SEASON WAITS ON SUPREME COURT ACTION

action Would Start Hunting August 20

BOARD TO MEET MONDAY

Member of State Commission, Thinks Special Interests Behind Court Move

Decision is taken soon by the supreme court, an injunction recently granted in the Maternity court will prevail, thus ending the deer season August 20. The information given out today by Ben Dorris, member of the state commission, who is expected to return for Portland, where he will attend the monthly meeting of the board next Monday.

repealed from the circuit court, before time set by the statute for the season to open. Dorris, who took office when the new board went in the first of July, can see no justification for the action other than the fact that a number of Salem professional men are asking special privileges to enable them to spend their vacation hunting. Carrying this reasoning further, says Dorris would compel the same commission to open the season any time to any vacationist.

Statute Passed in 1923
The statute law of 1923 was supposed to confer on the commission power to act the season limits. The proponents of the injunction contend that the commission may totally close the season, but that it cannot shorten it from the limits prescribed in the recent law.

After the Monday meeting the members of the fish and game board will start on a two weeks' tour of inspection of the majority of the game farms and fish hatcheries throughout the state. They will proceed from Portland up the valley, going to the farm near Silverton, the one at Corvallis and the farm near Eugene. They will then visit the McKenzie hatcheries and continue down to Diamond Lake and to the Klamath Falls country, returning through Central Oregon.

Dorris reports that more fish have been hatched this year than at any previous season, 35,000, 10 trout eggs having been purchased from China, amounting to the number of 10,000 have also been hatched.

Just how generally prevalent these birds are this season is not known, although Malheur county has so many of the pheasants that their season has been lengthened for several weeks to cut down the number in the county.

Fish Storage Space Lacking
The chief difficulty now connected with the trout hatching is finding adequate places for storage. Many of the fish are being planted before they have attained as long a length as is desirable, due to the fact that there is lacking a place in which to mature them.

The present commission simply continues action of the former commission in setting the game limits, says Dorris. The deer season was in reality determined by the old board, and with all the additional no special reason for altering its predecessor's policy, refused to rescind the previous action.

NEW DISTRICT DESIRED

BOUNDARY BOARD WILL TAKE ACTION ON PETITION

Swishome Residents Request That School Divisions Be Changed in Western Lane County

Action on the petition for the creation of a new school district in western Lane in the Swishome section will be taken at a meeting of the Lane county boundary board called for Monday, September 10, according to announcement of the county school officials. The proposed district will be composed of parts of the present Madeline district number 22 and the Richardson district number 102. For the making of a new school district at least 10 children of school age are required as residents in the district proposed, school officials report.

The new Fox logging camp and sawmill that are expected to bring several families into the vicinity where the new district is desired are the reasons advanced for the need of the new school by those who are promoting the plans. The boundary board will also consider applications from high school students who may desire to attend another standard high school than the one established in the district where they reside. This will probably be the last session of the boundary board before the opening of the county schools in September, according to Superintendent E. J. Moore. The boundary board is composed of the county court and Superintendent Moore.

LUMBER REPORT GIVEN

PRODUCTION IS 20 PER CENT ABOVE NORMAL

Reports of the West Coast Association For Week of August 4 Shows Business Better

One hundred and thirty-one mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending August 4th, manufactured 104,925,847 feet of lumber; sold 95,398,381 feet and shipped 97,948,768 feet.

Production for reporting mills was 20 per cent above normal. New business was nine per cent below production. Shipments were three per cent above new business. Forty-four per cent of all new business taken water delivery. This was for future water delivery. This amounted to 41,785,854 feet, of which 28,711,909 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 13,073,945 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1,601 cars. Thirty-six per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 35,635,231 feet, of which 25,420,015 feet moved coastwise and inland, and 10,215,216 feet overseas. Rail shipments totaled 1891 cars. Local auto and team deliveries totaled 5,583,527 feet. Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 131,569,240 feet. Unfilled export orders, 70,539,692 feet. Un-

filled rail trade orders, 5682 cars. In the first 31 weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 3,044,641,323 feet; new business, 3,122,568,781 feet, and shipments, 3,308,945,424 feet.

