

ILLINOIS BIDS FAIR TO JOIN NEW PARTY RANKS

Governor Small to Seek Republican Nomination

PLATFORM PLANKS FIXED

Thompson, Former Mayor of Chicago May Seek Senatorial Nomination

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Illinois, which has held rigidly to the two chief political parties for years, and in which the farmer-labor party has not gained a foothold, bids fair to rival Minnesota, Iowa and other states west of the Great lakes as a stamping ground for progressives and alleged radicals during the next year, some political observers were inclined to agree Thursday.

Governor Len Small, at a political rally in his home town of Kankakee, announced he would seek re-election on the republican ticket next year, but this statement did not cause as much discussion as the enunciation of principles adopted at the convention and approved by the governor.

These principles, which a committee composed of leaders in the administration of the republican party in Illinois will seek to advance to members of congress are in line with those of the progressive bloc of the senate recently elected from mid-west, and north-west states. The chief declarations follow:

Repeal of the Esch-Cummins railroad act.

No entangling alliances without approval of the people through a referendum.

A constitutional amendment to provide for a referendum except in cases where the country actually is invaded.

Condemnation of compulsory military training.

Drastic federation to relieve the farmers' distress.

It was suggested that an interstate food commission, similar to that of the interstate commerce commission, be created with powers to fix and regulate prices and distribution of farm products so that the farmer would receive adequate returns and the consumer would not be gouged.

A constitutional amendment against child labor.

Abolition of the Pittsburg plus steel trade practice.

Election of federal judges.

Reduction of all railroad rates on a basis of physical values of properties.

WAGES OF \$104 A WEEK TAKE EYE OF COLLEGE MEN

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—Plasterers' wages of \$104 and more a week are causing student ministers and members of other professions to take up the trowel in Evanston, where work on a new hotel is in progress. Until recently Rev. Frank Cummings was a member of the plastering gang. George Sellick, of Washington University, a civil engineer and a holder of several degrees, recently turned down the offer of a professorship to join the plasterers.

"I learned the trade in high school and worked my way through college," Sellick said. "When I graduated in 1917, I found the trade paid better than my profession as an engineer. Members of my graduating class are working for \$200 a month and my pay runs between \$400 and \$500."

HINDU WIDOWS NEED AID

25 MILLION WOMEN IN INDIA UNABLE TO REMARRY

GENEVA, Aug. 18.—There are 25,000,000 Hindu widows in India who, owing to their religion, can never remarry. Miss Isabel Frosham, of the Church of England Missionary society, told her hearers at a lecture in Geneva.

Of this total, 174,000 widows are under the age of nine, and both old and young widows, especially the latter, live as a rule very badly treated by their relatives who believe that in former lives their misdeeds must have been great to be thus punished in this life. When ill, these unfortunate widows are not allowed to be attended by a male doctor. Miss Frosham therefore appealed to the Swiss women's committee to send volunteer women doctors to India to look after this sorely tried class of native women.

WYOMING GAS TAX LARGE

\$30,000 MONTHLY EXPECTED DURING SUMMER

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 18.—The treasury of Wyoming was enriched by more than \$22,000 in the first two months of operation of the state's new gasoline tax of one cent per gallon, according to figures compiled by John M. Snyder, state treasurer. In April, the first month in which the law, passed at the last session of the legislature, was effective, a total of \$13,164 was collected. In May the amount increased to \$14,331.

Reckless and fast auto driving through the auto park must stop, said Superintendent B. H. Parker last night, after an Oldsmobile eight narrowly escaped turning over after being crowded off the road near the entrance to the grounds. A car coming out of the park at an excessive rate of speed, not only failed to slow down when passing, but kept to the center of the road. The Oldsmobile was crowded down into the bushes, and the car at fault refused to stop. Dean John Straub, of the university, also had a similar accident there a few weeks ago, due to the same cause. It should be remembered by townspeople of Eugene that the road through the auto park is not a public highway, and local drivers should show more courtesy toward the city's guests. The speed limit is 15 miles an hour through the grounds, unless it is observed arrests will be made, is the decision of the park superintendent.
