FOR OVER HALF-CENTURYPioneer Courtships Hold
Good at Cottage Grove

PLAINS CROSSED IN 1853

Mr. and Mrs. Clow, Mr. and Mrs.
McMurphy and Mr. and Mrs.
Godard Happy Through Years(Register Lane County Special)
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Aug. 10.—
Cottage Grove has three couples
who have been married more than
57 years, who are sweethearts
still, who continue to enjoy life
in this little city in the fertile,
fruitful, famous Willamette val-
ley and who have no desire to
hurry to any other place.Francis A. Clow and Caroline M.
Palmo were married July 4, 1866,
in Minnesota. Mr. Clow had beenbut shortly before that discharged
from the union army and that
may have been the reason that
he picked the nation's natal day for
a wedding date. They moved to
Oregon in 1881 and believe that
that is the wisest thing they have
done in their long wedded life.
Living children are Mrs. Anniza
Hornung, Minnesota; Mrs. Julia
Ashby and Mrs. Olive A. McCoy,
Cottage Grove; Francis M. Clow,
Silverton; and Vernon E. Clow,
Cottage Grove. One child is dead.

Born in Canada, 1843

Mr. Clow was born in Canada
October 23, 1843, and Mrs. Clow
was born January 16, 1846, in
Grant county, Wisconsin. Mr.
Clow traveled up the Great lakes
to Illinois in 1845, removed to
Minnesota in 1855, enlisted in 1863
in company H, second Minnesota
volunteer cavalry and was must-
ered out April 23, 1866. He has
been prominent in the affairs of
Appomattox post, G. A. R., and
Mrs. Clow in the affairs of the
Relief corps.The other couple are Mr. and
Mrs. James Henderson McFarland.
They celebrate their anniversary
upon armistice day, November 11,
1866. They have lived here dur-
ing the entire wedded life, with
the exception of a month spent in
California some years ago. They
were so glad to get back that they
have never again left the place
where they have been so contented.Another remarkable circum-
stance is that of six children born
all have spent their lives here and
could gather at home upon very
short notice. All are yet residents
here except Warren W., who has
for a year been a resident of
Roseburg. The children, in the
order of their ages are as follows:
Mrs. Anna Christman, Charles A.
G. Wilbur, Warren W., Frank A.
and Miss Myrtle.

Attacked by Indians

Both Mr. and Mrs. McFarland
were born in Missouri. Mr. Mc-
Farland in 1845, and Mrs. McFar-
land in 1847. Both crossed the
plains in the same year, 1853, but
they were not acquainted until
after arriving where Cottage
Grove has since risen. Mr. Mc-
Farland came in the train of his
father, John W. McFarland, and
the domestic claim taken by him
yet remains in the family. The
elder McFarland had been here
two years before. He noted that
the large trains attracted the at-
tention of the Indians, for which
reason he preferred a small party.
As an actual fact it contained four
men and Mr. McFarland's two
children. They were molested by
the Indians but once and then by
a lone Indian and suffered no
losses. This was one of the small-
est parties ever to cross the plains.Mrs. McFarland came in the
train headed by Captain Oglesby,
father of the late W. W. Oglesby.
It contained 20 wagons and was
one of the largest ever to make
the trek. Her parents were Mr.
and Mrs. S. E. Knox, afterwards
among the most prominent of the
early pioneers of this section. Mrs.
McFarland has dinner horn
made from one of the oxen which
hailed her across the plains.

