## STOKES AND 5 NEGROES HELD FOR CONSPIRACY

Indicted In Connection With  
Mrs. Stokes' Charges

### DIVORCE ACTION PENDING

New York Negro Said to Have  
Made Affidavit That Mrs. Stokes  
Was Resort Innmate

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—W. E. D. Stokes, wealthy New York hotel owner, Daniel Nugent, Stokes' New York counsel, and five negroes were indicted for conspiracy by the Cook county grand jury today in connection with the charges of Mrs. Helen Elwood Stokes that her husband and his agents conspired to injure her reputation and thus add to her divorce action in New York and keep her two children from sharing in his estate.

Immediately after the indictment had been returned, Chief Justice John Caverly, of the criminal court, issued capias for the arrest of the seven persons named and fixed bail for each defendant at \$5000. Prompt steps will be taken to extradite Stokes and other New York residents. Indicted, the state's attorney's office announced, at the same time intimating that still more indictments will be sought in connection with Mrs. Stokes' charges. Mrs. Stokes herself, who appeared before the grand jury yesterday, left today for New York to oppose her husband's action for divorce, subjected to be heard on Monday.

Those named include Robert H. Lee, former deputy sheriff; Joseph Bruner, taxicab driver, said to have been used as "pay-off" man, and alleged to have sought to hire perjured testimony; Ray Hubert, former head waiter of the Beaux Arts club, a "black and tan" resort; Henry Tapscott, a New York negro, said to have made an affidavit that Mr. Stokes once was an inmate of a resort; and Mrs. Hattie Johnson, colored, alleged to have been active in gathering evidence for Stokes.

The indictment is the first returned in court since Mrs. Stokes recently made public her sensational charges that her husband and his agents had plotted to perjure evidence to attempt to besmirch her name with charges and insinuations that she had, a dozen years ago, been an inmate of a notorious resort here and had frequented negro cafes.

She has charged that the divorce suit and the alleged conspiracy were her husband's effort to cut off her two children from Stokes' estate that his wealth might go to them. W. E. D. Stokes, Jr., by a former marriage.

"Weddy" Sued By Mrs. Stokes  
The young man referred to as "Weddy" has been sued by Mrs. Stokes for \$1,000,000 as a result of a letter he wrote his father, declaring he had been intimate with his stepmother. Mrs. Stokes has declared "Weddy" charges false.

Mrs. Stokes has charged—and she said to have testified in detail before the grand jury to the same effect—that agents of her husband, using photographs of herself taken in Denver, her former home, and elsewhere, have sought to have them identified by numerous persons, chiefly negroes formerly employed in the one-time segregated vice district of Chicago, as those of an underworld woman, she has charged, and that photographs even were taken in an effort to show that she once was friendly with a negro.

Mrs. Stokes before jury  
She has made her charges to the state's attorney, the grand jury and to newspaper reporters. She was before the grand jury yesterday when she was said to have taken up the various charges which she attributed to her husband and his agents and to have denied all of them and to have explained where and when various photographs which she alleged were used in the plot to defame her, were taken and the circumstances surrounding them.

Other witnesses were heard by the grand jury today prior to the return of the indictment. Among them was Mrs. Anna Johnson, once a housekeeper in the notorious Everleigh club, a resort that flourished years ago. The witness is said to have testified that W. E. D. Stokes once approached her and asked her to identify a picture of Mrs. Stokes as the likeness of a former habitue of the club. Mrs. Johnson was said to have testified that she could not identify the picture.

### WRAY SENTENCED TO JAIL

MAN WITH MOONSHINE ENTERS PLEA OF GUILTY

J. C. Wray, who was arrested a few nights ago in company with R. Z. Evans and Margie Hutton, on a charge of unlawful possession of liquor, pleaded guilty before Acting Justice of the Peace Harold J. Wells yesterday and was fined \$400 and sentenced to serve four months in the county jail. Evans and the Hutton woman pleaded not guilty and will be tried later, perhaps during the latter part of next week, said Judge Wells, the exact date not being set. This trio was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Van Sward and Constable John L. Marsh, with a five-gallon keg of moonshine in their car.

## ZEV SELECTED TO MEET PAPYRUS IN RACE OCT. 20

Speculation as My Own Being  
Chosen Set at Rest

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—It was officially announced tonight that Harry Sinclair's three-year-old Zev has been selected to meet Papyrus, English derby winner, in the \$100,000 international race October 20.

The official announcement came as it has, 24 hours before the race set by the Jockey club committee, was due, it was said, to the fact that a member of the committee made the decision known at Belmont park this afternoon.

The official statement from Major August Belmont's office said: "The definite choice of Zev sets at rest any speculation as to his chances for the honor and puts an end to the controversy which has been raging for the last two weeks."

When the articles of agreement were being signed at Doncaster, England, the representative of Major Belmont called Mr. Irish's attention to the possibility of all three horses that might be named three weeks before the race, going wrong by being destroyed by fire or through accident.

"The British sportsman thereupon agreed that the Jockey club should have the right to name a candidate up to the day before the race."

"I want the American people to see my horse in a race," said he, "and I am ready to subscribe to any terms that will guarantee a contest. There would be no satisfaction in sending Papyrus to America for a walkover."

### FIRPO IS HELD TO OATH

STATUS OF PAMPAS BULL IS  
THAT OF U. S. CITIZEN

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The status of Luis Angel Firpo is that of an alien who has declared his intention of becoming an American citizen and such his signature will stand forever on the records of the United States government. James E. Donagan, a clerk in charge of naturalization, said today:

"I know of no law or ruling by the authorities at Washington that will authorize me to accept the return by Mr. Firpo of his first papers, which by the way have not as yet been received," said Mr. Donagan.

Firpo a few days ago took out his first papers for naturalization as an American citizen. The incident called for editorials in the Argentine newspapers, claiming the honor for the world's heavyweight boxing championship for his seemingly lesser love for his native land. Luis countered with the declaration that he had signed the papers to show his gratitude to the American people for the hospitable manner in which he had been treated since he came here. Then he announced he had returned the papers with an apology for any inconvenience he might have caused the naturalization authorities.
