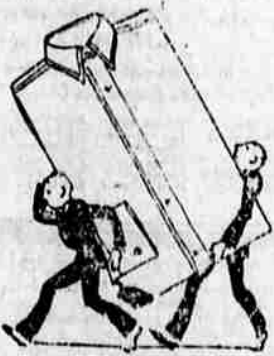
Business Name Is Filed—The certificate of the assumed business name, the Daugherty Lumber company, was filed in the office of County Clerk Bryson yesterday.

CHARGES ARE WITHDRAWN

EDGAR SPORES SAYS HIS WIFE IS NOT GUILTY

Filed Complaint Against Her in Heat of Passion But Now Says She Is Innocent

Edgar Spores, resident of Coquille, after having filed a complaint against his wife, Mettie, charging her with adultery, resulting in her being bound over to the grand jury Tuesday, signed a withdrawal of the charges, and the charges are false and that he would withdraw them.

A warrant had been issued for the arrest of Paul H. Crippen but no further efforts will be made to apprehend him, the officers say. Spores explained that his wife and Crippen had been together occasionally and that he filed the complaint in the heat of passion although he had no evidence against them.

Mrs. Spores filed a divorce suit the same day her husband filed the charges against her. Spores' statement in an affidavit filed in Judge Wells' court by his attorney, Fred E. Smith, follows: To the Public: I have this day made affidavit that the charges made by me against my wife, Mettie Spores, charging her with adultery with one P. H. Crippen, are wholly false, and I desire this to be published that people may know that my wife was not guilty of any such crime.
