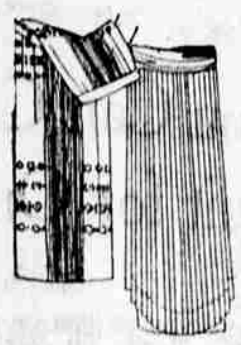

The remains will be brought here by her mother, Mrs. M. E. Brownlee, for interment in the family plot at the Masonic cemetery. Just a month ago Miss Brownlee's sister, Mrs. Stella Mayberry, who also died at Arlington, was buried here.

**Tombstone Attraction Draws Interest**—One of the unique displays in the automobile exhibit at the annual Lane show is the miniature graveyard adjacent to the Westinghouse battery booth where a series of stones sacred to the memory of batteries that have passed out for various reasons which are inscribed on the markers. Many who look over the little graves are reminded of their own troubles in regard to auto batteries and confide with each other, according to the Westinghouse men.
