OIL MACHINERY ARRIVES

OLSON READY TO PROSPECT AT COTTAGE GROVE

(Register Lane County Special)
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Sept. 6.—The drill engine and heavy machinery for Cottage Grove's proposed oil well arrived Tuesday and nearly all of it has been hauled to the crest of Mount David, where the oil derrick had been constructed. The work of setting up the machinery will start at once and it is probable that within two or three weeks actual work of drilling will be in progress. Several carloads of casing are yet to come to complete the outfit.

Dr. David E. Olson, president of the Guaranty Oil company, the operators, traveled over a large part of the United States looking for a drilling outfit and finally located this one at Brandon.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 7.—A material increase in strength is shown in the position of the butter trade here. No price change is shown in the position of the butter trade here. No price change is shown either for prints or cubes Friday, but values were more generally uniform than for some days past. Unless there is a softening of the

southern and eastern situation the trade here anticipates an early advance in butter at Pacific Northwest points.

EGG SITUATION BATHING GOOD. Rather good tone in showing all through the local egg trade. No price changes are shown for the day but everything is cleaning up snug. An early advance is generally considered likely. Later in the day the association announced a 3-cent rise.

VEAL PRICE HELD UNSTEADY. Even though retailers are calling loudly for veal supplies, the market for country-killed calves shows no change in prices. In fact the big buyers are not inclined to bid up their annual needs. Hogs firm with supplies scant.

PEACH SITUATION IS FIRMER. All through the peach trade desirable stock is showing a firmer tone with a more active demand. There appears less desire to shade values. Yakima is asking 55¢ per box, there is a rail and refrigerator rate of 13¢ to Portland. The trade is today quoting desirable sizes of Dalles and Yakima Elbertas around 80¢ to 81¢, the latter in a limited way, while everything that is good is selling at 82¢ to 83¢.

FIRST CONCORD GRAPES HERE. First offerings of Concord grapes of the season from local points came from Vancouver to the Pacific Fruit & Produce Co. today. Although some Yakima stock in baskets was received with sales at 40¢ for 10, Niagara variety at a similar price. Vancouver Concord at 60¢ per bushel.

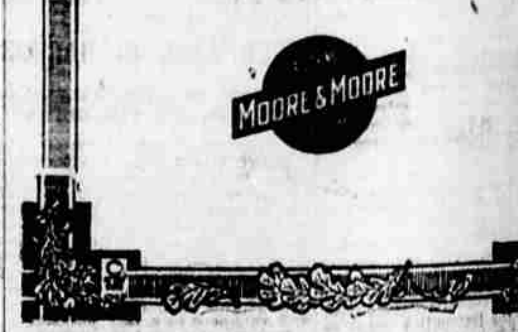

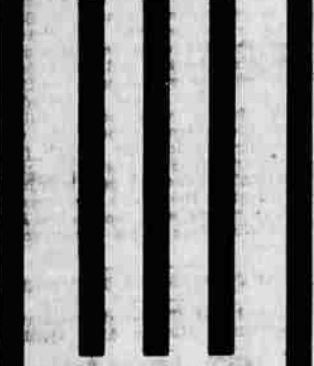
