The service was held at 10 o'clock and was attended by a large number of citizens. The Rev. Mr. Dunham, pastor of the church, presided at the service. He spoke of the life of the late president and the great work he had done for his country. The service was a most impressive one and was well attended.

"Over half the divorces in the United States are caused by unhappiness in the dining room," declared Miss Agnes McKenna, nationally known art expert of Chicago, speaking at a luncheon given at the Christian church here Sunday. Miss McKenna has made a life study of color and their effects on personalities. She says it is her ambition to untwist the rainbow and bring down color in harmonious combinations, so that every home will have a perfect setting.

Signs were heard in approval of Mr. Harding's championship of right and the broader world principles of the Christian faith. At the evening service the First Christian church here was packed while men of all denominations gathered to hear the sermon by Rev. Charles H. Dunham, pastor of the First Baptist church, which denomination was that of the late president. Other Protestant ministers assisted in the services, the congregation singing being those which were favorites of Mr. Harding.

"Remember and imitate" were keynote words in Rev. Dunham's address. He stressed the humble origin of the fallen leader, of the fact that he had risen through paths which any man might pursue and having attained yet did not fail to exercise the humble qualities which were his beloved endowment. The speaker then paid tribute to his bravery in meeting problems which faced him on his accession to the presidential chair.

An actual, dominant Christianity was the text of several of Mr. Harding's last utterances, said Rev. Dunham, who quoted especially the late President's address to the Knights Templar at Los Angeles, an address prepared while Mr. Harding was sick in San Francisco and read by his secretary, Eugene C. Christian.

In conclusion the minister urged his audience to offer their prayers for the new president, remarking that no matter how great the loss the nation felt with the passing of the late president, the Republic would go on if it kept on God's side.

CHIEF FORESTER HERE

OFFICIAL TO INSPECT TRACTS RECENTLY SOLD

Lands Which Are to Be Logged Off Will Be Looked Over in Interests of Reforestation

To inspect tracts in the Cascade national forest district recently sold for cutting, Chief Forester Cecil is here from the Portland district headquarters. Several large tracts recently sold by the government including that of 685,000,000 feet purchased by the Western Lumber company, are to be inspected by the forest official. The visiting forester is particularly interested in the reforestation of the districts that are to be logged off and this aspect of the plan will be looked into.

Tracts that are being prepared for cutting are in addition to that of the Western Lumber company, the Davis-Weber company, Burnett Mill and Timber company and several other pole tracts. It is the belief of the forest official that natural growth will reforest the districts that have been sold for logging and that no expensive reforestation planting will be necessary.

Preparations for the cutting of the Western Lumber company tract are progressing and the new mill site has been named Westfir, according to N. F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade district, who has returned after a trip through that district. About 150 men are now at the tent city making ready for the operations, he stated.

Eugene showed its ability to win ball games Sunday on the fair grounds when it took the Harrisburg nine into camp the score being five to one. The game was devoid of thrills and save for one inning when the locals garnered four runs, the contest was a pitchers' battle with Holman for Eugene over Rowe, Harrisburg's moundman, having the edge in being able to better distribute his hits.

The game was a non-league affair, the Willamette Valley title having gone to Cottage Grove with the death of the organization, which had been looking toward oblivion for several weeks. The local lancers started the firing in the third, and incidentally although the bill went on for six more innings, Eugene's Beller and Knudsen each poked out a safety clutch for Eugene, whereupon Jones, local catcher, arose and whiffed the horseshoe for a three-bagger, scoring three men. He later tallied on a sacrifice and the game was on ice.

In the eighth Knudsen added another marker, while in the last inning Harrisburg saved themselves from a shutout when their first sacker, Keiso, tallied. Holman for the locals kept his hits, of which he allowed seven, nicely scattered; Rowe for the visitors allowed 19 safe singles, several scattered for Eugene by getting a safe swing each of his four times to bat.

bureau, city hospital, state insane asylum and St. Louis female hospital before coming to Portland in 1908. During his term in office Dr. Parrish fought the "flu" in 1918, 1919 and 1920. EXALTED RULER PAYS TRIBUTE TO DEAD BROTHER

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—A tribute to the late President Harding was paid today by James G. McFarland, grand exalted ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, of which organization President Harding was a member. "The nation mourns the loss of its splendid leader," said the circular mailed out today to the 1500 subordinate lodges of the Elks. "In our order the mystic hour of eleven will bring to us the memory of no more devoted or faithful brother than Warren G. Harding."

