BIG HOthouse STARTED

STRUCTURE AT CHASE & SONS LARGEST ON COAST

Building to Increase Acreage under Glass to Two and Half; New Heating Plant Under Way

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Aug. 30.—Work on the construction of a steel frame hot house 450 by 50 feet, started yesterday at the F. B. Chase and Sons gardens, about two miles east of here. This structure, which is being erected by the

Thompson horticultural works, of Portland, is said to be the largest hot house on the Pacific coast, and will be used to propagate cucumber plants. It will be completed about the middle of December, and it is expected to begin marketing plants about the middle of March, in time for next year's crop.

A large central heating plant, which will be used for all hot houses, is also included in the contract. The total cost is expected to exceed \$20,000.

Ten Houses in All
Besides the new steel building, the firm maintains nine other houses, varying from 100 by 40 feet to 200 by 40. These are used chiefly for propagation of tomatoes and cucumber plants, with the exception of two, which this year will be used for cut flowers and ornamental plants. C. Kirkland, a horticulturist who was until recently connected with a large establishment in Calgary, Canada, has been engaged to supervise the work in the flower hothouses.

With the new building, the firm will have two and one half acres under glass. All hothouses are irrigated by the Shasta river head system, and this is used extensively in the truck gardens. About 110 acres are now tilled on the place.

The farm lies on the fertile Willamette river bottom, and is composed of what is said to be the richest soil in the valley. The trade name, "Willamette Brand," is well known all over the northwest, and users of the firm's products have expressed great satisfaction over the quality, and especially the care that is used in marketing.

Valley Adapted to Hothouses
The Willamette valley is admirably adapted to plant culture in hothouses, says Mr. Chase, who has developed the gardens from a small truck farm to where they are regarded as among the best and most extensive in the state.

The climate is regular, hence it is easy to keep the temperature even, and there is an abundance of sun light. Heat in the hothouses is maintained at 65 degrees for cucumbers, 55 for tomatoes, and about 60 for cut flowers.

The firm, Chase and Sons, is composed of F. B. Chase and his sons, E. B. Clarence, and Merle.

EARL HILL BLOCK STARTS

ONE STORY BUILDING TO BE 180 BY 128 FEET

New Structure at Cottage Grove Planned to House Four Stores; Completion Within 90 Days

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Aug. 30.—Work will be well under way within a few days on the Earl Hill business block, to be erected on the former Lurch property on the south side of Main street between Fourth and Fifth streets. The old Lurch residence property, a part of which has stood for nearly half a century, and which has long been a landmark, is being moved to property on Adams avenue, two blocks south, owned by J. F. Spray, purchaser of the building. Fruit, nut and other trees, many of which also had stood for nearly half a century, are gone and Contractor S. L. Godard will within a few days be pouring the concrete for the foundations of the new building, which will be one story in height, have a frontage of 128 feet and a depth of 150 feet.

The wall on the west will be a party wall with J. F. Spray, who has a small business block there, and the wall on the east will be a party wall with E. E. Bude, who contemplates the erection of a new building where Jones and Eaton now conduct a feed business.

Room Sizes Vary

There will be four store rooms, one 28x30, one 28x30, one 28x30, and one 15x30, all with 15-foot ceilings and all with warehouse room at the rear 50 feet in depth. It is understood that the size of the rooms has been made to accommodate the wishes of prospective tenants.

The outside walls will be of hollow tile construction and the front will be stonework stucco with plate and prism glass and deep recessed windows. The roof will be four-ply fire resisting asphalt supported by truss construction. There will be no supporting posts in any of the store rooms.

Work of construction will be rushed and the building probably will be ready for its prospective occupants within 90 days.

CANNERY OUTPUT LESS

STRICT GRADING CUTS DOWN COTTAGE GROVE RECEIPTS

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Aug. 30.—Operations at the cannery this year will not be upon as large a scale as they have been in past years, due largely to the fact that strict grading of products received is being enforced. Heretofore acceptance of all produce offered has resulted in some serious losses.

This year only prime products are being weighed in. Superintended Charles Sales has in mind no making the name, "Cottage Grove Brand," stand for the highest quality in canned goods.

Receipts so far have been largely of string beans and black berries. The receipts of the latter have been running about two tons the day. A crew of 45 is employed.

A car containing 1000 cases of No. 2 beans and 500 cases of No. 10 beans has been shipped to Portland and one car of blackberries is being shipped to Kansas City and another to Cleveland.
