CRISINGER SAYS NATIONAL BANKS ARE WITHDRAWING

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—National banks in increasing numbers are withdrawing from the federal reserve system and obtaining state charters so as to engage in the branch banking business, Governor Crisinger of the federal reserve board testified today before the congressional commission inquiring into the reasons for the failure of state banking and trust companies to join the federal reserve system.

Unless congress authorizes national banks to engage in branch banking Mr. Crisinger said, the national and federal reserve banking system will be further weakened by withdrawals.
