## FINISH ROAD PROJECTS

WORK BEING RUSHED BEFORE RAINS SET IN

Different Projects in County Are Nearing Completion, Reports County Engineer

With the approach of the rainy season all road contractors and crews under county men at work on different projects are rushing operations in order to get the projects finished or as far along as possible before the moisture puts a stop to operations.

A. C. Hanson, who has the contract to build the bond road from Coburg bridge north to the Lane county line, was expected to finish the graveling this week, said P. M. Moore, county engineer. Greenwood and Dann, who have the contract on the old territorial road between Cheshire and the Benton county line, will probably complete their work within a week and will move their equipment to Kinnebeck county where they have a sub-contract to build six miles of the grade of the Eugene-Klamath Falls cutoff of the Southern Pacific.

County trucks that have been at work on the Coburg north job have been transferred to the Turnbow road extending from Bear creek to the Ferguson road. The graveling will be started about Friday, said the engineer. Five of these trucks have been transferred and the engineer said the county could use several more.

Four and a half miles of the high pass road from Bear creek west has been rocked and another two miles of the grade is ready for the rock.

A. C. Mathews has placed about half of the base rock on the Cheshire-Goldson section of the Eugene-Florence state highway and he will start to rock the county job between Franklin and this road in a few days.

## ORCHESTRAS PLANNED

MUSIC TO BE FEATURED IN GRADE SCHOOLS

Organizations Planned for Each Building—Violin Classes Will Also Be Given

Junior orchestras will probably be organized in all grade buildings of the city by Mrs. Benetta Nash, supervisor of music, according to announcement yesterday at the office of J. T. Glen, city school superintendent. That the pupils will have an opportunity to make a short start with the orchestral instruments, Mrs. Nash has been able to secure the cooperation of Rex Underwood, who is in charge of the orchestra classes in the public school music course in the university. Under his direction a competent instructor, one of the advanced pupils, probably will give violin lessons to the grade school pupils in classes of from three to five at the very nominal charge of twenty-five cents per pupil per lesson.

Mrs. Nash says that the cost of music for the beginners will not likely exceed \$1 per year, and that arrangements have been made whereby violins can be secured at even so low a rate as \$8 to \$10. If in the present line of work it may be possible to provide similar instruction on the clarinet and cornet. This work will be done after school hours and arrangements have been made whereby advanced students from Mr. Underwood's orchestration class will supervise the practice of the pupils at no cost to them.

The city schools have been proud of the work done by the band under the direction of Albert Perfect and it is hoped that much interest can be developed in this effort to provide additional opportunity for the younger children to make a start in orchestral playing, said Mr. Glen.
