PROPERTY VALUATIONS SHOW BIG RISE THIS YEAR

Assessment \$657,866 More
Than That of 1922

SUMMARY IS ANNOUNCED

Tillable Land and Improvements
on Town and City Lots
Boosted Most

The total assessed valuation of property in Lane county this year exclusive of that of public utilities is \$657,866 greater than last year's valuation, according to the summary of the tax rolls just completed at the assessor's office. The total this year is \$32,214,720 as compared with a total last year of \$31,556,854.

The property receiving the greatest increase over the 1922 assessment is that of tillable land which was raised \$159,712. While the item "improvements on town lots," shows an increase of \$295,350, it represents mainly new buildings constructed since the 1922 assessment and is not an increase of valuation on property previously assessed. The assessment of property for 1923 was made by the former assessor, Herbert E. Walker, who recently resigned, and the summary was made by the present assessor, Ben F. Keeney.

CAR DRIVER DRAWS GUN

R. H. STOUT PULLS OUT SMALL
GUN WHEN ARRESTED

Traffic Officer Disarms Him and
Takes Him to Jail for
Having No License

When Kenneth Bloom, state traffic officer, went to arrest R. H. Stout yesterday for driving a car without a driver's license, Stout drew a small revolver out of his pocket but he was quickly disarmed and taken to jail.

Stout, who gives his age as 36, is accompanied by Virgil Dibble, 25, and William Dibble, 21, but no charge was lodged against the others.

The numbers on the engine of the car were almost obliterated and Sheriff Stokes gave it as his opinion that Stout who bought a car of this make on a conditional sales contract from a local dealer, is either trying to escape payment for the machine by destroying the number or that he had transferred the license plates from the one he bought to another. The case is being investigated further.

The revolver that Stout drew but did not point at the traffic officer is .32 calibre, carrying a very small cartridge, and it is not believed that a bullet fired from it at any distance would harm anyone.

U. OF O. ENROLLMENT 2195

OVER 2200 EXPECTED TO ENTER
ON FALL TERM WORK

The enrollment of the university will exceed the 2200-mark in a few days, according to Carleton Spencer, registrar, who announced yesterday that to date 2195 students have registered. This makes five more already this term than were enrolled last fall term, it was said.

Late filing fees are now being collected from many students, who are entering late, it was stated, and some students who were here at the start of school have not yet filed their cards.

Fees of all students are payable beginning Monday. A non-resident fee of \$50 is being charged for all students from outside of the state, while regular students pay a fee of \$11.25 for the term. Fees may be paid until October 22, at which time those appearing late will be required to pay an additional fee as fine.

TROUT DISTRIBUTION FOR SEASON IS ABOUT ENDED

Many Thousand From Mc-
Kenzie Hatchery Liberated

SUPERINTENDENT HERE

T. J. Craig, in Charge of Work
Over State, Tells of Activities
of His Department

Distribution of trout fry from the McKenzie river hatchery will be completed for the present season Monday, when the last consignment from the Lane county hatchery will be taken to McKenzie Bridge to be liberated, according to Tom J. Craig, superintendent of distribution, who is here to supervise the work. Mr. Craig stated that 30,000 rainbow fry will be liberated at the McKenzie Bridge. The state official has just returned from Myrtle Creek where he distributed 31,000 cut-throat trout fry.

A distribution of 30,000 rainbow trout fry was sent Thursday to the vicinity of Albany where they were liberated in streams in that district. Today Mr. Craig will go to Benton with two truck loads of fry to be distributed in that district. This consignment will also be of 30,000 fry. All the trout fry has been taken from the McKenzie river hatchery and at present there remains about 500,000 fry at the tanks, the superintendent reports.

IMPROVEMENTS UNDER WAY

Mr. Craig said that several improvements are under way and others are contemplated at the McKenzie hatchery. Concrete drain pipes are being placed in the slough along the river for the purpose of replacing the wooden pipes that have been in use. Other changes that are being talked and are expected to add much to the efficiency of the plant are the construction of additional ponds in the slough along the river for the small trout. The slough is now used for the larger fish but plans are being discussed for the construction of concrete walls to provide ponds for a portion of the small fry that are now in the slough. The present ponds receive water from a creek above the river but water for the ponds in the slough is obtained from the McKenzie. Additional facilities are necessary at the plant, the hatchery officials report, according to Mr. Craig.

LABOR DEMAND IS GOOD

LOCAL EMPLOYMENT OFFICE
PLACES 135 IN WEEK

Demand for labor in Eugene and vicinity continues to hold up, according to the report of Frank L. Armitage, director of the local office of the United States employment service. During the past week a heavy demand for common labor and men from the logging camps and sawmills was noted. A total of 135 men and women were placed in positions here during the week.

The following positions were filled through the local office during the past week: Farm hands 4; orchard help 12; casual labor 14; common help 24; sawmill and camp men 27; teamsters 7; truck workers 12; engineers 2; firemen 3; Women, orchard help 11; housework 6; laundry help 2; cooks 2; waitress 2.
