HUNTER CLEAR OF BLAME

INQUEST HELD ON DEATH OF ROBERT MCLEAN

Professor Thompson, Who Fired Fatal Shot Testifies That He Did Not See Boy in Line of Bullet

Professor R. C. Thompson, of Reno, Nevada, who accidentally shot and killed Robert J. McLean while on a hunting trip on the Siuslaw river last Sunday, was cleared of all blame for the fatal tragedy by a coroner's jury yesterday. The inquest was held at the office of District Attorney Clyde Johnston.

The verdict as returned by the jury is: "We find Robert McLean met his death August 26 on Holland creek by a gunshot wound by R. C. Thompson. We lay the blame to no one." The coroner's jury was composed of Bert Vincent, foreman; Sidney Stickle, Charles Dickerson, T. N. Plank, J. J. Bates and W. P. Tromp.

Professor Thompson testified that he did not see McLean until after he had fired the fatal shot and walked several yards toward the deer that had been his target. McLean cried out, "My side," as he fell and this cry attracted his attention, Professor Thompson stated.

The funeral services for Robert McLean will be held tomorrow forenoon at the Veach chapel at 10 o'clock. Rev. Frederick G. Jennings, pastor of the St. Mary's Episcopal church, will officiate. Interment will be at the Masonic cemetery. Members of the Eugene chapter of the DeMolay, of which young McLean was affiliated, will probably act as pallbearers.

MRS. SPORES IS HELD

COURT WOMAN AWAITS ACTION OF GRAND JURY

Charged With Adultery With Paul H. Crippen Who Has Left County and Is Being Sought

Mrs. Mettie Spores, of Coburg, yesterday was held over by Judge Jesse G. Wells, of the Eugene justice court, on a charge of adultery and the officers are now looking for Paul J. Crippen with whom she is alleged to have committed the crime. A warrant has been issued for his arrest.

The arrest of Mrs. Spores was the result of trouble Saturday night at Coburg where it is claimed that Edgar Spores, husband of the woman, caught Mrs. Spores and Crippen together.

Testimony at the preliminary hearing yesterday showed that Crippen, after the row, packed up his belongings and said he was going to leave the country. Mrs. Spores yesterday gave the sheriff a minute description of the man, stating that she was anxious to locate him to straighten up the affair, declaring that she was not guilty of the crime she is accused of.

NASH AGENCY TO OPEN

SALESROOM TO BE ESTABLISHED ON NINTH AVENUE

Arrangements for the opening of an agency in this city to handle the Nash motor car are being made by the Eugene Nash company recently organized here. The firm will establish salesrooms on Ninth avenue west where the Columbia Tire corporation maintained quarters recently. The new Nash agency has been formed by L. A. Wells, formerly of Great Falls, Montana. The G. M. C. truck will also be handled by the firm.

H. C. Deaser of Portland, representative of the Oregon state distributors for the Nash car, is here to complete details for the opening of the Eugene agency. The Nash car was formerly sold here by the Osaman-McDonald company which closed about two years ago.

CAR STRIKES WORKER

MONTANA MAN IS DETAINED AT GRANTS PASS

Tells Officers He Did Not Know He Had Struck W. Pleuard But Thought It Was Shovel

W. C. Hodges, of Butte, Mont., was detained at Grants Pass yesterday on request of Sheriff Stickels, a complaint having been made charging him with striking W. Pleuard, a highway laborer, as he passed him with his car on the pavement between Eugene and Goshen yesterday.

Follow-laborers of Pleuard said that the car that struck him sped on but that the driver looked back evidently to see what he had struck. Pleuard was working on the pavement, which is being resurfaced between here and Goshen. He sustained three broken ribs and several bruises.

Sheriff Stickels was not informed of the accident for some time afterward. He telephoned to Grants Pass, asking the officers there to hold the driver of the car, the number of which was taken. It bore Montana license No. 37,899. The officers there located the car in the auto camp and telephoned to the sheriff here that Hodges was willing to come back to Eugene. They said he told them that he remembered striking something with his car but thought it was a shovel or something else.

