Extensive Plans Announced By Railway Company

NEW TRACKS TO BE BUILT

Management of Yards in Different Cities and Addition to Brooklyn Shops Included

Expenditures of the Southern Pacific system involving \$90,000,000 in a comprehensive program of construction, new facilities and improvements just launched, have been announced from the railway's San Francisco headquarters, for a million dollars of this outlay

will be for improvement of the system's physical properties and \$10,000,000 for the recent purchase of new equipment and locomotives, with a view to maintaining the highest class of transportation service in the Pacific coast states.

Included in the improvements are the building of new lines, extensive double tracking, new classification and industrial yards in different cities, freight terminals, crossting plants, truck stations, station buildings, additions to shop equipment, replacement and strengthening of bridges, line changes to eliminate curves, new and heavier ballasting and heavier rails, new tunnels and improvements to existing ones and so on.

New Entrance to Be Built
Outstanding in this work are such projects as the completion of the Eugene-Klamath Falls cut-off and a new entrance to Portland. The latter will cost about \$4,500,000.

Another item running into large figures is the projected enlargement of shop facilities at Brooklyn, adjacent to Portland. Additional construction contracts will be awarded soon on the cut-off between Klamath Falls and Oakridge which will afford a second route between San Francisco and Portland via Eugene. This project entails about 115 miles of construction through a scenic and practically virgin section of Oregon. It will cost about \$13,000,000.

To Enter Klamath Falls
In order to carry the traffic through Klamath Falls and over the Natomah cut-off it will be necessary to expend about \$5,000,000 in new construction from Black Butte summit to Grass Lake, south of Klamath Falls.

Operation of the Southern Pacific's gigantic new locomotives now in heavy freight service has made the use of heavier rail and heavier ballast necessary.

PRODUCTION STILL HIGH

LUMBER OUTPUT IS 22 PER CENT ABOVE NORMAL

Shipments Five Per Cent Below New Business During Week Ending August 26

One hundred and thirty-four mills reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending August 26th, manufactured 119,918,440 feet of lumber; sold 123,773,164 feet, and shipped 107,912,411 feet, says the monthly report of the association.

Production for reporting mills was 22 per cent above normal. New business was two per cent above production. Shipments were five per cent below new business.

Forty-six per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 52,576,903 feet, of which 42,134,143 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 10,442,760 feet for export. New business by rail amounted to 1,669 cars.

Forty-three per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 46,828,148 feet, of which 36,258,694 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal, and 10,569,454 feet overseas.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 4,896,263 feet. Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 154,612,353 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders, 5954 cars.

In the first 24 weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 3,357,556,796 feet; new business, 3,417,703,591 feet, and shipments, 3,599,849,371 feet.

TELEPHONE LINE CHANGE
HARRISBURG, Ore., Aug. 30.—(Special to the Register).—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph is buying two crews of men here on the job of setting over several feet the company's line along the Southern Pacific right-of-way, as the millers will need a wider space of land to make the extension of its pass siding here from the present south switch to the one at the Standard Oil station, a distance of three blocks. The telephone company's line is to be set over only within this area. This job is a slow and tedious one as it must be done without interference to telephone service over any of the wires.

Another crew of linemen are busy making the installation of the block signal system on the railroad between Albany and Junction City. The signals are placed every mile or so apart. They automatically indicate whether or not the block ahead is clear.

Vetch Crop Fine in Quality
HARRISBURG, Ore., Aug. 30.—(Special to the Register).—The crop of vetch here this year is of very fine quality. The result is that the local warehouses are working full time now to clean the seed. It is said that vetch is one of the best crops for the soil and yields the grower a handsome return.

Hop Pickers Plentiful
HARRISBURG, Ore., Aug. 30.—(Special to the Register).—There seems to be no trouble in the hop yards here in getting all the pickers that are required. Good pickers are now being made in picking the crop, all the crews putting in full time. This year hops are ripening sooner than usual, report the pickers, due to the excessively hot weather since the picking season began. The early ripening of the hops reduces their weight and the pickers are unable to make as much as they could were the hops still green. The quality of the product, however, is not affected, except in appearance.

PARIS, Aug. 30.—In a message to the Greek government today the interallied council of ambassadors declares that it reserves for the powers the right to make known eventually the penalties and indemnity which may be judged necessary in connection with the killing of the members of the Italian boundary mission on the Albanian frontier.

Frontier Desolate Place
(By The Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 30.—American travelers dealing with the region where the assassination of the Italian members of the Greco-Albanian frontier delimitation mission occurred, described the country as extremely primitive and desolate and the people as illiterate and unwept in the ordinary amenities of life.

The rifle and dagger is the law of the road there. Grievances of all kinds are avenged by swift death to the offenders for the natives, who have been under the armed heel of the Turk for centuries, scarcely knows the elements of civilized life and they are no respecters of persons.

French Seize Trillion Marks
DUSSELDORF, Aug. 30.—The French today seized one trillion, three hundred billion marks, at the expense of printing office.

This was by far the largest haul the French have made since their occupation of the town. The town authorities have protested to General De Goutte that the seizure will seriously affect circulation, especially because there is already a shortage in stamps marks. A meeting of the townspeople has been called for tomorrow to discuss the situation.

Bankrupt Man to Pay Debts
EVERETT, Wash., Aug. 30.—Emil A. Hestrom, Oakland business man now visiting in Everett, today asked the aid of a newspaper to locate unsecured creditors here who had been paid nothing when he went through bankruptcy here eight years ago. He brought with him a list of names more than \$7,000 to pay each creditor in full. He had kept a list of his obligations, intending to pay them as soon as he was able.
