DOLEFUL MESSAGE IS GIVEN OUT BY SMOOT

REVOLUTION AND WAR LARK IN EUROPE, STATEMENT
Unless Nations Act Soon—Upheaval to Surely Come, Says Senator on Return from Continent

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—A picture of Germany on the brink of revolution and of Europe face to face with another devastating war was brought home today by Senator Reed Smoot of Utah who went abroad at the request of the late President Harding to study conditions in Germany as they affect the reparations problem.

Equally doleful was the impression brought back by Representative J. B. A. Well of Louisiana who also has been on a tour of Europe. Both agreed that conditions abroad boded ill for America, particularly for the farmer, for whose surplus crops they said, Europe was not in a position to pay.

Chaos May Be Averted
Senator Smoot said he believed it still possible for Europe to avert its house in order without a period of chaos but he declared that unless the nations acted soon, war would surely come.

While the chief differences between France, Germany and Great Britain appeared on the surface to be over reparations, he said, he suspected that beneath this lay the problem of coal.

In view of what he had seen, he said, he earnestly hoped that America could remain free of European entanglements. He did not believe, however, that entry into the world court, under the reservations suggested by the late Pres-

ident Harding would constitute an entanglement. On the contrary, he thought America could do much to help Europe in its readjustment without herself becoming unduly involved.

Representative Aswell thought that conditions in Europe had reached such a pass that there was nothing the United States could do save exercise her "moral force."

Body of Suicide Recovered
YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 13.—Willy Holstein of Buena, near here, threatened to end his life because of ill health on several occasions. Just eleven days ago he disappeared but after a search friends were inclined to think he had merely gone away. Today his body was taken from a sandbar in the Yakima river. Parts of a sack and strands of wire found upon the body are believed to have been placed there by himself before rolling from a bridge.
