BOY THIEVES ARE CAUGHT

REVOLVERS AND AMMUNITION STOLEN FROM GUN STORE

Clarence Parker and James Whitney Admit Crime and Are in Lane Jail

Clarence Parker, 17, and James Whitney, 13, both of Portland, are in the county jail here and are charged with breaking into the Eugene gun store early yesterday morning and stealing a number of revolvers, a flashlight and some ammunition. They admitted their theft, according to Sheriff Stickels, and the stolen articles have been recovered.

The boys were arrested at Junction City about 8:30 yesterday by Constable Sandy Peterson, of that place, who is also a special deputy sheriff. They were arrested hardly before the burglary was discovered by Arthur Henderson, proprietor of the store. The boys, who had ridden to Eugene from Portland on a motorcycle Monday morning and while walking on the streets with several revolvers strapped around their waists excited the suspicions of a woman who notified Constable Peterson and that officer soon located them and placed them in custody.

After the boys had been brought to Eugene they told Sheriff Stickels that they entered the store sometime after 1 o'clock by breaking open a window next to the alley. They took six revolvers, a flashlight and two boxes of cartridges.

Parker, who formerly lived in Eugene and at Douglas gardens east of Springfield, gave his Portland address as 509 Commercial street, and the Whitney boy said he lived at 294 Fargo street. Sheriff Stickels has communicated with the officers in Portland to ascertain whether or not the motorcycle on which they were riding was stolen. Parker said it belongs to him, although the secretary of state's records at Salem show that it is registered under the name of August F. Crabtree, 269 Fargo street, Portland.

The officers say that the two boys admit having attempted to enter the Babbs hardware store before they broke into the gun store but were unable to gain entrance.

RICHARD MYERS KILLED

EUGENE BOY FALLS BENEATH WHEELS OF TRAIN

Richard Myers, for three years a student of the Eugene high school, died in Portland at 8:10 o'clock yesterday evening as a result of being run over by a Southern Pacific train there at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and losing both legs.

Myers, who was aged 20, was employed as a welder for the railway company and although no details of the accident were received here, it is presumed that he was working on a car at the time. Both legs were cut off above the knee and he was unable to survive the shock and the loss of blood.

Myers was active in student affairs at the school here and was well liked. He attended the local school up to this year.

He leaves his parents and brothers and sisters residing at 1643 Lawrence street here.

Word was received late last night that the remains will be sent to Eugene and that they will arrive some time today. W. W. Branstetter, Eugene mortician, who is attending the state convention of undertakers in Portland, will take charge of the body and bring it to Eugene.

TWO DIVORCES GRANTED

ONE WIFE AND ONE HUSBAND GIVEN DECREE

Because her husband failed to provide for her and she was compelled to work at night in a cannery and do other hard work, Mrs. Minnie E. Barnes yesterday was granted a decree of divorce from Franklin Barnes. Mrs. Barnes testified before Judge Skipworth that they were married in Eugene December 18, 1917, and have two children, Norman, 4, and LaVerl, 2, whose care and custody she was allowed. Besides the acts mentioned she testified that her husband struck her at various times and at one time knocked her unconscious.

PAVING WORK TO START

STEIN BROS. READY TO OPERATE ON MADISON STREET

Holdeman, physical director, who last night met with a group of those interested and made tentative plans for the holding of the first class next Tuesday evening starting at 7:30 o'clock. One class a week will be held at the start but if the enrollment warrants an additional class during the week will be scheduled. Mr. Holdeman reports.

A schedule of class work both in the gym and swimming pool is now being prepared for the women, the physical director states.

CHURCH PLANS BIG RALLY

CONGREGATIONALISTS EXPECT RECORD NEXT SUNDAY

One of the largest days in point of attendance since the establishment of the Congregational church here is the expectation of members of the church in charge of the "rally day" program to be held at the church next Sunday, according to Rev. W. H. L. Marshall, pastor. All Sunday school classes and other divisions of the church organization are to participate in the effort to make a record attendance, the pastor reports.

Mrs. Frank A. Nagley, kindergarten teacher, has taken charge of the primary Sunday school class of the Congregational church and she will be assisted in the instruction by Mrs. A. L. Lomax, the pastor reports.

