M. Kerr, city and county health officer. The cases listed on the state health report include diphtheria, scarlet fever, smallpox and typhoid fever.

FIRE PREVENTION URGED UPON PEOPLE OF EUGENE

Chief of Local Department Gets Instructions

OCTOBER 7-13 IS DATE

Governor Urges Schools, Churches, Civic and Municipal Bodies to Hold Exercises

The week beginning Sunday, October 7, and ending Saturday, October 13, is fire prevention week in Oregon, according to proclamation of Governor Walter M. Pierce, and the citizens in general are urged to observe it in some manner in order to impress upon the people the importance of doing everything possible to reduce the annual loss by fire. The governor urges the schools and churches to hold appropriate exercises and that civic and municipal officers prepare programs that will help educate the people as to the necessity of fire prevention.

Fire Chief Gets Letter
William E. Nussbaum, chief of the Eugene fire department and the other members of the department have received automobile windshield stickers advertising the event and they are being distributed among car owners. The chief has received a letter bearing upon this subject from Will Moore, state fire marshal, the text of which follows:

"What are you doing to stop the gigantic fire loss in the state of Oregon? The total fire loss in the United States last year was \$521,000 or approximately 12 per capita, while in the state of Oregon the loss was \$9,000,000 or \$11.25 per capita.

"Statistics compiled by the National Board of Fire Underwriters show that 56 per cent of this loss is preventable.

"In addition to this, 15,000 people were burned to death in the United States. This is equal to one life lost every 39 minutes.

"No man can restore either these human lives or the property burned for they are both gone completely and forever.

Loss Borne by People

"This great loss is borne by the people who pay insurance premiums and not by the insurance companies. Every person who pays insurance premiums should be interested in fire prevention week, because the increase in fire loss means increase of premiums, while reduction of fire loss would mean corresponding reduction of premiums.

"Governor Pierce in his proclamation has asked all churches, schools, civic and municipal bodies to join in fire prevention exercises for the week of October 7 to 13.

"May I ask you to join us in telling the people that they pay the bills and are therefore interested in this work? And will you not join in assisting to prepare and carry out such programs for this week that the people may become so aroused to the great importance of this work that fire prevention may become with them a constant practice."

FARMERS WANT OLD ROAD

PREFER CANTRELL HILL TO GAP ROUTE

Five Per Cent Grade Can Be Obtained, Says Engineer Morse—Vote Taken at Meeting

A majority of the farmers living in the Central neighborhood, west of Eugene, are in favor of using the \$5000 market road money for the Cantrell hill improvement as allotted in the 1924 budget on the old route, instead of building a new road through the gap further north. This was evidenced when a vote was taken at a meeting of the Farmers' Union in Central Hall Wednesday night. Not a person voted in favor of the gap route, according to those who were present at the meeting. The attendance was about 150.

Efforts have been made to induce the court to build a new road through the gap where there is an easier grade, but the proponents of the other route say that with the expenditure of a few thousand dollars a much better roadway can be built over the hill by deviating from the steeper parts of the road, and the distance is much shorter than by way of the gap.

P. M. Morse, county engineer, said yesterday that a maximum grade of five per cent can be had by building over the hill route, turning off to the north and going through small gap nearly instead of going straight over the hill as at present. He said that by building through the gap further north, two and a half miles of new road, but by the other route only about a mile and a half would have to be built.

If the old road is selected the plan is to improve the west side of the hill first and next year provide more money for the east side.

FIRST ASSEMBLY IS HELD

PRACTICALLY ENTIRE STUDENT BODY IS OUT

President Campbell Gives Welcoming Address to Old and New Students—Others Speak

The first university student assembly of the year, held yesterday, was attended practically 100 per cent, the enrollment to date numbering 2200 students.

President P. L. Campbell gave a welcoming address to new and old students. "The University Opportunity" was his theme, wherein he summed up the social, civic and individual advantages to be gained from completion of college education.

"Increased earning capacity" was his keynote. "Out of nationwide statistics has been proved that a college education increases one's earning capacity 50 per cent," he said. Preceding President Campbell's address, Rev. H. W. Davis, new inter-church pastor of the university, delivered the invocation.

Mrs. Virginia Judy Esterly, newly-appointed dean of women, appeared for the first time before the associated students and gave a short talk. "What I would like to work out is a maximum of freedom and a maximum of progress for the university," she said. Dean Esterly comes from the University of California, where she was a student, and later dean.