PARIS, Aug. 9.—The Belgian government has decided to take the initiative and directly approach Great Britain and France, if the reparations negotiations among the allies show signs of being resumed at any early date, says a Brussels dispatch to Excelsior.

Premier Theunis, and Foreign Minister Jaspars will come to Paris, the newspaper says, to propose that the reparations claims from Germany, as far as France and Belgium are concerned, to be confined to the material damage suffered by those countries and furthermore that England cancel the inter-allied debts, receiving from Germany for her part the amount of money she owes the United States.

BRITAIN REPLY TO BE SENT

Points Raised by M. Poincare Will Be Dealt With

(By the Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 9.—The net result of today's cabinet council which discussed the terms of Great Britain's reply to France and Belgium with regard to German reparations, appears to be that the negotiations between the allies are proceeding and no approach had yet been made to anything like separate action by the allies.

Great Britain will send a long reply to the French government dealing with all the points raised by M. Poincare, the French premier, in his recent note. The reply will also strongly restate Great Britain's position.

It is understood that the note will intimate that Great Britain cannot advise Germany to withdraw her passive resistance decree absolutely and unconditionally and that it will also remind France that British interests do not permit of waiting indefinitely.

In effect the situation seems to be that Premier Baldwin still is seeking to surmount the difficulties of the situation without endangering an open break with France and it is supposed Belgium is engaged in trying to find means for a convention between the divergent views of her allies.

No further development is expected pending publication of the British note and France's response to Great Britain's fresh arguments.

BANDITS COME TO GRIEF

SAN GABRIEL POSSE ACTS; ONE ROBBER A SUICIDE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9.—Two bandits who attempted to hold up the bank of San Gabriel, near here, and wounded the cashier in the process, were run down by a posse of citizens. One was captured. The other committed suicide when cornered, according to members of the posse.

One of the bandits pointed a revolver at Clay Killian, the cashier, as he sat in his cage, and fired point blank. Killian was struck in the shoulder. Other bullets narrowly missed William R. See, president of the bank, and Miss Freida Monar, bookkeeper. The bandits ran out when other employees made a rush for them.

The pursuers were joined by other San Gabriel citizens and caught up with the bandits in a wash. A revolver battle was ended when one of the bandits threw up his hands in surrender. Another shot was heard and the other man was found dead with a bullet from his own weapon in his head. The captured bandit gave his name as Jose Subia of Los Angeles.

IS GLOVE, NOT A CANCER

WYANT'S BODY REPOSITORY FOR SURGERY THINGS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 9.—Jerry Wyant, one of the most widely known linotype operators and experts on the Pacific Coast, underwent a surgical operation at a local hospital yesterday, and surgeons found in his bladder—not the malignant cancerous growth that they feared—but a surgeon's rubber glove. Wyant underwent a previous operation in San Francisco about two years ago. His physician here said tonight that a few months after the previous operation a doctor's sponge was removed from Wyant's abdomen. Though this sounds much like the case of the Irishman who requested that the next time the doctors cut button holes and sew on buttons instead of stitching him up, the Salem physician vouches for the truth of the story.

SMUGGLED GEMS SEIZED

BROOKLYN WIDOW IS UNDER ARREST AT SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 9.—Charged by the United States customs inspectors with attempting to smuggle crystal beads and carved ivory valued at several hundred dollars into the country, Mrs. Grace S. Arkonbaugh, wealthy Brooklyn widow, was arrested as she stepped off the Admiral Oriental liner President Madison as it docked here this afternoon. Taken before R. W. McClelland, United States commissioner, Mrs. Arkonbaugh waived preliminary hearing and was released on \$500 cash bail.

Customs officials claim to have found the beads and ivory goods cleverly concealed in Mrs. Arkonbaugh's clothing. Mrs. Arkonbaugh denied before Commissioner McClelland any intent to violate the law. She said she took the precaution to hide her valuables while touring the bandit country in China.