"His position of executive of our country, his earnest support and his abiding and expressed confidence in the influence and future of our order require a more fitting tribute than could possibly be expressed in Marion, Ohio, lodge No. 32, alone. Each subordinate lodge is directed to include in its proper order of business at the next regular meeting the services announcing the death of Brother Harding."

"His virtues and accomplishments will be written long upon our tablets of love and memory."

RETURN TO U. S. DESIRED

W. C. SPURGIN, IN MEXICO, IS READY TO FACE COURT

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—William C. Spurgin, fugitive president of the Michigan Avenue Trust company here, who fled to Mexico a few days before a bank examiner closed his institution on July 21, 1921, is reported to be begging for a chance to return to Chicago to face justice.

Spurgin, according to advices received at El Paso, Texas, from Mexico, is broke. He had boasted that he would wrest a fortune out of oil and mining fields in Mexico, return to Chicago and pay his \$1,500,000 shortage dollar for dollar.

The former bank president's employees are in mutiny, according to the reports. He is still surrounded by a ring of desperadoes, who, it is said, were his bodyguards when he carried at least \$50,000 on his person. But they are not his bodyguards any more, he is currently their captive.

Spurgin, El Paso reports say, owes these men money and they watch him jealously. He is afraid they will kill him.

LABORING MEN STRANDED

CONTRACTORS DEFAULT AT KLAMATH FALLS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 6.—About 70 former employees of Nettleton, Bruce and Eschback, Seattle contractors, are reported to the state labor department as being in destitute circumstances at Klamath Falls, Oregon, because of failure of the company to pay them when it threw up its contract of constructing the Strahorn railroad. C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, has received word from his deputy, W. H. Fitzgerald, at Klamath Falls, that the company owes the men an aggregate of about \$20,000, and that they are receiving assistance from the people of the company. It is said the men were induced to move to Klamath Falls with their families.

Convicted Workers Feted

OAKLAND, Aug. 6.—The Industrial Workers of the World who tomorrow will begin serving sentences of one to 14 years in the state penitentiary today were guests of honor at a luncheon in I. W. W. headquarters here. The honor guests were convicted in Sacramento of criminal syndicism and for the purpose of the Sacramento court recently was denied.

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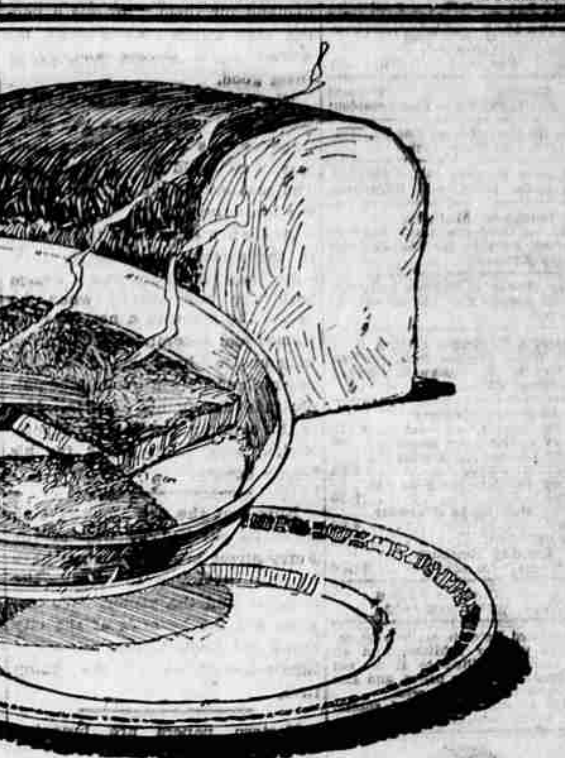
