NEW YORK FANS SCENT SMOKE OF BIG BATTLE

Firpo in City for Fight for Ring Title
BOUT IS FRIDAY NIGHT

Challenger and Champion Meet in Tomorrow Afternoon; Sell out of Seats Predicted

(By The Associated Press)
 NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Fans tonight began to scent the "smoke" of battle—that atmosphere peculiarly confined to heavyweight championship fights—with the title struggle between Jack Dempsey, champion, and Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine contender, only two days off.

Firpo arrived in New York tonight from his training camp at Atlantic City. The grim-visaged South American will remain in seclusion until the afternoon of the fight. Dempsey is expected to break camp early tomorrow, Friday afternoon he will meet his challenger for the time when they appear before the state athletic commission to weigh in. Followers of both Dempsey and Firpo declared today at the conclusion of training campaigns that the fighters were conditioned to perfection.

Tex Rickard predicted a sellout of tickets. He declared this would mean close to \$5,000 would pay \$1,300,000 to see the fight. His figures today were well past the \$1,100,000 mark.

Seat Prices Not High

"This fight would have broken the record rate of \$1,500,000 set by the Dempsey-Carpenter match," said Rickard. "If similar prices had been charged. Now the top is \$27.50, whereas two years ago in Jersey it was \$50."

Construction of the ringside, temporary bleacher sections and other additions to the Polo grounds will be completed by noon tomorrow, said the promoter.

Little change was reported in betting.

A notable gathering included men prominent in society, the financial and theatrical worlds, will view the championship contest. Diplomats also will be numbered among the throngs, for many of the envoys of South American nations, all keenly interested in the career of Firpo, the first Latin American to attain pugilistic prominence, have made reservations.

"BILL" REINHART WILL COACH FRESHMAN TEAMS

Former Oregon Star Appointed by Director Earl

William ("Bill") Reinhart, former Oregon football, baseball and basketball star and recently Multnomah Athletic club athlete, has been appointed coach of freshman athletes at the university. It was announced yesterday by Virgil Earl, director of athletics. Earl's recommendation of Reinhart was unanimously approved by the executive board of the associated students and by the school of physical education, jointly interested in the development of the Oregon athletic system.

Reinhart resigned his work from the credit department of the Standard Oil company in Portland, and will be here Monday to get a line on his new duties. Employed full time, he will assist "Baz" Williams in coaching the freshman team in the fall. He will also coach the freshman basketball team and the first-year baseball candidates.

President Claude Robinson of the associated students and Director Earl believe Reinhart's selection will be a popular one. A graduate of Salem high school, Reinhart entered Oregon in the fall of 1916. He made the freshman football, basketball and baseball teams. When war was declared he entered service with the Sales contingent of the Oregon national guard and was overseas. Following the war period, Reinhart played three years of football and baseball at Oregon and two years of basketball.

The new freshman coach was a varsity halfback and quarterback and played shortstop on the nine. He was quarterback on the Multnomah Athletic club team last fall. Reinhart had a year's experience coaching the Salem high school team two years ago.
