DELEGATES ELECTED BY DEMOCRATS IN MARCH

Party Primaries in 17 States Open During Month
DATES ARE MADE PUBLIC

In Many Cases Democratic and Republican Voters Will Go to Polls on Same Day

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Democracy in 17 states will select their delegates to the national convention next year by direct vote in a series of primaries beginning in March.

A tabulation of the dates of these primaries has been made public by the Democratic national committee. In many cases they coincide with the dates on which the voters will express their preference among presidential candidates, although in some states electing delegates directly there will be no preferential vote for president, the delegates being either instructed by party convention or left unpledged.

In many cases, too, Democratic and Republican voters will go to the polls to elect their delegates on the same day. The list of Republican primaries, however, has not been completed by headquarters.

In Louisiana the method of selecting delegates chosen in district convention is left to the state committee; the usual custom is to call a state convention for the purpose. Other states in which selection of delegates is left to state committees are Arizona, Arkansas and Washington.

In practically all states in which conventions are called to select delegates, the convention dates are set by the national committee. At the Illinois, New York and North Carolina conventions delegates-at-large only are selected; in Maryland the convention follows the presidential preference primary of May 3; in Michigan the date is usually about May 15; in Nevada the platform convention is held June 24; district delegates are chosen in district conventions in North Carolina; the South Carolina convention is usually some time in May. In only one state is the convention date fixed—Wyoming—where convention day will be May 15.

There will be 1094 delegates at the 1924 Democratic national convention, and 729 1/2 votes will be required to nominate.

"I want you to know," he said, "that this will be your house to command as you have commanded many other houses."

Lloyd-George thanked him as did his wife and the smiling, radiant Megan.

How soon will we reach the Hudson? was the victor's first question after he had been encoined in his car at the rear of the train. "And West Point—the army school—will we be able to see it from the train? West Point interests me."

The cheers of those on the station platform mingled with the faint echoes of similar demonstrations far off in the concourse as the train pulled out.

Lloyd-George, his wife and daughter waved New York adieu from the rear platform, unless perhaps to General Pershing when he returned from France, had a more cordial welcome, a more spontaneous display of friendship than extended than that accorded the Great Britain's former premier.

His stay was brief but in the less than 24 hours that he was in New York was crowded tribute after tribute and ovation after ovation.

MONTREAL, Oct. 6.—Lloyd-George, war-time premier of Great Britain, received a tumultuous reception on his arrival in Montreal at 9:15 o'clock tonight for a visit of two days.

He was greeted by great throngs who cheered while young women members of Welsh societies in costume pelted him with flowers.

Mayor Mederic Martin headed an official reception committee while the famous Grenadier Guards band played martial music. Mr. Lloyd-George later was escorted from the station to the Mount Royal hotel where he will make his headquarters during the stay.

BANDIT GETS 40 LASHES

J. MAJOR STARTS SENTENCE OF 21 YEARS

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 6.—James Dudley Major, alias Earl White, highwayman, who escaped from Kansas City, Mo., on the eve of starting a sentence of 21 years there and who was convicted of highway robbery in court here last week, today received the corporal portion of his sentence—40 lashes—at the workhouse.

The whipping was administered by Warden Leach of the workhouse. The whip is a veritable cat-o-nine-tails composed of nine leather thongs fastened to a heavy stock. The warden laid on the blows so lightly that the victim's back was only slightly reddened and he smiled almost contently as he walked back to prison.

Major also was sentenced to 20 years imprisonment. His offense was holding up and robbing a man on the street in this city.

PINCHOT ENJOYS DUTIES

GOVERNOR DOES NOT YEARN TO BECOME PRESIDENT

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 6.—Governor Gifford Pinchot is deriving pleasure out of his present job as governor of Pennsylvania and has no ambitions at present to become president of the United States, according to a letter received by Governor Dixon from the chief executive of Pennsylvania.

Writing to Governor Dixon to express his thanks to the University of Montana for its having named a new building after him, Governor Pinchot said he welcomed the change of sentiment which Governor Dixon sees in the United States with respect to progressive policies and he concluded "my feeling about the presidency is simply this—I have no ambition for any other job than the one I am at and am attending strictly to my knitting here."

In his letter informing the Pennsylvania governor that Montana university had named a building after him, Governor Dixon had asked if Governor Pinchot would be a candidate for president.

ONCE RICH, NOW PAUPER

CHENEY, EX-KLONDYKER, IS PENNILESS AND IN JAIL

FRESNO, Cal., Oct. 6.—Twenty-five years ago William G. Cheney drove cattle into the Klondyke country. In eight days he made \$3000. With half of this sum he bought a claim. Gold from it brought him two millions of dollars. He was then 42 years old. Today he is 67, penniless and in jail.

