ACCIDENT ALMOST FATAL

CAR OVERTURNS TWICE IN 30-FOOT FALL OVER GRADE

Word from Bohemia District Tells How Mr. Churchill, Mr. Smith Nearly Escaped Fatal Injury

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Aug. 14.—Word has reached here from the Bohemia district telling how J. A. Churchill and Charles Smith escaped with minor injuries from what might easily have been a fatal accident when their car went over the grade while they were en route to that district.

Mr. Smith was operating the car. The road is barely wide enough for a single vehicle and the edge of the grade is nowhere more than two or three feet from the outside wheels. One of the front wheels struck a large rock in the road with such force that the car was forced over the grade. At this point it is only 30 feet to the bottom, while at many points it is a thousand feet or more. The car turned completely over twice and landed right side up in the creek below with Mr. Smith still at the wheel.

Able to Walk Four Miles
Mr. Churchill fell out of the car went over the first time and landed in some brush which protected him as the car turned over him. He sustained four fractured ribs and a bruised shoulder, while Mr. Smith escaped with hardly a scratch. Mr. Churchill was able to walk on in to his property four miles beyond.

Mr. Smith secured the assistance of John Gruber and Charles Newlin, who are working in the district.