FORDSON TRACTORS HERE

THREE CARS OF FARM EQUIPMENT HAVE ARRIVED

Three cars of tractors, the largest shipment of such farm equipment ever received here, has arrived from Detroit for the E. C. Simmons company, local agency for the Ford Motor company. All Fordson tractors are included in the consignment, according to E. C. Simmons, who reports that many purchasers of the machines are ready to take the tractors immediately as during the past few months it has been hard for the factory to keep up with the orders.

A carload of Ford cars was also received yesterday for the local agency from the Portland assembling plant, Mr. Simmons reports.

ALASKA BIRD COMES HERE

EMPEROR GOOSE, SELDOM SO FAR SOUTH, IS KILLED

An Emperor goose, a bird rarely seen south of Alaska, was killed this week near Jasper and brought to this city by Jess Wallace. The bird, blue-gray in color, proved a mystery to local hunters and others who were interested in the wild fowl life. A search of volumes on bird lore revealed the identity of the goose, which is well known in Alaska, but does not come very far south of that territory. It is not known whether others were ever killed here.

The federal reports on the bird life of Alaska state that the flesh of the Emperor goose is not of the best for eating. The goose is here mounted here at the Eckert taxidermist shop.

CITY SHOWS BIG GROWTH

NUMBER WATER AND LIGHT USERS INCREASES

The rapid increase in the number of users of city light and water is a good index to the growth of Eugene, said C. A. McClain, superintendent of the municipal public utilities, yesterday.

The superintendent's books show that on October 1 this year the number of statements for light sent out was 4024, as compared with 3885 at the same time last year, 3373 on October 1, 1921, and 3143 on that date in 1920.

On October 1, 1923, were sent out 3328 water statements as against 3140 on October 1, 1922, 2391 on the same date of 1921 and 2750 in 1920.

BANK QUARTERS ENLARGE

MORE SPACE TO BE ADDED TO LOBBY OF U. S. NATIONAL

The United States National bank will in a few days begin the work of enlarging its lobby by the addition of the space now occupied by Wells and Wells, attorneys, in the rear of the present lobby and facing Park street. Improvements amounting to \$15,000 are expected to be made in the banking quarters, according to officers of the bank. The addition to the lobby will be 36 by 60 feet.

Two more teller's windows will be added to the row on the north side and a row will be installed on the south side, according to the plans.

MANY AT BIBLE CLASS

CONDON PUPILS MAKE GOOD SHOWING AT SCHOOL

Fifty-seven of 82 Children Eligible Attend First Session of New Course

Fifty-seven of the 82 pupils of the fifth and sixth grades of the Condon school were in attendance at the week-day Bible class held yesterday at the Fairmount Presbyterian church. This is a much higher percentage than that of the Washington and Patterson schools where the first classes were held the previous day. Twenty-eight pupils of the 60 eligible at the Washington school attended the class and 24 of the 71 at the Patterson school.

The next class will be held today at the Condon school where there are registered 93 pupils in the fifth and sixth grades. Thursday the course will be given at the Lincoln school where 130 are eligible. The junior high school class will be held Friday. Seventy-two fifth and sixth grade pupils are registered there.

A meeting of the week-day Bible school committee will be held Friday noon at the completion of the first week of the course held here. Reports on the number attending and the interest manifested will be presented. Expectations are that a large increase will be recorded within the next few weeks when parents complete the enrollment of their children, according to the committee members.

SIX UNIVERSITY STUDENTS TO JOIN SOCIETY

Six university students, all majors in the school of Journalism, were yesterday elected to membership in Sigma Delta Chi, national journalism society. They are Robert Lane, William S. Akers, Leo Munley and Taylor Huston, of the senior class, and Don Woodward and Ben Maxwell, of the junior class.

Leo Munley is at present manager of the Emerald. Don Woodward is managing editor, Taylor Huston is a day editor, and Akers is a sport writer on the paper. Ben Maxwell now holds the position of university correspondent, and Robert Lane has had extensive experience in practical newspaper work.

Sigma Delta Chi was founded for the purpose of furthering the ideals and aims of journalism, and includes in its membership many of the leading newspaper men of the country.