Godard's Third Couple

The third couple are Mr. and
Mrs. Harrison Godard. Mr.
Godard was born November 11,
1840, in Vermont county, Ohio. It
is a coincidence that Mr. and Mrs.
McFarland, the second couple at
this sketch, were married on the
date afterwards to become known
as armistice day and that Mr.
Godard was born on that date.At 17 years of age he moved to
Indiana, residing near Fort Wayne.
At 21 years he enlisted in company
D, 30th Indiana volunteers andwas discharged in October, 1864,
with the rank of sergeant.
Mrs. Godard (Eunice C. Cuth-
rell), was born in Fort Wayne,
Indiana, August 21, 1847. They
were married there on Christmas
day, 1865, and both have since
been satisfied with what
Santa Claus brought them. In
1873 they moved to Manchester,
Iowa, from there to Council Bluffs,
Iowa, Nebraska, and resided
there until coming to Cottage
Grove in 1910. They have never
been happier than here. They
have seven living children, 24
grandchildren and eight great
grandchildren.

Mortgage Claim Held Valid

HARRISBURG, Ore., Aug. 14.—
(Special to the Register.)—The
suit of Postmaster Jason Ander-

claim to a \$2000 mortgage on a
farm near Canyon City, Ore., and

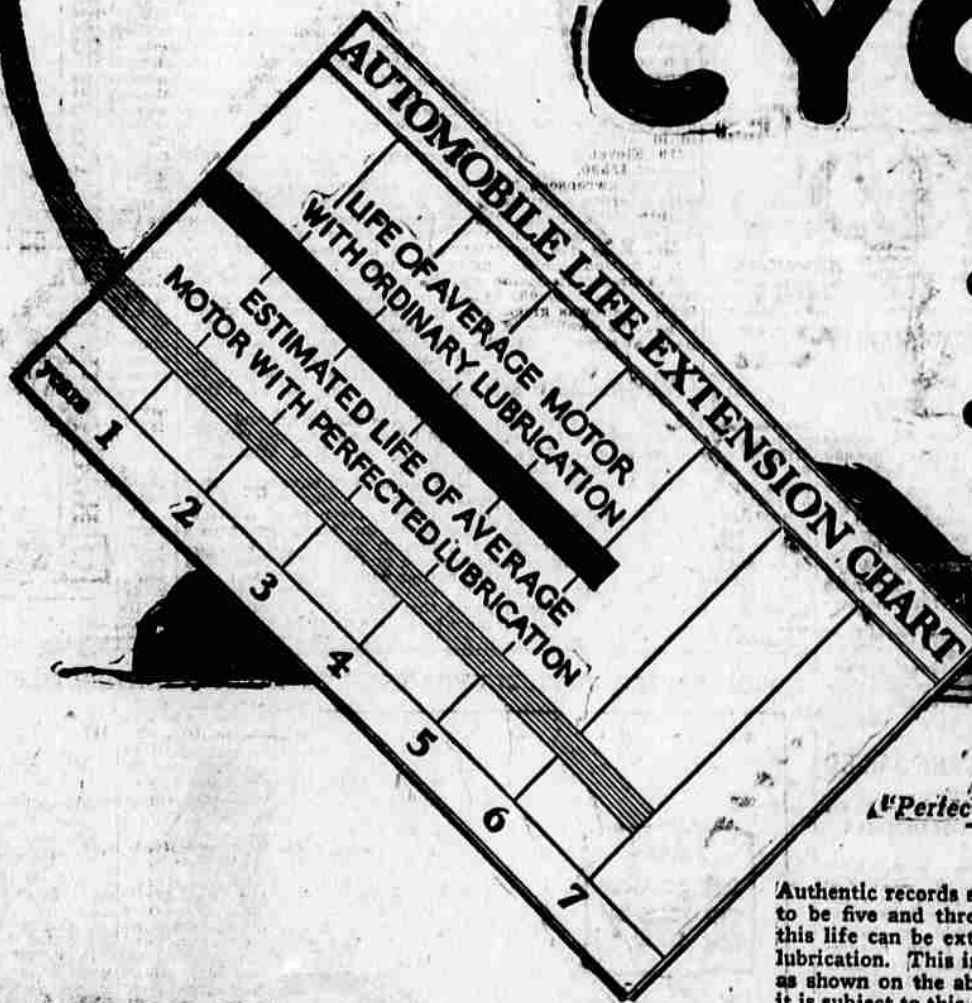
