulletin announcing the death of President Harding.

Telephone Calls Pour In. Even before the report of the death, hundreds of calls and the telephone switchboard at the hotel became jammed with outgoing official calls and incoming inquiries for information concerning the report.

National, state and party officials came hurrying to the hotel in numbers and gathered for conferences in eighth floor rooms or corridors near the presidential suite to discuss what had been the news, which had been rushed from the press too fast for type to a picture and the phrase, "Harding dead," circulated like wildfire through the downtown districts and even far out into the residential streets a few minutes after the official bulletin announcing the death of President Harding.

Everyone who came to the presidential suite was besieged with questions, official, newspaper and merely curious. Largely such shocking suddenness that comparative few of its details had been noted.

DEATH WORD BY RADIO

SEVERAL EUGENE STATIONS RECEIVE TRAGIC NEWS

News of the death of President Harding at 2:48 p. m. today was picked up here last evening at the local receiving station of George at Turner, Twentieth avenue and Friendly street. The news of the passing of the chief executive was broadcasted from stations both at Los Angeles and San Francisco, and all other programs were immediately stopped in order to have the report sent out.

Several other owners of radio receiving sets in this city reported to the office of the Morning Register last night that practically all broadcasting stations were devoting their service to the spreading of the tragic news from San Francisco.

Phantom Boze Ship Seen. SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Aug. 2.—Officers along the coast have been warned that a phantom boat which has been operating in this vicinity for some time has just landed a cargo of 1700 cases of liquor, valued at about \$161,000, part of which is said to have been brought to this city. This is the second shipment that this vessel has landed within three weeks. It is supposed that it was brought from Mexico. It is supposed that the whiskey is moved up and down the coast in automobiles.

EDWARD L. BRODIE HERE WHEN PRESIDENT PASSES

Minister to Siam Learns of Chief's Death

KEENSORROW EXPRESSED

Appointee of Nation's Leader to Post in the Orient. Eulogizes Harding in Statement

Edward L. Brodie, American minister to the kingdom of Siam, was a Eugene visitor yesterday and called at the Morning Register office last night to obtain the particulars in reference to the death of President Harding, who appointed Mr. Brodie as the envoy to Siam from the United States in 1921. Mr. Brodie, who is home on a leave of absence, was deeply shocked to learn of the President's sudden death, and said he had telegraphed to George Christian, the secretary to the President, only Wednesday, expressing his gratification at the reports of the improvement in the President's condition.

President Is Lauded. "We have never had in recent years," said Mr. Brodie, "such a kindly man for our chief executive as Mr. Harding. I recall that when I called on him at the White House two years ago just before his departure for the Orient, I was greatly impressed by his simple bearing. He did not know me intimately, yet he received me as an old friend and I was touched by his courtesy."

"Mr. Harding has not been a spectacular President, but he was sincere, courageous and a great American. His conception of the limitation of a conference and the treaties which came out of that gathering will stand out as one of the greatest diplomatic victories of our time."

with administrative affairs sometimes has brought upon him considerable pressure and some embarrassment from senators and others who sought to obtain information regarding his concerning developments at the White House, or to have placed before the President particular views on pending issues. He usually has remained reticent under these trying conditions, however, refusing to discuss cabinet meetings or to act as a go-between for those interested in having their views presented to the President.

Brief Sketch of Coolidge. President Coolidge was born on Independence day, 1872, in Plymouth, a remote country village in the hills of Vermont, the son of John C. and Victoria J. (Moore) Coolidge. Descended from John and Mary Coolidge, who had settled in Waterbury, Mass., about 1630, his ancestry runs through a long line of farmers who lived in Massachusetts until the president's great-grandfather moved from a grant into Vermont. Here the Coolidge family thrived through generations till the soil, raised livestock, produced maple syrup and sugar and were among the persons of influence in their community.

After attending the ungraded country school in Plymouth the future president continued his studies at Black River academy in Ludlow, Vt., where he was graduated at St. Johnsbury. From there he went to Amherst college, where his career was marked with persistence and frugality. He paid \$3 a week for his board because he could not find a cheaper lodging house. He was a keen student and a great reader of books, especially those on history and government.

Only in a modest way did he enter into college activities. He took no active part in sports.

In his senior year, in open competition with students in all colleges, he won the first prize for the best essay on the causes of the Revolutionary war. In 1895, he was graduated and, not having money enough to go to law school, he obtained employment in the office of Judge Hammond, one of the leading lawyers of the state.

He worked for his education and, in 1897, he was admitted to the study of law, with the result that in 20 months he was admitted to the bar. He has continued since then to practice law in Northampton.

Marriage Goodhue. On October 4, 1895 he married Miss Grace A. Goodhue of Burlington, Vt., making a home for his bride in a two-family apartment house which they still occupy in Northampton. He has two sons, John and Calvin, Jr. He was a member of the Northampton city council and in 1900 and 1901 was city solicitor. In 1904 he was appointed county clerk, but declined the nomination to succeed himself. In 1907 and 1908 he served Northampton as its representative to the general court and in 1910 and 1911 was mayor of the city.

He was elected state senator in 1912 and served in that capacity during the three following years, being president of the senate in 1914 and 1915. A 42-word acceptance speech he made when re-elected president of the senate became a classic in Massachusetts statecraft. In this and in the speech of acceptance the preceding year he used two phrases which his friends regard as his creed, "Do the day's work," and "Be brief."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Manuel Herrick, former representative in congress from Oklahoma, renewed his request in court today for \$50,000 damages from Miss Ethelna Crane, his former stenographer, for breach of promise to marry him. He denied charges made by the young woman in her reply to his suit, including one that he promised a secret marriage in order that he might collect money from newspapers which afterwards commented on their relations.
