LUMBER OUTPUT BETTER
FIGURES ON FOUR-YEAR PERIOD ARE COMPILED
Reports show that present production is almost 22 per cent above same period of 1922.

West Coast Lumbermen's association weekly reports on production, orders and shipments for the first thirty weeks of the past four years, are as follows:

From the above item it will be observed:

1—Production, thus far this year, has been 21.89 per cent greater than the same period for 1922; 103.43 per cent greater than in 1921, and 24.07 per cent greater than in the first 30 weeks of 1920.

2—Shipments, thus far this year, have been 24.53 per cent greater than in 1922; 107.77 per cent greater than in 1921, and 52.82 per cent greater than the first 30 weeks of 1920.

3—New business, thus far this year, has been 35.02 per cent greater than the same period in 1922; 96.94 per cent greater than in 1921, and 62.89 per cent greater than the first 30 weeks of 1920.

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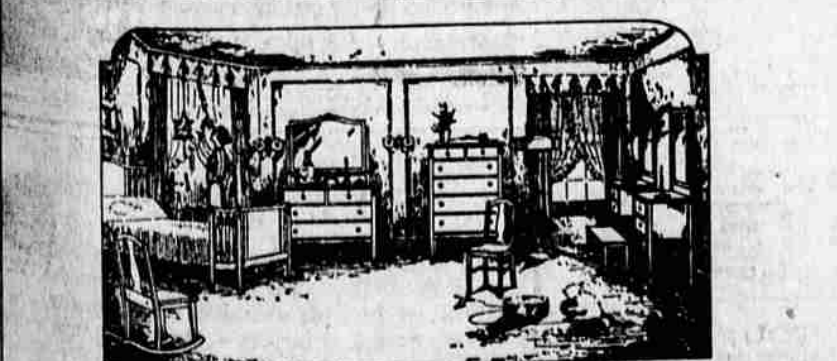
