

OREGON SQUAD TO MEET WHITMAN ELEVEN TODAY

Large Turnout Expected at Pendleton For Game

This afternoon the speedy Oregon football aggregation will be up against their first real opposition this season when they meet the aggressive Whitman five at Pendleton.

Whitman is a team to be feared, in the light of the excellent showing they made against Washington. The Huskies failed to register a single first down in the first half, and could not put the ball across until the fourth quarter. In the first three periods, the lighter Missionaries not only held the bulkier men, but actually made more yardage. The strain told, however, in the fourth frame, and

it is one of Oregon's aims to likewise wear them out. The Oregon backfield, and line are in excellent condition, and should the game develop into an endurance contest, the varsity will be pretty sure to win. Every man on the line is a sticker, and unless injured, is good for the full game. In the backfield, Chapman goes as good in the fourth period as in the first, and the wily and speedy Sax, a veteran at the game, can easily last. The Missionaries are somewhat crippled now, however, for Tilton, star half, is reported out for the season. They have plenty of good men left, however, and several are developed for line positions. Hatchford is expected to enter on the line, and he is a leader in aggressiveness and fight. The balance of the squad is reported to be in good condition, especially those slated to be in the line-up at the whistle. The varsity lineup for the game is expected to be about the same as that sent in against Pacific last Saturday. Sinclair is expected to be over the ball at center, with Mills and Bailey guards. The two

veterans, Reed and Vonder Ahe will take the tackle berths, while Williamson and Rasky will take the end positions. The Chapman, Sax, Latham, Terjeson combination is expected to be ready in the backfield, although either French or Poulson may go in case Latham is not in the best of condition.

OREGON HOLDS WORKOUT

"SHY" SAYS HIS MEN ARE FIT TO TACKLE WHITMAN

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 18.—The University of Oregon football team, which arrived in Pendleton today, went through a light workout this afternoon in Roundup park. Coach Huntington pronounced him and his men ready for the game with Whitman college, of Walla Walla, tomorrow afternoon, and while he would make no predictions as to the outcome, he said he was satisfied his men would make a good showing. The Oregon line is composed entirely, with the exception of Reed and Vonder Ahe at the tackles, of new men. The backfield is composed of veterans and is speedy on the offensive.

The Whitman eleven will arrive in Pendleton tomorrow morning. Oregon will average 170 pounds to the man and Whitman 161. Officials for the game as announced tonight are: Sam Dolan, Notre Dame, referee; Rusk, Michigan, umpire; and Bennion, Utah, head linesman.

Lee Sherman, steady little quarterback for the Huskies, who went to the infirmary yesterday with an abscess, will be able to take part in practice tomorrow and play Saturday, according to the university physician. Hard driving scrimmages was the order in the Washington camp today with the second team playing the role of Southern California.

The team will go to Pendleton tomorrow morning, accompanied by most of the Whitman student body.

SEATTLE, Oct. 18.—Fred Bullock, 18-year-old entrant in one of a series of football kicking contests being held by the Seattle Times on play fields, was coached by his sister, Mary, somewhat older "Steady! Steady!" admonished Mary, as she stood at Fred's side in the contest.

Fred retained the title for that play field, which he won last year, despite special preparation by other lads to wrest it from him.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 18.—Notre Dame is "seriously considering" a game with Gonzaga university on the Western trip of the Eastern team. It is declared in a telegram received by Coach Dorais of Gonzaga, from Coach Rockne of Notre Dame. He said the matter of a game here would be placed before the faculty committee the first of the week. A committee of civic clubs of this city has asked Notre Dame for a game with Gonzaga.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Oct. 18.—Pacific Grove university will meet Pacific college Friday in the first game of the season at home. The game will be used to fill the vacancy left in the schedule through cancellation of a game with Mount Angel college. Mount Angel college called off the game because of the inexperience of its squad. The game with Pacific college will give Coach Franke a chance to iron out the rough places in the offensive before tangling with the College of Idaho at Caldwell.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 18.—Coach Andy Kerr, accompanied by 27 Cardinal football men, Trainer Denny and Football Manager Ayres, left tonight for Los Angeles, where he is to meet Occidental college eleven Saturday afternoon. Two halfbacks, Paul Murray and Dick Lawson, who were expected to be in Kerr's lineup, were left at home because of injuries received in practice.

W. S. C. TO SHIFT LINEUP

EXENDINE EXPECTS COMEBACK IN IDAHO GAME

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 18.—A complete shift of the lineup of the Washington State college team for its game tomorrow with the University of Idaho was predicted today by Coach A. A. Exendine. "I expect to see the men come back Friday," he declared. "We have not yet chosen the team that will meet Idaho, and we may not do so until a short time before the game."

FOOD PRICES SHOW GAIN

CRAWLED UP 2 PER CENT AUGUST 15 TO SEPTEMBER 15

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Retail food prices, on the average of reports from 51 cities to the bureau of labor statistics, crawled up another 2 per cent during the month from August 15 to September 15.

Los Angeles, Louisville and St. Louis, with four per cent, were the high group out of 46 cities showing an increase. The list included Portland, Ore., San Francisco and Seattle, 3 per cent; Chicago, Dallas, Detroit, Kansas City, New York, Norfolk, Omaha, Pittsburgh, 2 per cent; Atlanta, Denver, Houston, Indianapolis, Salt Lake City and Washington, 1 per cent. No change was reported at Boston and Butte, Mont.

Retail food price increases for the 51 cities during the year ending September 15 ranged from 11 per cent at Cleveland, to three per cent at Seattle.

agency should give Stresemann carte blanche authority to wield his dictatorship without heed of party or partisan consideration. Herman Mueller and Otto Wels, who are the traditional emissaries of the socialist party when important assignments are decided on, today had a long conference with President Ebert. Representatives of the socialists and communists also have been conducting information deliberations looking toward the creation of a "proletarian working alliance," although the

ultra reds have put forward such extreme demands that the conferences have been postponed for the time being. The conferences, however, are significant as representing the first serious attempt to unite both the radical parties on a common platform, especially as the socialist party, as such, up to quite recent times has openly and repeatedly asserted its refusal to make common cause with the communists.

Since the German bolsheviks joined in the formation of the Saxony ministry, the previously existing line of cleavage has become considerably blurred and there is an instant demand in the ranks of the Berlin socialists that the central government forthwith assume a more conciliatory attitude
