EUGENE TO SEE 'WORLD'S GREATEST' SHOWS TODAY

Small Boys Due to Be Late For Breakfast

TRAIN HAS HUNDRED CARS

Due to Huge Size of Combined Shows, No Street Parade Will Be Held; Abolished 3 Years Ago

CIRCUS-DAY SCHEDULE
Show grounds—Blair street show grounds.
Performances—2 p. m. and 8 p. m. Doors open one hour earlier.
Features—Entire company of baby elephants taught to perform. Europe's biggest trained wild animal acts and newly added European horse shows. 700 men and women acrobatic champions.
Dimensions—Main tent, 700 x 350 feet, cooled and ventilated by forty specially designed electric fans. Three steel-girded arenas, three rings, eight stages, colossal hippodrome oval; wilderness of aerial apparatus.
Menagerie—Forty adult elephants, heads of camels and zebras, three giraffes, 110 cages of rare animals, including entire family of hippopotami, world's only armored rhinoceros.
Arrival—Early this morning aboard 100 double-length railroad cars from Portland.

If you miss your small boy at peep of day, don't be alarmed. Don't telephone the police. Just wait patiently and in due time he will come home to tell of the hundred cars that this morning brought to Eugene the greatest show on earth.

For the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey combined shows has come to town today traveling on trains more than one hundred miles long over the Southern Pacific railway.

It is the world's biggest circus town on wheels with an inhabitation of almost 1600 persons. More than a thousand menagerie animals are being unloaded this morning. These number an entire family of hippopotami, eight baby elephants only recently landed from India, forty full-grown pachyderms, giraffes more than eighteen feet tall, and Knaichi, the world's smallest horse.

Circus Grounds Busy
Out at the circus grounds 12 private dressing tents and two huge canvases as large as the menagerie tents of small shows, are being erected for the hundreds of performers. On another side of the 100-foot long main tent, tents are drawing the deer into place that this season carry the scores of wild animal actors. Among these are tigers that wrestle their keepers or panthers and lions that will this afternoon and evening ride upon the backs of galloping horses.

More than 200 performing equines will be a feature. These splendid animals are housed in a special stable. The placing of this and thirty other tents together with transporting the hundreds of tons of properties, as everywhere the case, render a street parade impossible. It was abolished with this circus three years ago and no parade has anywhere been given since.

30 Tents Used
Thirty tents make up the monster circus city, largest of these being the main tent, or "big top," within which the wonders of the circus are revealed. This tent seats 15,000 people and monster electric fans are erected over the grand stand and reserved seats. The menagerie tent is but a trifle smaller.

Notable among the exhibits will be a herd of 40 elephants, including six babies; an entire family of zebras; the only armored rhinoceros in America; a baby "hippo" and giant mother and a baby orang outang. The animals in the menagerie are entirely apart from the trained wild animals appearing within the three steel arenas at the performances, these latter including black panthers, lions, tigers, leopards and Polar bears, and some idea of the magnitude of the circus may be gained from the statement that, including the menagerie animals, the show carries 23 Polar bears, 36 lions, 28 tigers and 40 elephants, along with a big showing of other types.

Three rings, eight stages, three steel arenas and the hippodrome oval are required to run off the program of almost three hours. In addition to the performances by the wild animals within their steel enclosures, there are performances by trained seals, pigs, geese, doves, brown and black Bruins, riding bikes and skimming around on roller skates as good as any archer. 100 superbly trained stallions, Alf Loyal's wonderful canines, back-firing mules, "shimmying" horses and what not.

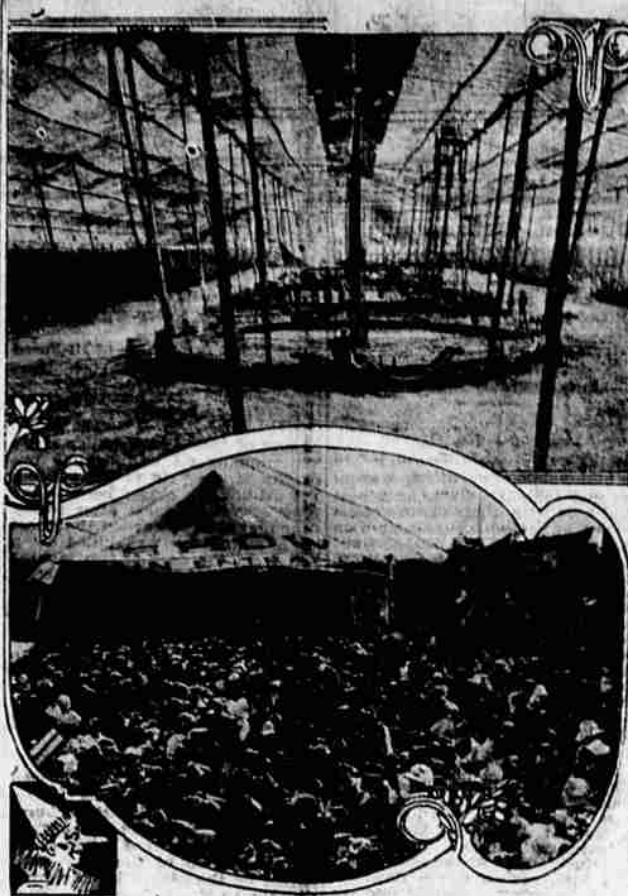

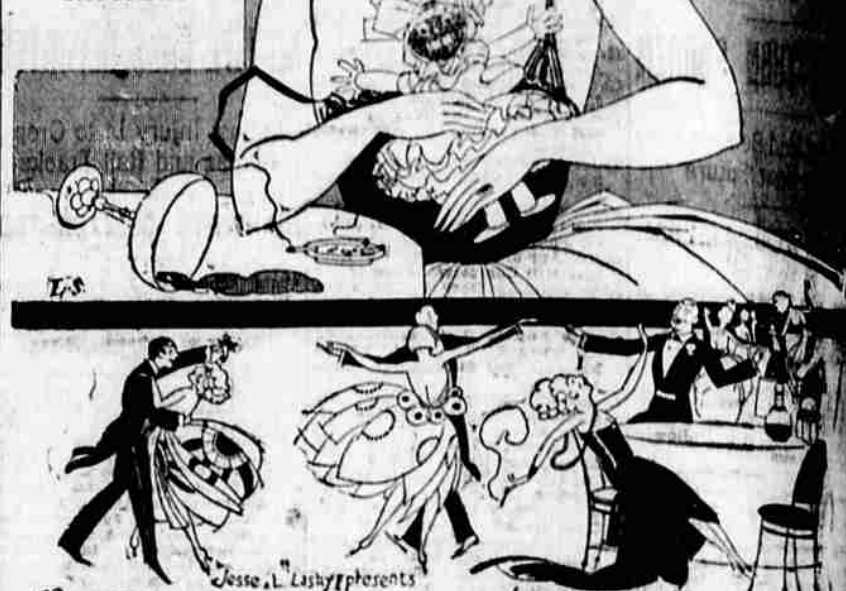
