BUNGALOWS TO BE BUILT

HOOTICK-KELLY COMPANY TO ERECT 12 MORE

New Mill at Wendling Will Be Enlarged With the Addition of New Trimmer

The contract will be let in a few days by the Hootick-Kelly lumber company for the erection of 12 new bungalows at Wendling, according to A. C. Dixon, general manager of the company. It is expected that the work will be started on the new buildings in a week or so.

There will be six four-room bungalows and six containing five rooms each, said Mr. Dixon. All will have bath and other modern conveniences and will be plastered throughout.

The new buildings will be erected to accommodate the increasing number of mill hands at Wendling.

The new sawmill of the company at Wendling, which has been in operation but a few weeks, is already being enlarged, according to Mr. Dixon. The foundations are in and the machinery order for a 24-foot trimmer, which will be installed as soon as it arrives. The work is expected to be completed inside of 60 days, said Mr. Dixon.

Fifty men are still employed at the mill at Wendling in construction work. The new plant is in steady operation.

EDITOR AND ORATOR AIM OF HARDING FOR FUTURE

LATE EXECUTIVE PLANNED TO TAKE UP WRITING

Offer Also Open to Deliver Speech- es at \$750 Each after Expi- ration of Presidential Term

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.— When death overtook him in San Francisco, President Harding, al- though apparently confident of his re-election, already had begun to formulate plans against the time when he finally should retire from the White House.

At a private luncheon in a west- ern city before he went to Alaska he told some of his close friends the reasons which had impelled him to dispose of his control of the Marion Star and discussed the part he expected to take in other financial fields of activity when his public service was over.

As the story was told here to- day by those who took part in the conversation, Mr. Harding said that in all probability he would accept an offer of \$25,000 a year made by one of the leading news- papers of the country for editorial contributions. This, he said, would give him a much desired oppor- tunity of getting his views before the people and assisting in solving national and international prob- lems.

He had also open, he added, an offer of \$750 for each speech he might deliver after the expiration of his term as president.

These two offers had caused him to feel that he would be able af- ter leaving the White House to give little personal attention to the editorial management of the Star. He said also that he had sold the Star "because he could not afford to reject the offer" made him, explaining, it is said, that he was to receive for the property in the neighborhood of \$500,000. While he had been earn- ing about \$50,000 a year, Mr. Harding suggested it was not prob- able that he would again receive such an advantageous offer.

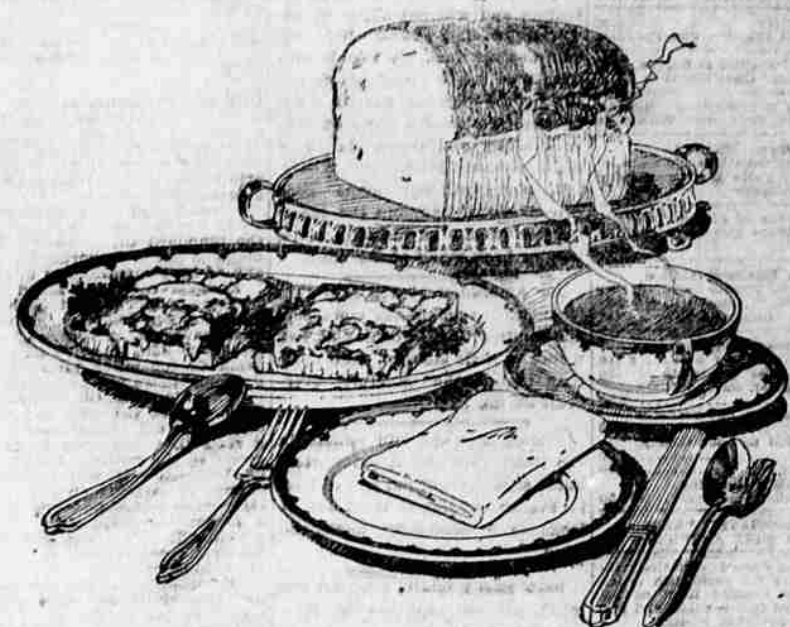
