DRILLING SOON TO START
OLSON SAYS OUTFIT WILL COME WITHIN MONTH

Promoter Expects Oil Will Be Struck at 1500-Foot Level; Company Has No Doubt, Statement

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Aug. 17.—Drilling at Cottage Grove's oil well will be under way within 30 days. After two trips that covered some 10,000 miles, Rev. David Olson, president of the Guaranty Oil company, which is to drill the well here, succeeded in securing a standard outfit, which he found drilling what was a dry hole.

This outfit will be placed on the cars in California not later than September 1, possibly sooner, and should be set up and ready for operations by the middle of September. The derrick has been completed.

Olson's instruments have proved to him that oil in the first hole will be found at a depth of 1500 feet and that a depth of 3500 feet will reach all the oil in the great lake which his instruments have told him his instruments for centuries to pour out its wealth.

Population May Double
The outfit which will come here has been paid for, as has also the outfit at Eugene. The Guaranty Oil company owes no man a penny.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—Position of the egg trade continues to improve here, although no further general change was shown locally during the Friday session.

General bids for current receipt eggs are around 27 cents a dozen, with occasional premium of 1 cent and heavier stock is finding extreme call at 31 cents.

Withdrawal of the leucostock is very liberal and unseasonably large. While there are usually quite fair withdrawals of short held stuff from storage during the heated period, this season the outward movement is more aggressive for the early period.

This is considered due to the monetary situation, many of the loans for storage being for the short period instead of the whole season as during normal years.

Selling prices on eggs are practically uniform here. Profits are so limited that sellers would lose money if they shaded their asking prices.

BUTTER SITUATION IS FIRMER

Full strength is continued in the market for butter here. Demand for cube extras is in excess of current offerings with sales of state brands at 41c and centralizer offerings 43c a pound.

TOMATOES UNUSUALLY SHORT
Tomatoes are today showing the shortest supply ever known here for this season of the year. Local stock is quoted strong at \$1.75 and even up to \$2 for best stock. A car of Walla Walla arrived late Thursday and sold quickly at \$2.25 for standard and \$2.50 for fancy.

PEACH TRADE IS VERY ACTIVE
Very active trade is showing for peaches in the local trade with sales of fancy local Crawford at \$1.25 and \$1.35, while best California Elbertas are moving around \$1.00 and \$1.25 generally. Most of the sales of sloppy stock around 75¢ to 85¢.

CANTALOUPE PRICE IS EASIER
Raising off of the cantaloupe market from \$4 to \$3.75 for best California standards was shown for the day with pines \$2.75 to \$3.00 and flats \$1.60 to \$1.80.
