CITY BAND IS PROPOSED

L. E. SIMMONS SEEKS SUPPORT OF COUNCIL FOR MUSICIANS Committee of Three Authorized to Probe Feasibility of Organization—Advantages Stressed

A band, to be maintained by the city and supported by city funds, was proposed last night at the regular council meeting by L. E. Simmons, councilman. This band would be used for concerts at the auto and city parks, and would represent Eugene in all civic functions.

Several years ago a levy was voted for maintenance of a city band, and for some time the organization thrived, but later it broke up, and nothing has been done for some time. It would require action of the council only to re-organize the group.

A committee of three was authorized by the council upon motion of Mr. Simmons, and this committee will be appointed later by the mayor.

Mayor Parks, who has just returned from a tour of the Northwest, told the council members that many towns the size of Eugene and smaller maintained musical organizations that were very creditable, and proved an asset to the cities. He also stated that these bands were used extensively at auto camps, and that such a group here would help to make the Eugene park known to tourists, and would add to the attractions offered the travelers.

It is expected that a movement will be started in the city by those interested, and that perhaps an allowance for a band will be made in the next budget. It is hoped to have the organization under way by next summer.

NEW BUILDING PLANNED

ALDER STREET CONSTRUCTION WILL START

Store Adjacent to Campa Shoppe to Be Erected by Herschel Taylor For Sale of Supplies

Erection of a new building on Alder street adjacent to the Campa Shoppe is planned by Herschel Taylor, owner of the property, and a new store will be leased for the establishment of a student supply shop, including various merchandise with the exception of textbooks. The building, of frame construction, will have an Alder street frontage of 24 feet and a depth of 66 feet to the rear of the property. The building when completed will be veneered with stone, and will conform with the design and construction of the banquet and dance hall which adjoins the Campa Shoppe and will be separated by a court from the new structure.

Work on the construction of the new building will be under way this week, according to announcement. The negotiations for the taking over of the new student shop are still pending and announcement is to be made in the near future concerning the names of those who will conduct the place, is the announcement. Other vacant property owned by Mr. Taylor in the same block may be used as building sites, but no plans have yet been completed, is the report.

He is believed to be the sole survivor of the British steamer Mylie which foundered in a typhoon recently en route from Chinwangtao to Shanghai with a cargo of coal. 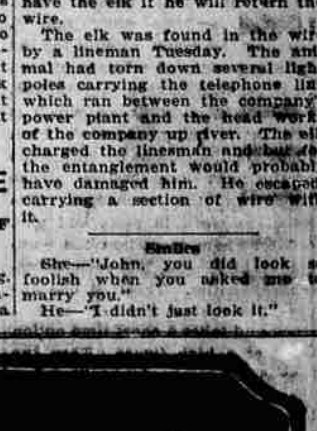
