TIE LINE UNITES SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 29. A switch is to be thrown tomorrow afternoon connecting the municipal power systems of Seattle and Tacoma, the two largest cities on Puget Sound, situated 30 miles apart. This switch will inaugurate operation a connection of the two systems that has been constructed at a cost of \$175,000, each city standing half. It will make one system of 800,000 horsepower developed and potential.

The agreement under which the tie-up has been created is that either city is entitled to buy power when the other has a surplus of hydro-generated current and to receive steam generated power in emergency. Tacoma has a surplus of power from the Nisqually river and in the winter time Seattle has a surplus due to high water in the Cedar river. Shifting of these surpluses will be effected by means of cost of electric current for both

cities because it will bring about a minimum operation of steam plants by both municipalities. The

Six modern power plants, including Seattle's Cedar Falls and Skagit hydro-electric plants and Lak Union steam plant and Tacoma, are being built by the Puget Sound Power and Light Co. The Skagit plant is under construction. The Cushman and Skagit plants are in course of construction.