A. A. Hopkins, special agent of the department of justice, arrested Cheney at Big Creek, Southern California, Edison company camp in the high Sierras. He is wanted on a charge of having obtained money under false pretenses.

U. S. Marshal Sid Shannon will take the aged man to Los Angeles where he will sail next week for Alaska.

"Bill Cheney never took a dishonest dime from anyone," the former prospector and millionaire told police officers here today.

TURK TROOPS IN CAPITAL

RE-ENTER CONSTANTINOPLE AFTER LONG BANISHMENT

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 6.—Turkish troops re-entered Constantinople this afternoon after nearly four years of banishment.

Through streets bright with flags and tredding on flowers thrown by a populace almost frenzied in its rejoicing, Shukri Pasha's iron brigade—the regiment selected for the honor—marched from Stamboul to Seraglio park, where the formal ceremonies took place. The troops were veterans of the world war and the war with Greece.

At the park Turkish ladies, veils and unveiled, distributed bonbons and flowers. Sheep were immolated and a mufti offered prayer while soldiers and populace stood silent.

beleaguered building by members of the attacking force, working behind the protection of improvised metal shields. When this work was completed, the ammonia, held under compression in heavy metal drums, was released.

For an hour, the ammonia was permitted to creep into the mess hall. Then the control valves were closed and another anxious hour passed while besiegers waited for the time to sweep the fumes clear of the barricade.

Mopping Up Party Advances
The "mopping up" party of seven picked men then moved across the no-man's land about the mess hall, nerves taut and trigger fingers curved ready about pistols at full cock.

Those waiting breathlessly on the "firing line" heard a shout from within the building, the word flashed out "all dead."

The "siege of Eddyville" was ended.

Walters' body was found near the northwest wall with a bullet wound through the head and badly burned from a bursting rifle grenade. The bodies of Griffith and Ferland were partly sheltered under a table against the wall on the northwest side. Powder burned bullet wounds over the heart indicated the manner in which Griffith and Ferland died. Ferland's hand still gripped a heavy calibre automatic pistol.

Ferland and Griffith's arms were folded as though the bodies had

been arranged after death. These two of the desperate trio lost heart as hope of escape diminished and committed suicide to avoid capture or were slain by Walters, who then fell under the heavy fire from the besieging forces, physicians said.

the Bavarian monarchy are untrue," the dictator declared.

"A strong, firm Bavaria means a powerful column to strengthen the support of the burdens of the entire country. All patriotic citizens should hold together in the interests of the United Germany of the future."

Dr. Von Kahr also announced that he was considering further measures designed to relieve the situation economically by the control of milk and food prices and other matters having direct bearing upon the consumers' pockets.

A decree issued today forbids the publication and distribution of all communist newspapers and literature throughout Bavaria under the severest penalties.

German Families Flee Unrest

GENEVA, Oct. 6.—German families, rich and poor, are fleeing from the unrest in their country and for the past few weeks have been crossing the Swiss frontier in large numbers. They are admitted as are other tourists under the Swiss law but the workmen, most of whom come from Bavaria and along the Rhine, receive permission to remain only one or two months so that they will not compete with the Swiss workers as there are already 100,000 unemployed in this country. Many of the immigrants come into Switzerland penniless.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 5.—Postal authorities from Portland and Southern Pacific officials from here were endeavoring today to solve the mystery connected with the findings of a large amount of mail, money orders, personal letters and checks, strewn along the railroad tracks between Yoncalla and Boswell Springs, Oregon, last night. It has been learned that the mail came from a Yoncalla small pouch and the greater part of it was addressed to Portland persons and business firms. Officers do not know whether the mail pouch was stolen or the mail blew out the door of a mail car.

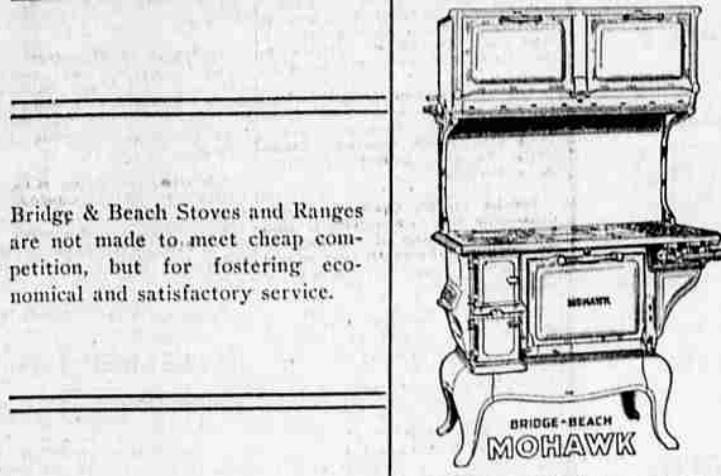
