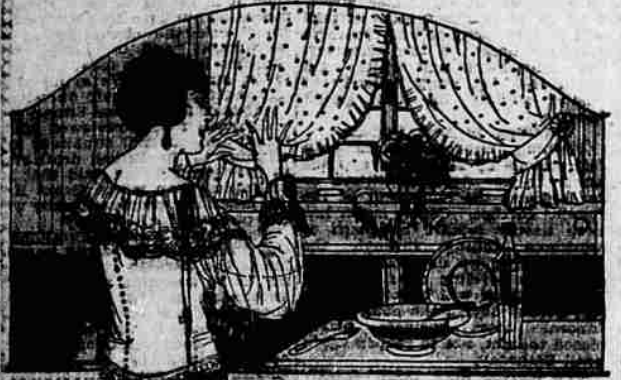
HARDING RITES PLANNED

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—Butter situation here is very strong. Advance in sight, but its carrying out depends upon the day's attitude of the California trade. Recent advance of 2¢ a pound at Seattle has stiffened the local situation to a very considerable degree. Eggs are generally cleared up at 30¢ 35¢ a pound and no difficulty experienced in securing the top for real quality. Centralizer offerings are quoted at 40¢, but there is practically none offering here as manufacturers continue to absorb practically their entire output in print.

ROG SITUATION HOLDS STEADY
Practically no change is shown in the rog market situation for the day. Local market is very active at full prices. Buyers for Eastern interests are keen seekers for supplies with as high as 30¢ paid for henries.

VEAL TRADING VERY LIBERAL
Very good situation regarding price remains in the country-killed calf market here, with prices standing very close around the extreme mark. Scarcity of offerings and good demand continues for bogs.

FIRST NECTARINES ARE HERE
First nectarines of the season are here from the Deschutes farm, Bollen & Co. reporting in the initial arrivals, which were quoted around \$2 per crate of four baskets. Very fancy quality.

FRESH BEEF PRICES ARE OFF
All through the beef market packers have recently lowered their prices. No. 1 steer is now 13 1-2¢ pound, with No. 1 heifers at 11¢. Hogs are held by packers at 13 1-2¢ pound generally.

TOMATO PRICES ARE LOWER
Further lowering of tomato prices is shown here with \$1.50¢ to \$1.85 the extreme in small lots. No. 2 stock is at \$1.25¢. Reports continue to tell of a closing season along the Columbia river.
