It was decided to call a meeting of the council for the evening of September 21, at which time the citizens will be asked to approve the city budget. This budget calls for an expenditure of \$25,161.27 for expenses next year. The budget committee consists of Mayor C. F. Eggman, W. G. Hughes, city treasurer, C. E. Wheaton, M. J. McKlin, W. M. Long, M. J. Mosher, L. J. Lepley, C. A. Swartz, Riley Snodgrass and L. Mays.

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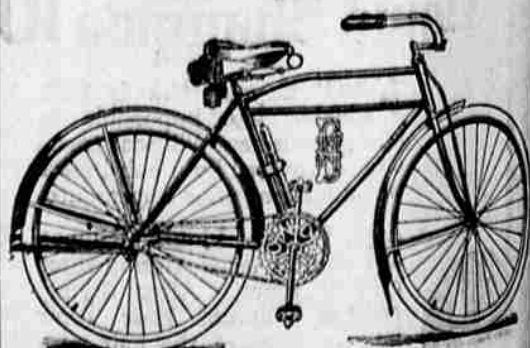
