RAILROAD MEN TO ATTEND

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FLOOD OPENS COLORADO IRRIGATION RESERVOIR

Fear Is Held For Safety of Dam at Rockyford

RESIDENTS MOVING OUT

Phone Connection With All Towns in Arkansas Valley, Except Fowler, Out at 11 P. M.

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 22.—A large irrigation reservoir on the Arkansas river, south of Fowler, Colo., has broken, according to information received here and a great body of water is moving toward another reservoir at Rockyford. The water early tonight was running four feet over the dam at Rockyford and city officials expressed the fear that when the water from the broken reservoir reached the Rockyford dam, the latter would break, causing a serious flood.

Heavy rains last night raised the water and formed a lake five miles back of the river from Fowler dam, which is half a mile wide. Close watch was kept at the dam and this afternoon when one end washed out, warnings were sent out by telephone operators to all of the families in the path of the flood. Prompt warning saved a loss of life, officials said.

Entire Dam Washed Away

The entire dam went out soon after the end was washed away. A wall of water is descending on Olney Springs, Manzanola, Rockyford and Lejunia, Colo.

The Arkansas river, into which all this water will empty is already bank full from the rains in Pueblo and surrounding territory yesterday and fears are felt for the safety of the towns in the flood's path. Residents in all the lowlands are moving to high ground.

A 25-foot wall of water is reported to be headed towards Manzanola by telephone operators at the place, who said the water had 25 miles to go, before reaching the town. The river can stand only about a five-foot rise, observers said tonight.

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 22.—Telephone communication with all towns in the Arkansas valley except Fowler, Colo., was lost at 11 o'clock tonight. Further reports from the flooded region will not be available for several hours until newspaper representatives can return from that region.

Lowlands All Flooded

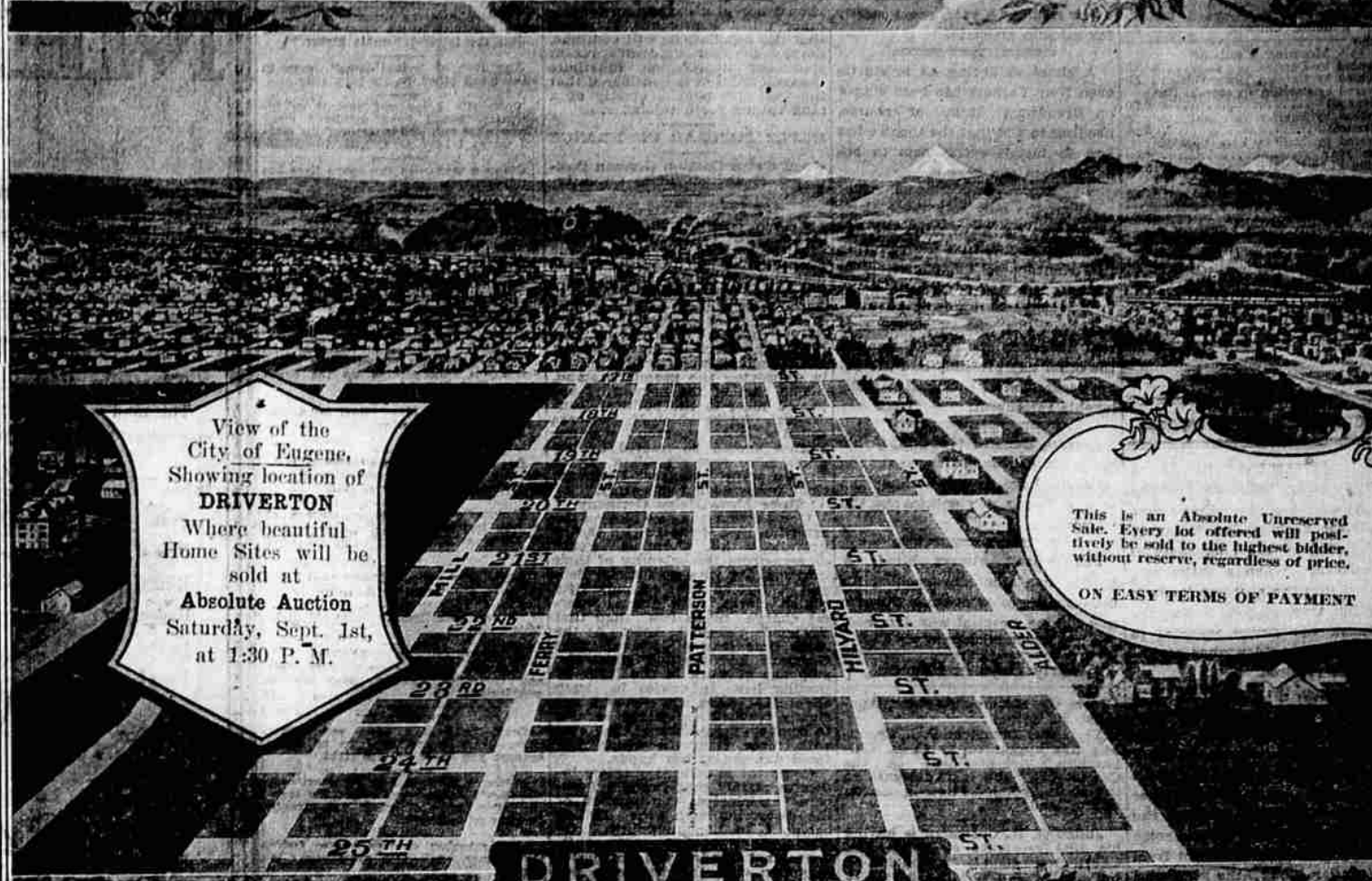
At 10:30 o'clock tonight all the lowlands around Rockyford and Manzanola were under water, according to the sheriff of Crowley county, who reported over the only phone remaining—that at Ordway to Pueblo. He declared the water would make outside connections with the flooded area impossible in another hour.