MUCH SULPHUR IS USED

FRUIT GROWERS' ASSOCIATION GETS 2100 SACKS

During the present fruit canning and drying season the Eugene Fruit Growers' association used a total of 2100 sacks of sulphur in the bleaching processes employed at the local plant on certain varieties of fruits. The sacks each containing 100 pounds of the flour-sulphur were shipped here from San Francisco.

The empty sacks have been purchased from the association by the Lane County Farmers union warehouse and are being steam-cleaned at the plant of the Electric Cleaners and will be used for sacking grain. The sulphur shipment this year is said to have been the largest ever used at the local cannery.

Giffen, university pastor of the Presbyterian church. The wedding was quiet, the ceremony being performed in the presence of only a few intimate friends. Marjory Watson, niece of the bride, and Cleo Barnes, daughter of the groom, acted as flower girls.

Man With Bullet in Brain Dies OMAHA, Aug. 28.—John S. Grotter, 40, who since the Philippine insurrection of 1899, lived with a steel jacketed Mauser rifle bullet imbedded in his brain, died at his home in Jamaica, N. Y., last night, according to word received here today by relatives. For the past 18 years, the last eight of which he served as inspector, Grotter has been in the postal service, working in and about Greater New York.

Little Case Still Unsolved COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 28.—An arrest tonight in the Suttle murder mystery was promised early this evening by Sheriff Samuel Berkley, though the sheriff refused to divulge any reason for his prediction. It was reported that blood-stained kimono had been found in a closet in the room of Mrs. Elsie Suttle, child bride of R. H. Suttle, Jr., who was beaten to death in her bedroom last Thursday morning.

URGE LAW'S AUTHORITY CHIEF WRITES EDITORS

SUPPORT OF PRESS IS ASKED BY PRESIDENT COOLIDGE

Exclusive Message to Southern Publishers Stresses Allegiance to Federal Constitution

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 28.—Undivided allegiance to the constitution and unhesitating obedience to legislative action were urged upon the press of the nation by President Coolidge in a letter to A. G. Newmyer, president of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' association, made public here today.

The President's letter was in reply to one written by Mr. Newmyer, who asked the executive to send him a terse, exclusive message for the southern publishers broadly answering the question as to how the newspapers can best serve the federal government at this time as he was personally anxious to have the membership of the association cooperate in every manner consistent with their individual policies.

The letter to Mr. Newmyer, who is an official of the New Orleans Item, follows: "Your very kind message and the general assurance which it contains of support on the part of the newspapers of your association has been received. Every newspaper man may be very helpful in his support of the government, whether it be state or national. Fundamentally this means always making the authority of the law supreme. It means undivided allegiance to legislative action made in accordance with its provisions.

Constructive Criticism Help
Constructive criticism is always helpful. It keeps institutions from decay. But constructive criticism does not accomplish its purpose merely by pointing out what is evil. It must not fail to direct attention, with more emphasis, to what is good. Our institutions, our social organization, our economic condition are all of a quality and quantity which are worthy of our highest admiration. I believe that it will be exceedingly helpful to public sentiment if these principles and ideals can be reiterated from time to time, joined with a reverence for religion and aspiration for better things.

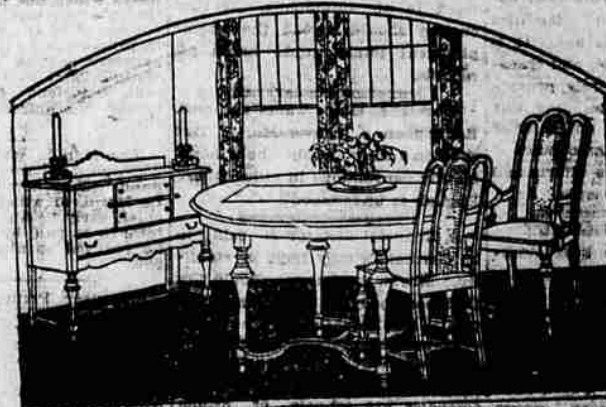
