FRENCH MOVE AWAITED

MARQUIS OF CURZON REVEALS BRITAIN'S NEW POLICY

(By The Associated Press)
LONDON, Oct. 6.—The Marquis of Curzon, British secretary for foreign affairs, in a long speech at the imperial conference today revealed the British government's new policy growing out of Germany's abandonment of passive resistance.

This policy, briefly, is to await the initiative of France, who now is expected to make proposals for renewed allied co-operation. Lord Curzon assumed that the French government already had prepared in outline, if not in detail, for the anticipated surrender on the part of Germany.

Nothing was said by the foreign secretary about any reply to Germany's famous offer to submit to an international investigation commission the question of Germany's capacity to pay reparations, and apparently this part of the British policy, which Premier Baldwin in August told parliament could not wait indefinitely is regarded as having been superseded by the situation in Germany.

BABE RUTH MADE GREAT RECORD IN HURLING DAYS

Pitching, Outdid Batting In
World Series Games

WAS RED SOX MAINSTAY

Babe's All-Round Ability as Pitcher, Fielder and Batter Drew
Him to Star List

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—George Herman Ruth, known to fans simply as "Babe," the outstanding star of the major leagues this season, whose bat and all-round ability contributed largely to the winning of the third pennant by the Yankees, played his first championship game with the Baltimore International league club April 22, 1914.

Baltimore played Buffalo that day. Ruth pitched, allowing six hits, passing four men and striking out four. Baltimore won, 6 to 0. Baltimore's second sacker was Neal Ball, the first major league player to make an unassisted triple play. Ball had made his triple killing five years before while playing with Cleveland against the Boston Red Sox.

Ruth made his first appearance in the majors on July 11, 1914, with the Boston Red Sox, as a pitcher. He twirled seven innings, holding the Dodgers' runners for the last 13 innings. In the 1918 series between the Red Sox and Chicago Cubs, Ruth won two games. On September 5 he turned back the Cubs without a score, 1 to 0, and his runless innings' record for world's series was increased to 22. Four days later he again defeated the Cubs, 3 to 2. The brace of Chicago runs came in the eighth, as that Ruth increased his runless inning record to 29.

Defeated Brooklyn 2 to 1

The 1916 series between the Red Sox and the Brooklyn Superbas was Ruth's first championship experience. He defeated Brooklyn, 2 to 1, in 14 innings on October 9, holding the Dodgers' runners for the last 13 innings. In the 1918 series between the Red Sox and Chicago Cubs, Ruth won two games. On September 5 he turned back the Cubs without a score, 1 to 0, and his runless innings' record for world's series was increased to 22. Four days later he again defeated the Cubs, 3 to 2. The brace of Chicago runs came in the eighth, as that Ruth increased his runless inning record to 29.

In All-Round Player

Ruth's all-round ability as pitcher, outfielder, first baseman and wallpaper extraordinary had drawn him to the top of the star list, and in 1920 he became a member of the New York American league club. In his last season with Boston he had hit 29 home runs. In his first season in New York he swung his bat into 54 homers, a new all-time mark, and in the following year increased this record to 59.

Last year, due to many days of enforced idleness, his batting averages dropped. He accounted for 25 home runs, however. All this year he has been around the top of the batting list in both leagues. He has been a flash on the bases, a great bulwark of defense in the outfield, and proved a stimulant generally to the play of the Yankees.

NEW THEORY ON DISEASE

IS CAUSED BY LEAKAGE OF ELECTRICITY FROM CELLS

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—A theory that all disease is caused by a leakage of electricity from the normal tissue cells was advanced today by Dr. Walter E. Dillkirk of Chicago at the Middle States Society of Electronic Medicine convention. To cure disease, he said, the cells must be "insulated" or recharged by order to restore the missing electrons. British army surgeons during the war, he said, had successfully "insulated" wounded with paraffine.

Dr. W. A. Guild of Des Moines, president of the society, said the presence of inherited disease had been found in the blood of infants by the electronic method.

PICTURES TO BE SHOWN

WORK OF SCHROFF AND HAFEN PLACED IN GALLERY

Many Canvases Finished During
Past Summer Brought Home
by University Artists

The summer's work of Alfred H. Schroff, head of the University of Oregon, fine arts department, and Virgil O. Hafen, instructor in fine arts, will be shown in the campus gallery this winter. Professor Schroff spent the summer at Carmel, California, and Mr. Hafen painted on the Ute Indian reservation near Springfield, Utah.

Long days of sunshine enabled Professor Schroff to paint approximately eighty canvases. His work includes both oils and water colors. Thirty or forty of the canvases are large paintings. Many of them are marines. The Oregon painter spent a good deal of time attempting to transform the varying moods of surf and sea to his canvases. A number of his paintings are in the Pine Inn at Carmel, while several others are temporarily in the Ambassador hotel, Los Angeles. The remainder are on their way to Eugene.

Friends of Professor Schroff are looking forward with interest to a view of the new canvases. A year ago he spent the summer at Carmel and brought a number of canvases to the Northwest. One of them, "Windwept Cypress Trees," won first prize at the Northwest art exhibition in Seattle last winter. A second Carmel production won first prize at the exhibition of Western artists held in Springfield, Utah.

There was a good deal of fog off the Carmel coast-line a year ago last summer, and the artist interpreted this gray mood. His pictures painted this summer, however, are bathed in sunshine.

Professor Hafen has a cabin on the Ute reservation where he spends his summer. He made a number of sketching tours and has fifteen or twenty canvases which will be shown this winter. Evening effects and views of woodland make up his summer's work principally. His medium is oil.

FARM ZERO HOUR PASSED

TILLERS' PROSPECTS ON UPGRADE SATIS SURVEY

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—Farm conditions have passed the time of deepest depression and are on the up-trend, according to a survey just completed, the National Association of Real Estate boards announced today.

A questionnaire sent to 1290 farm land specialists by the association, the statement said show: That the economic condition of the farmer in a decidedly preponderant proportion of the districts covered in these observations is better than this time last year. Approximately 75 per cent of the districts so far reporting indicate better conditions, not quite 13 per cent report worse and 11 per cent report them as about the same as last year.
