The night force consists of seven men, while 17 are employed days at present. The night work will continue for at least two weeks, it is reported.

Rye Grass Seed Received

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Sept. 6.—A shipment of five tons of rye grass seed was received by the Springfield Mill and Grain company at their mill here today. The seed was brought in by truck. This is one of the largest amounts of rye grass seed ever assembled in this valley, it is said. The seed is valued at \$160 a ton, and is said to be of excellent quality for the propagation of rye grass.

VIRGIL OMER HUFF DIES
FUNERAL OF COTTAGE GROVE MAN HELD SUNDAY

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Sept. 6.—Virgil Omer Huff died August 30 at his home here aged 78 years, 2 months, 7 days. The funeral was held Sunday from the Christian church. Rev. J. E. Carlson officiating. Interment was in the A. F. and A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Huff had been an Odd Fellow for 25 years, having passed through the chairs. He had been a member of the Christian church since 16 years of age and served as deacon and elder of the local church of that faith for many years. He was an honorary elder at the time of death.

Mr. Huff was born in Salem, Ill., June 22, 1845. In his earlier life he lived in Missouri. He was married at Butler, in that state, on November 7, 1867, to Miss Mary M. Harvey who survives. They moved to Nebraska, then to Kansas, then to Philadelphia, and finally to Cottage Grove in 1911. They had been wed nearly 54 years.