Claude Robinson, president of the associated students, gave an ideal of student administration "doing the best that is in us." The right college attitude, according to Mr. Robinson, is not to strive to excel, which creates the wrong spirit, but to cultivate open-mindedness and tolerance for the "other fellow."

To the new women of the university, Georgia Benson, president of women's league for the coming year, addressed a short talk. The entire student body was led in songs by John Stark Evans, assisted by old members of the men's and women's glee clubs.

It was announced that the increase in the formation of living organizations had increased so as to make a larger student loan fund necessary. Dean Walker, who is to have charge of dispensing the fund, was introduced. It is the wish of the university administration that six or eight living organizations will be formed each year.

DEAN STRAUB IN HOSPITAL

OPERATION MAY HAVE TO BE RESORTED TO

University's Grand Old Man Taken to Portland—Pain Letter to Students

John Straub, University of Oregon's "grand old man," dean of men at the institution, was taken to Portland yesterday on the 4:12 train, and it is possible that an operation may be resorted to to aid recovery.

The dean has been in bed for the past two weeks, suffering from a rather severe illness, although he agreed to attend the freshman meeting a few days ago. A noted surgeon of Portland is to take charge of his case and if an operation will help it will be done at once, it is said. P. L. Campbell, president of the university, accompanied Dean Straub to Portland and named him to the Portland surgical hospital at Nineteenth and Lovejoy streets.

Before leaving the dean penned a letter to the student body, which was intended to be read at the first assembly yesterday. The reading was postponed at the dean's request, however, and will be presented to the students this morning through the columns of the student daily.

Letter to Be Presented
The letter addressed to the students follows:

"To the students of the Oregon—My Boys and Girls—Greetings: A thousand greetings to you all—I cannot tell you how I miss you and this gathering. This is the first initial meeting in 46 years that I have ever missed and it almost breaks my heart to be forced to stay away from you. To the classes which through their valuations have sent me such cheery good wishes, I can only say, God bless you! To my own freshman class, the boys and girls that are near my heart, to the largest, and I hope the freshest, class I have ever had, I wish to say that I hope soon to be with you, to be your friend and counselor and advisor. I never dreamed it would be so hard to remain away from you all even for a few weeks.

"I want to thank the student body for giving my freshman class its rightful place in the university and making its president a member of the council. Let the class show its appreciation of this newly acquired honor by being loyal to the best university in the world. To the sophomores I want to say that I thank you for your gentle handling of my boys. I understand that not a single one was killed or mutilated beyond recognition and the cheers and hand-wavings in front of my house show that the freshman boys are game to the core. And to the senior cops who greeted me on that eventful day—those handsome, chivalrous guardians of my innocent youngsters, let me say that I thank you and I ask you to continue your guardianship so that hard-hearted faculty members may not flunk them ruthlessly.

"At 11 a. m. I shall see the woman's building filled with Oregon's loyal sons and daughters; I shall imagine I hear the college songs and college yells; I shall hear the cheery, kindly words of our beloved president urging you to cherish high and noble ideals and to try to live up to them and then at 12 m. as the meeting disperses I shall add, "God be with you till we meet again."

STATE RECALL OPPOSED

CLOVERDALE FARMERS' UNION ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS

County Unit Endorses Action of Local Organization Against Pierce Petitions

The Farmers' union local at Cloverdale has gone on record as opposing the recall of Governor Pierce and the income tax. At its last meeting a resolution was adopted subject to the acceptance or rejection of the county unit, which met at Cottage Grove a few days later, and the resolution was approved by the county body. It read as follows:

"Whereas, there is being circulated throughout the state of Oregon a petition seeking the recall of our honorable governor, Walter M. Pierce, therefore, be it

"Resolved, that the Cloverdale local union of the Farmers' union, believing the income tax measure one of the chief reasons for the recall, goes on record as favoring the said income tax measure. And be it further

"Resolved, that, having strict confidence in the ability and absolute faith in the honesty and desire of our chief executive, the Cloverdale local union further goes on record as utterly opposed to the said petition and is heartily in favor of the administration of Walter M. Pierce as governor of the state of Oregon. And be it further

"Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be presented to the county convention of the Lane county unit, to be held in Cottage Grove, the 28th instant, also a copy be sent to each of the Eugene daily papers and Governor Walter M. Pierce."