The flood conditions are due to heavy rains and cloudbursts in the valley last night and today.

RAIL CREWS AT WORK ON NEW S. P. CUTOFF

To obtain supplies and an additional crew of men for the survey of the Eugene-Klamath cutoff, which is now under way by the Southern Pacific, J. E. Williams, assistant engineer of the rail system, was here yesterday from the Oakridge district where the survey work is in progress. Two crews of surveyors are at present engaged in the rail line work in that district and expectations are that in the near future an additional crew will be maintained.

The present work is progressing satisfactorily, according to the report of the rail official, but no definite time has been set for further activity to follow the completion of the survey.

HOME SITE IS PENDING

YEOMEN OFFICERS SAY SEATTLE HAS ADVANTAGE

Word from National Headquarters of Order is That Washington May Be Selected

That the proposed national children's home of the Brotherhood of American Yeomen will probably be located near Seattle, at the Hollywood site, which was inspected by the committee of national officials last May, is the opinion expressed by officers of the Eugene unit of the order following reports from the national headquarters.

A delegation of 10 Seattle men interested in the project recently attended a session of the Yeomen officials at Des Moines, Iowa, and fortified with several reams of motion pictures and a mass of data concerning the advantages of the Seattle site are said to have made quite an impression on the national officers of the order.

Although Washington, according to present indications, has the best chance in the contest for the prize, it is said that Oregon is still being considered, following the elimination of all sites proposed with the exception of five, the Eugene officers report.

The annual election of officers of the Eugene Yeomen lodge will be held Wednesday, September 5. The present officers are: E. R. Black, foreman; James A. Strayer, master of ceremonies; Julia E. STATE GAS PRICE FALLS

STANDARD ANNOUNCES ONE CENT DROP FOR TODAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—The Standard Oil in California today announced a reduction effective tomorrow of two cents a gallon in gasoline to the consumer in southern California and of one cent a gallon elsewhere in California and in Nevada, Washington, Oregon, Alaska and Hawaii.

"Flush" production of crude oil at the wells was given as the reason for the reduction.

Discounts on script will be discontinued, but the books will continue on sale. The sale of gallonage, coupon books will be discontinued. The new price of gasoline in Los Angeles is 15 cents a gallon, the lowest since November, 1915, and in San Francisco 16 cents a gallon, the lowest since January, 1915.

FARMERS' COUNCIL SEEKS WALLACE INVESTIGATION

CONGRESS TO BE ASKED FOR PROBE OF DEPARTMENT

Marsh, Director of Council, Avers Secretary Has Played Into Hands of Packers, Commission Men

(By The Associated Press)

DES MOINES, Iowa, Aug. 22.—A demand of the next congress for an investigation of the federal department of agriculture is to be made by the Farmers' National Council, Benjamin C. Marsh, of Washington, D. C., managing director of the council, declared in an address here tonight before the conference for progressive political action.

"Secretary of Agriculture Wallace," declared Mr. Marsh, "has turned the administration of the stockyards act, passed by congress in 1914, over to the packers and commission men to enforce, with results highly satisfactory to the food trust. Under this administration irregularities have occurred upon which we will demand an investigation."

One of the cases of alleged irregularities, Marsh said, was at the South St. Paul Livestock Exchange.

Other instances, he declared, also would be cited if a congressional investigation commission is appointed.

"Commission men, according to admission of the president of the St. Paul Livestock Exchange, have been guilty of irregularity in robbing farmers of large sums of money," Mr. Marsh declared.

"When the secretary of agriculture found that 16 St. Paul firms had been guilty of robbing the farmers who sold them livestock," Marsh continued, "the secretary instead of enforcing the laws to make restitution to the farmers, turned over the facts secured by the federal auditor to the directors of the exchange, although the act states that any officer or employee of the commission who makes public any information obtained by the commission without its authority, unless directed by a court, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to punishment."
