OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 5.—Market for eggs is just about holding its own here as a result of the Tuesday advance in California. This is about all that saved the local market from showing a lower price range.

Much "hot weather" stock from the Midwest is still the dominating influence upon the general trade. While such stock cannot by any means take the place of the better local quality, still it is here and must be sold. Therefore it acts as a bearish influence.

PEACH TRADE IS MIXED HERE
Market for peaches is still congested with considerable off-grade stuff from the Yakima section. Considerable stock came in cars under ventilation instead of under ice, therefore arrival was not in such good shape. Sales from 60c to 90c generally.

VEAL SITUATION IS SLOWER
With the bigger retailers holding back, there is only a limited demand for country-killed calves at the moment, although receipts are still moderate. Holders are offering at a reduction of 10c.
