CARROLL STORE CLOSES PHARMACY STOCK IS MOVED TO EUGENE (Special to the Register) HARRISBURG, Ore., Oct. 6.—The Carroll's pharmacy drug store here which has been Harrisburg's most important store of its kind for the past ten years or more, ceased to exist here the first of the week, and now there is but one store here.

With the opening of the branch store in Eugene to the Carroll's pharmacy, E. E. Carroll, of that city, planned that it would be better for business to have the stock here transferred to the new Eugene store, and so it was. E. E. Carroll organized the local store and managed it personally until 1922.

Murray coming from Sheridan to take charge. Ever since its institution this store has enjoyed a healthy patronage here.

Triangle High School News

Attendance Shows Increase New Principal Comes Text Books Are Ordered Sophomores Most Numerous

TRIANGLE H. S. NOTES—SCHO TRIANGLE HIGH SCHOOL

(Register Lane County Special) BLANCHLY, Ore., Oct. 6.—School opened Monday, with twenty-five high school students answering to the roll call. This is an increase of seven over last year's attendance.

Mr. Barker, present principal of the Washburn high school at Junction City, and who last year at this school filled the vacancy of principalship caused by G. M. Brinton's leaving, was succeeded this year by two teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Forrester. Both Mr. and Mrs. Forrester are graduates of Reed college and have had several years of teaching experience.

Mr. Forrest-schooled and Mrs. Forrester has taught in the high schools of Marshfield and Gresham.

The school texts were ordered Tuesday afternoon and arrived in time for work to be begun in them on the following Monday. Some elementary work was used until the books came.

The sophomores have the largest class this year. The juniors follow next while the freshmen and seniors have an equal number.

The student body officers for this year are: Nellie Rust, president; Mildred Mead, vice-president; Ethel Billings, secretary; Earl Myers, treasurer, and Homer Worthington, sergeant-at-arms.

All assemblies and student body meetings will be held at one o'clock this year, for at this time both rooms are used as study halls.

A student body meeting was held Tuesday, September 24. The proposition of obtaining the Grange hall for basketball was discussed, and a committee was appointed to attend the next Grange meeting to see what could be decided upon. It will be very necessary to get it, for there are no other buildings large enough to practice in, close to the school.

The high school students voted that they would co-operate with the Grangers in giving entertainment to pay for a piano. The piano will be a great benefit to the school, for it is planned that music would be practiced at certain days during the week.

A budget committee of Earl Myers, Lucience Norton and Homer Worthington, was elected at the student body meeting. The budget is to be brought to the next meeting to be voted on.

The responsibility of collecting and writing of the school notes has been placed in charge of the junior class as they are taking up newspaper work. This work will be credited in their English.

The teacher appoints two members for the work each week. Mildred Mead and Nellie Rust were appointed for the first two weeks.

Glades from the senior English students have been caused by their own cheerful, first attempts at debating, criticizing and chairmanship. The rest of us wish them success, but hope they will not reach the height of ability from which they can argue us into believing anything.

The elvies class is to write up what they believe should be in a school constitution. After it has been rearranged and finished to suit the class, it will be turned over to Homer Worthington, Stella Goldson and Luciene Norton, who are elected to draw up a school constitution for the student body. It is hoped that the ideas of the class will help them in forming one.

French, social science, and elvies are being taught this year in addition to the subjects that were given before.

The first two weeks of school were without any absences. It is hoped that such a record will be kept throughout the year.

Gym classes will be held in the old school building as soon as it is made ready. The boys at noon have been taking out the old desks, and sweeping the floor. It is planned that the boys and girls will have gym at different days this year.

The fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades are being taught the Mrs. M. E. Norton, who taught the Mount Carmel school at Goldson last year. Mrs. Norton has been teaching in four schools in Lane county since 1902, and has taught at this school for fifteen years.

Mrs. Mary Slayter has thirteen pupils in her charge in the first four grades. Mrs. Slayter taught this same room last year.

There are three new pupils in the primary room. Walter Barrows and Jackie Ferguson in the first grade and Gladys Schmidt in the fourth.
