DORITY FUNERAL IS HELD

COUPLE SEPARATED BY DEATH OLDEST IN CITY
Pioneer Woman Dear to Hearts of Residents—Rebekahs Have Charge at Grave

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Aug. 25.—Mrs. C. M. Dority, who passed away at her home on South Second street Monday, was buried Thursday at the Laurel Hill cemetery, following services held at the Methodist church. The Rebekah lodge had charge of services at the graves. Mrs. Dority had lived in this city for 37 years and has seen it grow from a village of 100 to its present size.

Emily J. Morse was born in South Bend, Indiana, June 15, 1851. At the age of three she emigrated with her family, settling in Jones county, Iowa, where she later met Charles M. Dority, who was working in Monticello at his trade as machinist for the railroad company. In 1871 they were united in marriage. In 1885 Mr. and Mrs. Dority moved to Goshen, Oregon, and a year later came to Springfield, where they have resided continuously for the past 37 years. Mrs. Dority was dear to

the community as one of its pioneer women, having watched the town of Springfield grow from less than 100 inhabitants to its present size.

Older Married Couple in City
At the time of her death Mr. and Mrs. Dority were perhaps the oldest married couple living in the town. Their home on South Second street stands as one of the original lots purchased by Mr. Dority when the family settled here. Mrs. Dority had been ill since last December.

Mrs. Dority was a member of a number of fraternal organizations. She was a charter member of the local chapter of the Rebekahs, in which she held a decoration of chivalry, the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a Rebekah. She was a charter member of the Neighbors of Woodcraft which was organized over 20 years ago. She belonged to the Ladies of the Canton, an auxiliary of the I. O. O. F., and to the ladies auxiliary of the American Legion. She was also a member of the Methodist church.

Mrs. Dority is survived by her husband, Charles M. Dority; one son, Cecil, of Outlook; a brother, Thomas Morse, of Pleasant Hill; a niece and nephew whom Mrs. Dority raised from childhood, Merritt Tuel, of Wasco, and Mrs. Daisy Bumgarner, of La Crosse, Wash., who mourn her loss.

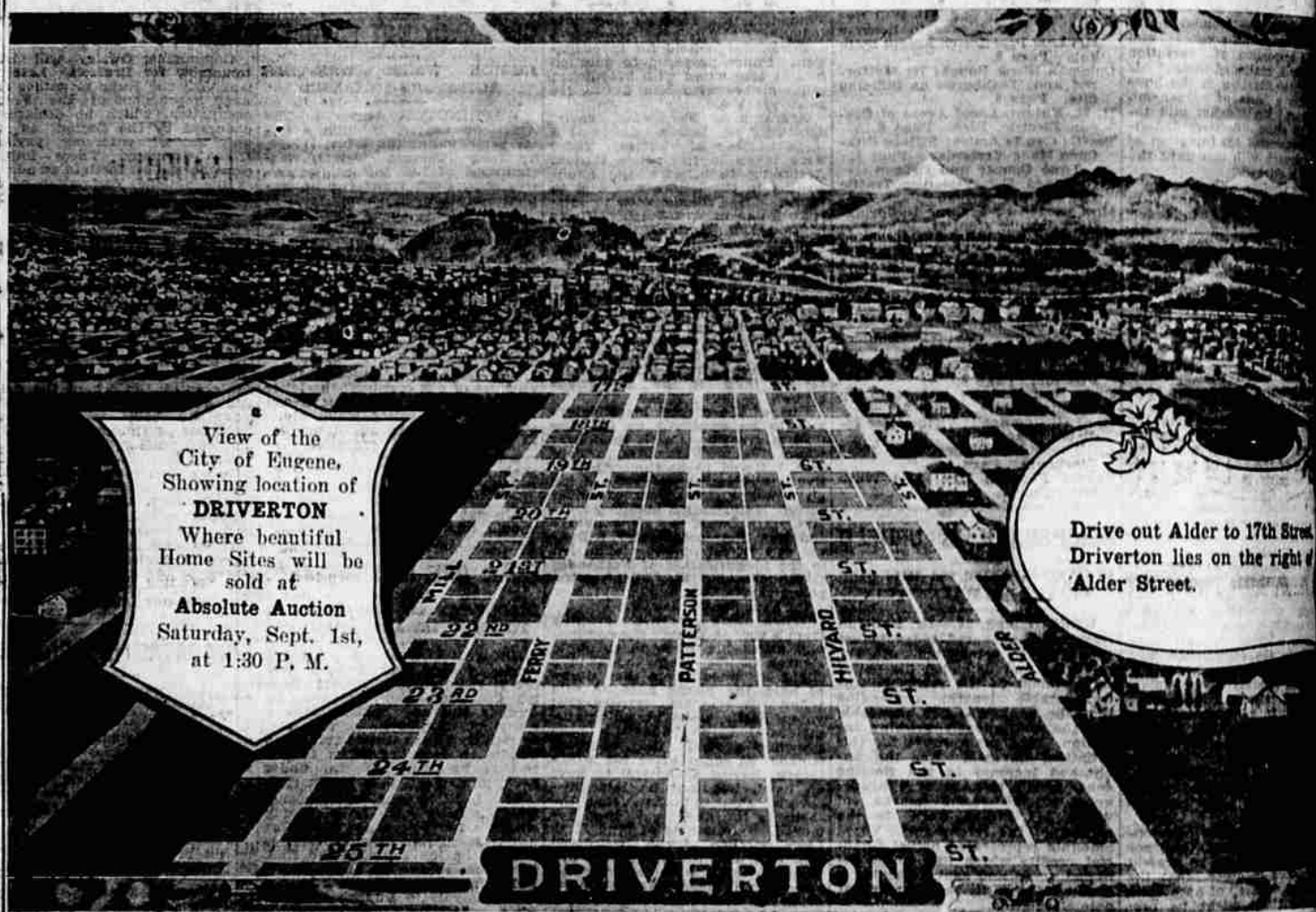
