U. S. SURVEY MAKES MAPS

**WILLAMETTE WATERSHED IS
FLOATED BY FIELD PARTIES**

Work on the preparation of a map of the Willamette watershed which is being done under the direction of three field parties connected with the United States geographical survey is being completed, according to N. P. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest, who reports that the government map which probably will be ready for distribution next spring will be a valuable aid to motor and pack parties who may make the trip through the federal domain.

An additional map of Diamond lake quadrangle is also being made and the two will cover practically all of the government district that annually draws many camping parties, according to the forest officials.

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COUNTY ROAD POLICIES

SUBJECT OF STATEMENT

Former Program of Court Is
Defended By Judge

COMPARISONS ARE MADE

Resignation of Abe Gilbert as Fore-
man of Machinery Results In
Reopening Question

Changes in the personnel of those handling the Lane county road improvement work which are pending as a result of the resignation of Abe Gilbert as machinery foreman, has again brought out questions as to the present policies of the county commissioners in the taking care of the county road activity. When the new county road was organized at the first of the year, sweeping changes were made including the abolition of the position of county road master, held by J. R. Meky, and the employment of Mr. Gilbert as machinery foreman, to work under the jurisdiction of the county commissioners.

Change Is Discussed
When questioned yesterday in regard to the resignation of Mr. Gilbert, Judge C. P. Barnard expressed regret at the illness of the county foreman which has led to his decision to retire from the county service. Judge Barnard said that Mr. Gilbert had done the best he could under the circumstances, but that he never could see any reason for taking him away from Clackamas county at a salary of \$200 a month, an advance of \$25 over what he was receiving, as it seemed his duties there were larger than here, where the county has been renting out a large part of its machinery and has another man employed at a salary of \$125 a month, who checks the time of the equipment.

The judge also points to the fact that the county is paying to Mr. Gilbert and Mr. Worden a sum within \$600 per year of the former paid Mr. Meky and Stanley Gregory, who were replaced when the new court was organized. There is no comparison of the duties involved, according to Judge Barnard, who states that the county roadmaster was responsible for the results obtained, and Mr. Gregory saw to the keeping of the county machinery in running order.

No Reflection Implied
"This statement in no way reflects on the ability of any of the men now employed in county road work, but is the result of following out a different system in handling these matters, and is mainly a defense of the former policy of the county court which was so strongly criticized," Judge Barnard states. Mr. Gilbert has submitted his resignation to take effect August 15 and, according to Commissioner Emmett Sharp, no arrangements have as yet been completed as to the filling of the vacancy.

SCHOOL ALLOTMENT LOW

COUNTY FUND FROM STATE LESS THAN USUAL

Basin of \$1.73 for Each Pupil Not
Up to Figure that Was Ex-
pected, Officials Report

Although Lane county will receive a total of \$20,623.33 as its share of the state fund for the irreducible school fund of the state this is below the amount that was expected, according to local school officials. The basis of \$1.73 for each child of school age in the county upon which the county funds are computed is the lowest in the state and expectations were that a basis of at least \$1.85 would be the figure for the present year.

Although exact figures are not available it is said that the basis of \$1.73 per capita is the lowest within a period of about 10 years. One year the basis was \$2.02, according to E. J. Moore, Lane county superintendent of schools. The state allotment for Lane county is to be sent to the county treasurer and according to the new law passed at the last session of the legislature the fund will be distributed to the various school districts the second Monday in October and will be placed in the custody of the local school officials.

The interest on the irreducible state school fund amounted this year to \$400,299.51 based on a total school age population in the state of 231,387.

PROPERTY DEED PENDING

NEGOTIATIONS UNDER WAY
FOR HILYARD STREET SITE

Gamma Phi Beta Sorority of Uni-
versity of Oregon Is Planning
New Student Home

Negotiations for the purchase of the property owned by Miss Ida Patterson on the east side of Hilyard street adjacent to the mill race are expected to be completed today when the Gamma Phi Beta sorority of the University of Oregon will acquire the site for the new home of the organization. Although no announcement has been made as to the amount involved in the transaction it is understood to be approximately \$10,000. According to the present plan the student organization will take possession of the property next June. The Hilyard street site is at present occupied by the University florists and it is understood that a new site for the greenhouse and office of the concern has been arranged for at Thirtieth avenue east and Patterson street. The property planned as a site for the Gamma Phi Beta home has a Hilyard street frontage of 140 feet and a depth of 200 feet with mill race frontage. Although no plans have been announced, those who have been instrumental in the handling of the deal, report that the property will be divided and space will be available for another student home on the lot.

The Gamma Phi Beta sorority is at present located at Thirtieth avenue east and Alder street, the organization holding a lease on the property.

LOCAL GUARD UNIT PAID

COMPANY C RECEIVES QUAR-
TERLY STATE FUND

Rifle Teams of Eugene Outfits
Plan to Leave for Clackamas
Rifle Meet August 15

Checks aggregating \$1156 were handed to members of Company C, 162nd infantry, pay for the last three months' period at the regular drill last night at the Eugene armory. Headquarters company received no pay due to the delay of the vouchers, but its usual average is about \$550.

Both local companies have reduced their representation of men at the state shoot at Clackamas to five, in line with orders received from regimental headquarters. A team captain and four men from each company will leave here August 15 and will take part in the meet which will begin August 16 and last until August 21. Indi-

vidual winners will be sent to the national shoot at Camp Perry, Ohio.

Pay for the guardsmen during the encampment at Camp Lewis which ended the first part of July, was received by the boys while in camp. Regular army pay with a bonus of 50 cents per day per soldier paid by the state, was received.

Ranks of both companies were depleted for drill last night due to many of the men being on vacations while others are out of the city for summer employment.

SAWMILL SUIT IS FILED

RECEIVER IS ASKED TO HAN-
DLE AFFAIRS OF FIRM

Suit was filed yesterday by Junius W. Jarvis against A. B. Loud, president of the Oregon Machinery company, and C. E. Ball, asking that a receiver be appointed to handle the affairs of the firm, recently formed to erect and operate a sawmill in Lane county. The plaintiff in his complaint states that the defendants have conspired to force him from the concern after the mill has been erected and made ready for operation. The plaintiff further claims that he was instrumental in the acquiring of the contract for about 4,000,000 feet of lumber that is to be cut by the firm, Williams and Bean represent the plaintiff in the action.

STOREY ROAD IS VACATED

PROPERTY OWNERS' PETITION
APPROVED BY COURT

By order of the Lane county court, the Storey boulevard in the College Crest district has been vacated, following a petition recently filed by property owners holding land adjacent to the route. The Storey boulevard is not used as a result of the completion of the new Lane highway, which parallels the route, the petition states. The route vacated is about one-half mile long and all property owners signed the petition to have the road closed. The proposition has been pending for some time, following the application of those interested.
