2 tablespoons good fat salt pork; 1 small onion; 1 large potato, thinly sliced; 2 cups Preferred Stock Bantam Corn; 1 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon pepper.
1 quart scalded milk; 3 tablespoons flour.

NEW TRACK RECORD FOR MILE SET AT FAIR RACE

Potreres Steps Fast Heat In Free-For-All

CROWD IS ENTHUSIASTIC

Other Events on Card Also Exciting—Arp Bell Takes Three Successive Heats in 2:12 Event

In what is declared to be the best and fastest racing card ever put on at the local grounds, Potreres, driven by Channing, won first money in the free-for-all race and Arp Bell, driven by Richardson, was declared winner of the 2:12 pace on the track yesterday at the county fair. The time of the second heat of the free-for-all race, set a new track record, 2:12 1/2 mile. This mark replaces that made by Captain Howe, driven by Fred Woodcock, in 1915. The old record was 2:10 1/2.

From the very first heat, which was a neck-and-neck race between Hal Paxton, Jr. and Potreres, the spectators were enthusiastic and many times, when the contests were close, rose to their feet and cheered. The crowd was also the largest that attended the races, the attendance equalling that of both previous days.

After the first heat, Potreres in the free-for-all won every race, most of them by a length or more. This horse is said to be one of the fastest on the coast, and will be entered at Salem next week. Hal Paxton, Jr. who took a first, third, fourth and fifth, was given second place in the event; Mac Fitzsimmons, who took three seconds and a fourth, was third, and Alberta Hal, with two thirds, a fourth and sixth, was fourth.

Arp Bell, in the 2:12 pace or trot, won easily on three straight heats. Surety took second with all second places; Albert W was third with three thirds and a fourth, and the Bondholder was fourth with one third and three fourths.

The spectators were given a real thrill when the sulky on Verma Dillon driven by Kohm broke down. The driver was thrown and in dodging the horse, the driver of Linette A. Schwarz also lost his seat. Both horses continued around the track without drivers, and Verma Dillon was not stopped for several rounds.

In the third race, five-eighths running dash, M. Hood, ridden by Flynn, won easily, with Beauman, ridden by Bagley, second, and Spark Plug, Little, third. The time was 1:04. Another running race, a three-fourths mile derby, was called on content by the judges because the riders did not wait for an official start.

In both the Northwest and world's championship bucking contests for the day most of the riders "spun leather" or were thrown. The ability of the bronchos was clearly shown and indicated some real exhibitions tomorrow and Saturday when the best riders in the West will attempt to stay with the sunfishing cyanes.

Corporations on Increase

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 20.—A total of 11,119 Oregon domestic corporations and 888 foreign corporations are now on record in Oregon, according to the annual report of W. E. Crews, state corporation commissioner. This is an increase of \$34 during the last year. Total receipts of the department for the year were \$248,892.52 and expenses \$23,517.76, leaving \$225,374.76 to turn over to the general fund of the state. Building and loan associations have increased from 13 to 23 in the last year. Their total capitalization is \$144,750,000 and they have loaned from deposits \$28,344,169.57.
